Yulia Putintseva (KAZ #76) vs. Paula Badosa (ESP #106)

Badosa leads 4-1

Putintseva:

- Making 11th appearance at Indian Wells, her best result here is a R16 run in 2024 (l. eventual champion Swiatek)
- Career-best results at WTA 1000 level are four QF finishes: Madrid 2024, Miami 2024, Toronto 2022 and Rome 2020
- Owns three WTA Tour-level titles; one on grass at Birmingham 2024 and two on clay at Budapest 2021 and Nurnberg 2019
- Career-best results on hard court are three Runner-up finishes: Nur-Sultan 2021, Guangzhou 2018 and St. Petersburg 2017
- Seeking her first win since reaching the Australian Open R16, this marked her best career run at the event

Badosa:

- The 2021 champion is set to make her fourth appearance at Indian Wells, and her first since 2023. In addition to lifting the title in 2021, she also advanced to the semifinals in 2022
- Owns 11 career wins at Indian Wells; she has only claimed more at Roland Garros (13) and Australian Open (12)
- She holds a 4-1 record against today's opponent Putintseva, most recently defeating her on hard court at Cincinnati 2024
- Three of her four WTA career titles have come on hard court: Washington DC 2024, Sydney 2022 and Indian Wells 2021. Also owns one title on clay at Belgrade 2021
- Looking for her 4th win of the 2026 season today, having been forced to retire from her most recent tournament in Dubai with a right thigh injury

[WC] Bianca Andreescu (CAN #165) vs. [Q] Kamilla Rakhimova (UZB #88)

First meeting

Andreescu:

- The former champion is set for her fourth appearance at Indian Wells, having won the title on her debut in 2019 as a wild card; becoming the only wild card ever to lift the trophy at the event
- Owns three WTA trophies; her title here in 2019 marked her first career Tour-level title, she then went on to capture a second title at WTA 1000 Toronto followed by a triumphant run at US Open all in the same year
- Her US Open victory saw her become the first Canadian woman to win a major singles title in the Open Era
- Started the 2026 season competing at ITF level where she went on an 8-match winning streak, capturing the title at W35 Bradenton followed by a QF finish at W35 Weston
- Seeking her first Tour-level win since defeating Krejčíková at Montreal 2025, she subsequently tore ankle ligaments forcing her to withdraw from the event
- Bidding for 10th career win at Indian Wells; it would be just the fourth event she has registered 10+ wins at after the Canadian Open, US Open and Miami Open

WTA

Rakhimova:

- Making 2nd main draw appearance at Indian Wells, seeking first win here after a 1r exit in 2025 (l. WC Dolehide)
- Contesting 11th WTA 1000 main draw, with five of her previous 10 coming as a lucky loser. She has never surpassed the 2r at WTA 1000 level
- Has won her last 5 consecutive meetings against wild cards; most recently defeating Cocciaretto at Eastbourne 2025
- Holds a 5-5 career record in opening main draw matches at WTA 1000 events, last losing in three sets to Jovic at Dubai 2026
- Seeking second Tour-level win of the 2026 season after 2r run at Austin (d. Bondar in 1r, l. Selekhmeteva in 2r)

Zeynep Sonmez (TUR #80) vs. McCartney Kessler (USA #51)

First meeting

Sonmez:

- Making main draw debut at Indian Wells after competing in qualifying last year
- This is the 7th WTA 1000 main draw appearance of her career and looking for her first WTA 1000 match win of the season after falling in 1r at Doha and Dubai
- Since the event's inauguration in 1989, she could become the first Turkish player to win a women's singles main draw match at Indian Wells
- Achieved her best hard court result by winning the title at 2024 Merida (d. Li in F)
- This will be her second WTA 1000 match against an opponent on their home soil after defeating Wei Sijia at Beijing last season

Kessler:

