Hailey Baptiste (USA #43) vs. [3] Elena Rybakina (KAZ #3)

Rybakina leads 1-0

Baptiste:

- Making 4th main draw appearance at Indian Wells; she is looking to reach the 3rd round here for the first time
- Career-best results at WTA 1000-level are two Round of 16 finishes at Wuhan 2024 (as a qualifier, I. Alexandrova) and Guadalajara 2023 (I. Garcia)
- Owns 1-7 career record against Top 10 players, with her one Top 10 win coming against No.10 Barbora Krejčíková at Wuhan 2024
- Career-best Tour-level result on hard court came earlier this season with a semifinal run at Abu Dhabi (I. Alexandrova) – this is also her career-best Tour-level finish on any surface
- She also recorded her career-best run at the Australian Open this year by reaching the 3rd round (I. Gauff)

Rybakina:

- Making 5th appearance at Indian Wells; she won this title in 2023 (d. Sabalenka in final)
- Has won two WTA 1000 titles, capturing both of those titles in 2023, here at Indian Wells and at Rome
- Has gone undefeated in opening matches at her last 20 WTA events played; her last such defeat was to Ashlyn Krueger at Miami last season
- Has won 14 of her last 15 matches against opponents ranked outside the Top 20, with the one loss coming against No.67 Ruzic via retirement at Dubai 2026
- In the last 52 weeks (since Indian Wells 2025), only Sabalenka (63) and Swiatek (59) have claimed more Tour-level main draw wins than Rybakina (58)

[5] Jessica Pegula (USA #5) vs. [WC] Donna Vekic (CRO #103)

Pegula leads 2-0

Pegula:

- Appearing in her 8th Indian Wells main draw; her best tournament result was the quarterfinals in 2021 (I. eventual runner-up Azarenka)
- Indian Wells is one of the three WTA 1000 events she has appeared in without reaching the semifinals, along with Doha and Rome
- Owns four WTA 1000 titles: 2026 Dubai, 2024 Toronto, 2023 Montreal and 2022 Guadalajara
- Her two previous victories over Vekic were on grass (2024 Berlin and 2022 Wimbledon)
- At this tournament, Pegula could become the first player to reach the semifinal at eight consecutive Tour events appeared in since Maria Sharapova (eight, between Beijing 2012 and Madrid 2013)
- Currently on a 5-match winning streak after claiming the title at 2026 Dubai (d. Svitolina in final)

Vekic:

- Making 11th appearance at Indian Wells; her best tournament result came last season with Round of 16 (l. Keys)
- Her best WTA 1000 result is Round of 16 which she has reached 8 times, most recently Madrid 2025 (l. Keys)
- Looking to register her 10th career Top 5 win; her most recent Top 5 win was over No.2 Gauff at the 2024 Paris Olympics (Vekic went on to win the silver medal)
- Best result by a wild card at Indian Wells was by Bianca Andreescu who won the title in 2019
- Since 2000, only two wild cards have defeated Top 5 players at Indian Wells, Martina Hingis (2006) and Belinda Bencic (2025)
- Vekic's first-round win over Valentova was her first Tour main draw match-win of the season; at WTA 125-level she made the final at Manila (l. Osorio in final)

[Q] Kayla Day (USA #187) vs. [2] Iga Swiatek (POL #2)

First meeting

Day:

- Making 4th appearance at Indian Wells; her best result here is a 3rd round run in 2017 (l. Muguruza)
- Her 3rd round finish here in 2017 is her career-best result at the WTA 1000 level
- Defeated Sasnovich and Semenov in qualifying to reach her first Tour-level main draw since 2024 Nottingham
- Beat Francesca Jones in the first round to register her 8th career Tour-level win, and first since Tokyo 2023 (d. Uchijima)
- She is 0-3 vs. Top 10 players in her career, most recently losing to No.4 Muguruza at Stanford 2017. Her best win by ranking is over No.20 Keys at Roland Garros 2023

Swiatek:

- Making 6th main draw appearance at Indian Wells; she is a two-time champion here, winning the title for the first time in 2022 and again in 2024 (d. Sakkari in both finals)
- She has reached the semifinals or better here in each of the last four years
- The reigning Wimbledon champion owns 11 WTA 1000 trophies, most recently 2025 Cincinnati (d. Paolini in final)
- Has gone undefeated in her last 72 opening matches at WTA events; her last such defeat was to Maria Sakkari at 2021 WTA Finals
- Among active players, only Azarenka (35) has claimed more main draw wins than Swiatek (22) at Indian Wells
- Has won her last 11 consecutive matches against qualifiers; the last time she lost to a qualifier was 2024 Dubai (l. Kalinskaya)