- This is her third appearance at Indian Wells with her best result a 2r finish last season (l. Sabalenka)
- Posted her best WTA 1000 results last year by reaching R16 at Beijing, Montreal and Dubai
- Has won six of her 10 opening matches at WTA 1000 events in 2025, last losing from a set up against Jaqueline Cristian at Wuhan
- Holds a career record of 3-6 at WTA 1000 events against opponents ranked outside the WTA top 50, last losing to Lys at Beijing (R16) last season
- Owns two hard court titles: Hobart in 2025; Cleveland in 2024

WTA

[Q] Victoria Jimenez Kastintseva (AND #97) vs. Caty McNally (USA #68)

First meeting

Jimenez Kastintseva:

- Defeated Lucrezia Stefanini and Katie Boulter in qualifying to make her Indian Wells main draw debut
- This is her 7th WTA 1000 main draw; she owns one match win at this level over Zhu Lin at Madrid 2024
- Owns 0-4 career record against players from United States of America in Tour main draw matches - this is her first such meeting in 2026
- Made her Top 10 debut this week at No.97 following her QF run at WTA 500 Merida last week
- Best career result on hard court is QF which she has reached 3 times: Merida in 2026, Guadalajara 500 in 2025 and Seoul in 2022

McNally:

- This is her fifth Indian Wells appearance and looking for reach 2r for a second time after 2025 (l. Samsonova in 2r)
- The best WTA 1000 result of her career is R32 at Montreal in 2025 (l. Keys) and Cincinnati in 2022 (l. Jabeur)
- Is 1-0 against qualifiers this season (d. Sakatsume in 1r at Australian Open)
- Best career result on hard court is SF which she has reached twice: Merida in 2023; Washington DC in 2019
- Posted her best result of the 2026 season at Ostrava by reaching QF (l. Korpatsch)

[WC] Sloane Stephens (USA #780) vs. Camila Osorio (COL #61)

First meeting

Stephens:

- Featuring in her 14th main draw at Indian Wells; her best result was QF in 2014 (l. Pennetta)
- Achieved her best WTA 1000 results in 2018 by winning the Miami title (d. Ostapenko in F) and reaching the final at Montreal (l. Halep in F)
- This is her first WTA 1000 appearance since Toronto 2024 (l. Minnen in opening round)
- The 2017 US Open champion owns six hard court titles (also Guadalajara 2022, Miami 2018, Acapulco & Auckland in 2016 and Washington DC in 2015)
- Looking for her first main draw match win of the season after winning three qualifying matches at Australian Open to reach 1r (l. Ka.Pliskova)

Osorio:

- This is her fourth Indian Wells main draw appearance, she has progressed to the second round only once before in 2025 (defeated Osaka in 1r before falling to Tauson in 2r)
- Her best WTA 1000 result is R16 which she reached last month at Doha (as a qualifier, l. Ostapenko) and 2023 Rome (l. Haddad Maia)
- This is her second meeting against a player from USA so far this season after losing to Ann Li in 1r at Australian Open
- Is 0-1 against wild cards so far this year (l. Boulter at Merida via retirement)
- Claimed WTA 125 Manila title in January this year defeating Philippine local and Top 50 player Alexandra Eala in the quarterfinal

- Making 11th appearance at Indian Wells, her best result here is a R16 run in 2024 (l. eventual champion Swiatek)
- Career-best results at WTA 1000 level are four QF finishes: Madrid 2024 (l. Rybakina), Miami 2024 (l. Azarenka), Toronto 2022 (l. Pegula) and Rome 2020 (l. eventual champion Halep)
- Seeking her first win since reaching the Australian Open R16, this marked her best career run at the event
- Faces No.106 Paula Badosa in today's 1r; since the start of the 2025 season, Putintseva is 9-6 vs. opponents ranked outside the Top 100. Her most recent encounter was a loss to No.122 Jimenez Kasintseva at Merida
- Owns 10-12 career record against players from Spain, her most recent encounter was a loss to Masarova at Madrid 2025. Most recent win came against Bucsa at Miami 2024
- Owns three WTA Tour-level titles; one on grass at Birmingham 2024 (d. Tomljanovic in F), and two on clay at Budapest 2021 (d. Kalinina in F) and Nurnberg 2019 (d. Zidansek in F)
- Career-best results on hard court are three runner-up finishes: Nur-Sultan 2021 (l. Van Uytvanck in F), Guangzhou 2018 (l. Q.Wang in F) and St. Petersburg 2017 (l. Mladenovic in F)
- One of 2 players from Kazakhstan competing in this year's main draw alongside 3rd seed Elena Rybakina
- Best result by Kazakhstan at Indian Wells was title run by Elena Rybakina in 2023
- Is currently ranked No.76; this time last year she was ranked at a career-high of No.20.
- So far this year, has made 2r at Brisbane (as LL) and Adelaide (as qualifier), reached 4r at Australian Open and fell in 1r at Merida. Bidding for 6th win of the 2026 season today
- Has lost her last 10 matches at WTA 1000 events, with her last win coming against Moyuka Uchijima at Doha 2025
- Her only victory over today's opponent Badosa came at Toronto in 2022, when Badosa was ranked World No.3 and was forced to retire early in the second set

PLAYER NOTES

- Making 4th appearance at Indian Wells, she is a former champion at this tournament after winning the title in 2021 (d. Azarenka in F)
- Her title run here in 2021 is her best career result at a WTA 1000 event
- Aside from Indian Wells, her best WTA 1000 results are four semifinal appearances: Beijing and Cincinnati in 2024, Indian Wells in 2022, and Madrid in 2021
- Hasn't competed here at Indian Wells since the 2023 edition due to injuries
- Faces No.76 Yulia Putintseva in 1r today; since the start of the 2025 season, Badosa has gone 9-4 vs. opponents ranked outside the Top 50. Two of these losses have come this year consecutively (l. No.109 Sasnovich at Abu Dhabi and No.101 Selekhmeteva at Australian Open)
- Owns 7-6 career record against players from Kazakhstan, 1-1 in 2026 with a win over Diyas at Australian Open and a loss to Rybakina at Brisbane
- Three of her four WTA career titles have come on hard court: Washington DC 2024 (as a WC, d. Bouzkova in F), Sydney 2022 (d. Krejickova in F) and Indian Wells 2021 (d. Azarenka in F)
- Also owns one clay court title - Belgrade 2021 (d. Konjuh in F)
- One of 3 players from Spain competing in this year's main draw alongside Cristina Bucsa and Jessica Bouzas Maneiro
- Best result by Spain at Indian Wells was title run by Paula Badosa herself in 2021
- Is currently ranked No.106; this time last year was ranked No.10. Reached a career-high ranking of No.2 in April 2022
- Bidding for her 4th win of the 2026 season today, had to retire in her most recent tournament at Dubai due to a right thigh injury
- Has won 11 career main draw matches at Indian Wells; she has only claimed more at Roland Garros (13) and Australian Open (12)
- Since the format's introduction in 2009, only Muguruza (100) and Suarez Navarro (92) have claimed more WTA 1000 main draw wins than Badosa (56) among Spanish players