[8] Mirra Andreeva (#8) vs. Solana Sierra (ARG #65)

First meeting

Andreeva:

- Making her 3rd appearance at Indian Wells, where she returns as the defending champion (d. Sabalenka in last year's final)
- Attempting to become just the 2nd woman since the event's inauguration in 1989 to claim back-to-back titles at Indian Wells, joining Martina Navratilova (1990-1991)
- Last year, she became the 3rd-youngest woman to win the title at Indian Wells, older only than Martina Hingis in 1998 and Serena Williams in 1999
- Holds a 4-0 record this year vs. players ranked outside the Top 50
- A win today would be her 100th career Tour-level victory

Sierra:

- Making her Indian Wells tournament debut
- In the first round, she ended Peyton Stearns' 5-match winning streak (Stearns won the Austin title last week)
- Had lost 3 straight Tour-level matches coming into Indian Wells; in the first round, she earned her first Tour-level win since she defeated McNally at Hobart in January
- This is just her 2nd career match vs. a Top 10 player; her 1st match vs. a Top 10 player was a loss to Coco Gauff at this year's United Cup
- Contesting her 3rd career WTA 1000 main draw; her victory over Stearns was her first WTA 1000 main draw win

Laura Siegemund (GER #55) vs. [9] Elina Svitolina (UKR #9)

Svitolina leads 1-0

Siegemund:

- Making her 5th main draw appearance at Indian Wells and has equaled her tournament-best showing; she also reached the 2nd round in her 2016 tournament debut (l. eventual runner-up Serena Williams)
- Defeated Petra Marcinko in 1r for her 2nd win of the year (also d. No.18 Samsonova in 2026 Australian Open 1r)
- Owns 13 wins in career over Top 10 players, most recently No.5 Mirra Andreeva at 2025 Wuhan
- Contesting her 36th career WTA 1000 main draw; her career-best WTA 1000 showing is the quarterfinals at 2025 Wuhan (l. eventual champion Gauff)
- 1 of 3 German women in the main draw and the only one to reach 2nd round (Seidel and Maria lost 1st round)

Svitolina:

- Making her 12th appearance at Indian Wells; her tournament-best result is the semifinals in 2019 (l. eventual champion Andreescu)
- This year's Tour leader in match-wins entering Indian Wells (currently holds 15-3 Tour-level win-loss record)
- She is a 4-time WTA 1000 champion, winning titles at 2017 Dubai, 2017 Toronto and 2017-2018 Rome
- Last month at Dubai, she made her first WTA 1000 final since 2018 (l. Pegula in final)
- Holds an 8-0 record this year vs. players ranked outside the Top 50
- Has appeared in 28 main draw matches at Indian Wells (17-11 record); among the players contesting this year's event, only Venus Williams has appeared in more (29 before this season)

- Faces No.3 Elena Rybakina in 2r today; owns 1-7 career record against Top 10 players, with sole win coming against No.10 Barbora Krejčíková at Wuhan 2024
- Owns 0-2 career record against players from Kazakhstan, with one loss coming against today's opponent Rybakina at Montreal 2025 and the other against Putintseva at Brisbane 2026
- Career-best result on hard court came earlier this season with a semifinal run at Abu Dhabi (l. Alexandrova). This is her career-best finish on any surface
- One of 11 players from United States of America through to the 2r
- The last player from the USA to reach a final here was Serena Williams in 2016 (l. Azarenka in F). The most recent to win a title was also Serena Williams in 2001 (d. Clijsters in F)
- Is currently ranked No.43; this time last year was ranked No.100. Reached a career-high ranking of No.39 in February 2026
- As well as reaching her maiden career Tour-level semifinal earlier this season at Abu Dhabi, she also recorded her career-best run at Australian Open this year by reaching the 3r (l. Gauff)

- Has gone undefeated in opening matches at her last 20 WTA events played; her last such defeat was to Ashlyn Krueger at Miami last season
- Faces No.43 Hailey Baptiste in today's 2r; she has won 14 of her last 15 matches against opponents ranked outside the Top 20, with only loss coming against No.67 Ruzic via retirement at Dubai 2026
- Is 1-0 so far in 2026 vs. players from United States of America, defeating Pegula in the semifinals of Australian Open title run
- 7 of her 12 career titles have come on hard court, most recently Australian Open 2026 (d. Sabalenka in F)
- One of 2 players from Kazakhstan competing in the second round alongside Putintseva
- Best result by Kazakhstan at Indian Wells was title run by Elena Rybakina in 2023
- Is currently ranked at a career-high of No.3 which she reached for the first time in June 2023; this time last year was ranked No.7.
- In the last 52 weeks (since Indian Wells 2025), only Sabalenka (63) and Swiatek (59) have claimed more WTA level main draw wins than Rybakina (58)
- In the last 52 weeks, is the player with the joint-most WTA level titles claimed (four - Strasbourg, Ningbo and WTA Finals in 2025, and AO in 2026), level with Sabalenka