CAREER MILESTONES

- In 2025, made her Top 20 debut shortly after her 30th birthday, hitting new career-high ranking of No.20 on January 27; other season highlights include Adelaide SF (l. Pegula) and Jiujiang QF (l. Golubic)
- During 2024, won her third career WTA Tour title at Birmingham (d. Tomljanovic in final). Also reached QF at Hobart (l. Yuan) and Ningbo (l. eventual champion Kasatkina); found success at Grand Slam level with R16 run at Wimbledon (d. World No.1 Swiatek in 3r; l. Ostapenko) and 3r run at US Open (l. Paolini)
- 2023 saw her reach SF at Guangzhou (l. Linette) and QF at Rabat (l. Riera) and Hobart (l. Blinkova)
- Reached two SFs in 2022, at Istanbul (l. eventual champion Potapova) and Budapest (l. Kronic), while also making QF at Toronto (l. Pegula)
- Highlight of 2021 campaign was lifting second career WTA title, at Budapest (d. Kalinina in F). Also was R-Up at Nur-Sultan (l. Van Uytvanck), advanced to SF at Portoroz and made QFs at Charleston [500], Strasbourg and San Jose
- Standout results of 2020 were QF runs at US Open (first Kazakh woman to reach last eight in New York; l. Brady) and Rome (l. Halep). Recorded 300th career win (at all levels) with 1r triumph over Flipkens at 2020 Roland Garros
- In 2019, won first career title at Nurnberg (d. Zidansek in F); also picked up a win over World No.1 Osaka on grass at Birmingham
- Best result of 2018 was QF run at Roland Garros (l. Keys), her 2nd trip to the quarters in Paris in the last three years. Also reached 2nd career WTA Tour singles final at Guangzhou (l. Wang Qiang in F)
- Reached first career WTA final at 2017 St. Petersburg (l. Mladenovic in F) after notching two Top 10 wins over No.8 Kuznetsova and No.5 Cibulkova (her first career Top 5 win); first woman from Kazakhstan to reach a WTA final since Shvedova at 2015 Bogota (l. Pereira)
- In 2016, reached her first Grand Slam QF at Roland Garros (l. S.Williams in 3 sets); became first Kazakh to reach a Grand Slam QF since Shvedova at 2012 Roland Garros (Shvedova made another QF at the very next Slam, 2016 Wimbledon). Also that year, defeated No.14 V.Williams en route to Charleston QF
- Progressed to maiden WTA SF at 2015 Bastad (l. eventual champion Larsson). First Top 10 win came over No.10 Petkovic at 2015 Nurnberg (via ret.)
- In 2025, reached first Grand Slam SF at Australian Open (l. No.1 Sabalenka), which sent her into the Top 10 for the first time since October 2022; made 3 more QFs (Merida, Strasbourg and Berlin) but was affected by injuries, contesting only one event after Wimbledon (Beijing 3r)
- Voted 2024 WTA Comeback Player of the Year after finishing the year at No.12 (after finishing 2023 at No.66); won 4th career title at Washington DC and also reached SF at Cincinnati, Beijing and Ningbo; also advanced to QF at US Open
- In 2023, made SF at Adelaide #2, reached back-to-back QF at Charleston and Stuttgart and an additional QF at Rome, but withdrew from Roland Garros with a back injury. Her last match of the year was at Wimbledon, where she fell in R64 then ended her season due to continuing injury
- In 2022, Badosa rose to career-high ranking of No.2 (April 25), won the title at Sydney, and advanced to SF at Indian Wells, Stuttgart and San Jose
- Captured the first two WTA singles titles of her career in 2021 at Belgrade (d. Konjuh in F) and Indian Wells (d. Azarenka in F); qualified for 2021 WTA Finals in Guadalajara, where she advanced to the SF stage
- Broke into the WTA Top 20 on October 18, 2021 after winning the Indian Wells title and reached the Top 10 on November 8, 2021; nominated for 2021 WTA Most Improved Player of the Year (won by Krejчикova), as voted on by members of the media
- At 2020 Roland Garros, upset former finalist Stephens and 2017 champion Ostapenko en route to reaching R16 for the first time at a major. That year also reached SF at Istanbul (l. Bouchard)
- Campaign in 2019 highlighted by SF run at Palermo (l. Bertens) and QF showing at Seoul (l. Y.Wang); also fell 1r on Grand Slam main draw debut at Australian Open (as qualifier, l. Birrell)
- Finished 2018 inside Top 200 for the first time (at No.143); picked up three ITF titles at \$25k ITF/Glasgow-UK, ITF/\$25k Les Franqueses del Valles-FRA and ITF/\$60k Valencia-ESP
- Claimed third title on ITF Circuit in 2017 at ITF/\$25k El Espinar; fell 1r at Miami and in qualifying at Madrid
- In 2016, fell 1r at Miami, Madrid and Mallorca and in qualifying at Rio de Janeiro