CAREER MILESTONES

- In 2025, reached first WTA Tour QF of career at Auckland (l. Osaka) and first Grand Slam R16 of career at Roland Garros (l. Keys); made Top 50 debut, peaking at a career-high ranking of No.47 on August 25
- During 2024, made Tour-level R16 at Bogota, Seoul and Wuhan as well as reaching 2r at Roland Garros. Also made semifinal at WTA 125 Puerto Vallarta and broke into the Top 100 for the first time, achieving a career high ranking of No.80 in October
- Won back-to-back Tour main draw matches for the first time at 2023 Guadalajara 1000 reaching R16 (l. Garcia)
- During 2022 season, reached 2r at Australian Open (as qualifier, l. Inglis), Guadalajara 250 (as qualifier, l. Osorio) and Charleston (l. Cornet)
- In 2021, made 2r at Roland Garros as qualifier (l. Kenin), and also reached 2r at Chicago 500 (as WC, l. Azarenka) and Charleston (as WC, l. Jabeur); won first WTA Tour doubles title at Charleston 250 w/McNally (d. Perez/Sanders in F)
- In 2020, made Grand Slam main draw debut as wild card at US Open (l. Mladenovic in 1r); also contested qualifying at Australian Open and Lexington
- Highlight of 2019 was 2r showing on WTA main draw debut at Washington DC (as wild card, d. No.17 Keys, l. Mladenovic); also contested qualifying at US Open, and on ITF Circuit won \$25K titles at Tucson, Sumter and Plantation
- As a junior reached career-high ranking of No.38 in 2018
- Made debut on ITF Circuit in Florida in 2017
- In 2025, won her first WTA Finals title, where she posted a perfect round robin record before topping World No.1 Sabalenka in the final; by going undefeated (5-0) at 2025 WTA Finals Riyadh, she earned \$5.235m, the biggest prize money payout in women's sporting history
- Overall, won three titles in 2025, adding Strasbourg and Ningbo crowns to her Riyadh triumph; finished at No.5 in the rankings and as the year's Tour leader in total aces (516)
- Won three titles from five finals in 2024, tasting success at Brisbane, Abu Dhabi and Stuttgart and finishing R-Up at Doha and Miami. Qualified for her second WTA Finals and defeated WTA World No.1 Sabalenka in the group stage
- Reached second Grand Slam final at 2023 Australian Open (l. Sabalenka in 3s); made Top-10 debut following tournament (January 30, 2023). Also in 2023 won first two WTA 1000 titles at Indian Wells and Rome and finished R-Up at Miami. Qualified for first WTA Finals, going 1-2 in group stage.
- Lifted maiden Grand Slam title at 2022 Wimbledon (d. Jabeur in F); also finished R-Up at Adelaide (l. Barty) and Portoroz (l. Siniakova)
- Best results of 2021 were SFs at Eastbourne, Olympics and Chicago [500], and QFs at Abu Dhabi, Roland Garros, San Jose and Ostrava
- Opened 2020 by reaching the championship match at four of her first five tournaments, including a title run at Hobart (d. Zhang in F), and made Top 20 debut at No.19 on February 17, after reaching St. Petersburg final. First Top-5 win came over No.3 Ka. Pliskova during R-Up finish at 2020 Dubai
- Won maiden WTA singles title at 2019 Bucharest (d. Tig in F), breaking into Top 100 for the first time in the following week's rankings at No.65 (July 22). Went on to make Top 50 debut on September 16 after reaching second career Tour final at Nanchang (l. Peterson)
- Highlights of 2018 included reaching maiden WTA QF at St. Petersburg (l. Goerges) and clinching title at \$15K ITF/Kazan. First Top 10 win came over No.7 Garcia at 2018 St. Petersburg
- Made WTA qualifying and main draw debut at 2017 Moscow (as qualifier, l. Begu in 1r)
- Professional debut came at \$10k ITF/Antalya-TUR in 2014

- Assistant coach is Will Woodall
 - Formerly coached by Peter Lucassen at the USTA National Campus in Orlando
 - Met Williams sisters as a kid when they were playing World Team Tennis and managed to hit with both
 - Pet dog, a half-Shar Pei, half-Pug named Tsonga
- Trained at Spartak Club in Moscow as a junior; previous coaches included Andrei Cheshnokov (Elena Vesnina's former coach) and Evgenia Kulikovskaya
 - Nominated for 2019 WTA Newcomer of the Year Award
 - Started playing tennis aged five and favorite surface is hard


