## DAY 5 – SUNDAY, MARCH 8

### [1] Aryna Sabalenka (#1) vs. Jaqueline Cristian (ROU #35)

First meeting

#### **Sabalenka:**

- Making 7th appearance at Indian Wells; she is a two-time finalist here, finishing runner-up last year (l. Andreeva) and in 2023 (l. Rybakina)
- Has won nine WTA 1000 titles, including two in 2025 at Madrid (d. Gauff in final) and Miami (d. Pegula in final)
- Hasn't lost to a player ranked outside the Top 20 on hard court since Dubai 2025 (l. No.38 Tauson), a run that spans 22 consecutive wins
- Has won one title already this year at Brisbane (d. Kostyuk in final); she is 12-1 so far this season with only loss coming against Rybakina in the Australian Open final
- Since the format's introduction in 2009, Sabalenka (136) only trails Azarenka (209) among currently active players for match wins at WTA 1000 events

#### **Cristian:**

- Making 2nd main draw appearance at Indian Wells; she has reached the 3rd round here for a second time after also doing so on her main draw debut last year (l. Paolini)
- Her career-best result at a WTA 1000 event is Round of 16 at 2026 Dubai (l. M. Andreeva)
- Owns 1 career Top 10 win, defeating No.10 Barbora Krejčíková at Beijing 2024 (Cristian has lost her last 7 matches vs. Top 10 opponents since then)
- Today's match is her first career meeting against a reigning World No.1
- Best career Tour-level result on hard court is runner-up finish at Linz 2021 (l. Riske-Amritraj in final)
- Best result by Romania at Indian Wells was title run by Simona Halep in 2015

### [4] Coco Gauff (USA #4) vs. [31] Alexandra Eala (PHI #32)

Gauff leads 1-0

#### **Gauff:**

- Making 6th appearance at Indian Wells, where her best result is reaching semifinals in 2024 (l. Sakkari)
- Has won three WTA 1000 titles: 2025 Wuhan (d. Pegula in final), 2024 Beijing (d. Muchova in final) and 2023 Cincinnati (d. Muchova in final)
- Defeated today's opponent Eala in the Dubai quarterfinals last month, which is their only previous meeting
- Since the start of the 2020 season, Gauff (101) is one of four players with 100+ match wins at WTA 1000 events alongside Swiatek, Sabalenka and Pegula
- Has won 11 matches so far this season, including reaching quarterfinals at Australian Open (l. Svitolina), semifinals at WTA 1000 Dubai (l. Svitolina) and reaching semifinals with Team USA at United Cup
- Is 9-0 after taking the first set during 2026; only one of these nine matches has progressed to a third set

#### ***Eala:***

- Making Indian Wells tournament debut; she is the first player from the Philippines to contest the main draw at this tournament
- Competing in her 12th career WTA 1000 main draw; career-best WTA 1000 result is semifinals at Miami 2025 as wild card ranked No.140 (l. eventual runner-up Pegula)
- Owns 3 career wins over Top 10 players, defeating No.8 Paolini at Dubai 2026, and No.5 Keys and No.2 Swiatek at Miami 2025
- Is currently ranked No.32 (first player from the Philippines to reach Top 100 of WTA Rankings); this time last year was ranked No.140
- Has won 9 Tour-level matches this season including Auckland semifinals (l. eventual runner-up Wang Xinyu), Abu Dhabi quarterfinals (l. eventual runner-up Alexandrova) and Dubai quarterfinals (l. today's opponent Gauff)
- Trying to become the first left-handed player to register 10 Tour-level match-wins during the 2026 season

#### **Camila Osorio (COL #61) vs. [16] Naomi Osaka (JPN #16)**

**Tied 1-1**

#### ***Osorio:***

- Making 4th main draw appearance at Indian Wells; this is her first time reaching the 3rd round
- Facing Naomi Osaka for the 2nd straight year at Indian Wells – Osorio defeated Osaka in last year's first round (which was Osorio's first career main draw win at Indian Wells)
- Owns 6 wins in career over Top 20 players, most recently No.18 Iva Jovic in the previous round (that was her first Top 20 win since she defeated Ostapenko at the 2024 Paris Olympics)
- Contesting her 20th career WTA 1000 main draw; her best WTA 1000 results are Round of 16 finishes at 2023 Rome (l. Haddad Maia) and 2026 Doha (l. Ostapenko)
- Osorio is the first Colombian woman to make Indian Wells 3r since Fabiola Zuluaga's 4r run in 2005
- Won the WTA 125 Manila title earlier this year, defeating Philippine local and Top 50 player Alexandra Eala in the quarterfinals en route

#### ***Osaka:***

- Making 7th main draw appearance at Indian Wells, where she won her first WTA singles title in 2018 (d. Kasatkina in final)
- She is contesting her 49th career WTA 1000 main draw; she is a 2-time WTA 1000 champion, at 2018 Indian Wells and 2019 Beijing (d. Barty in final)
- Contesting her third tournament of the 2026 season after United Cup and Australian Open
- Holds a 3-1 record this year vs. players ranked outside the Top 50 (the one loss was to Sakkari at United Cup)
- All of her 7 career WTA Tour titles were won on hard court, most recently Australian Open in 2021 (she also won one WTA 125 title on clay at 2025 Saint Malo)
- A former World No.1, Osaka reached that ranking for the first time on January 28, 2019 and held the top spot for a total of 25 weeks in her career

#### **[25] Emma Raducanu (GBR #24) vs. [6] Amanda Anisimova (USA #6)**

**Raducanu leads 2-1**

##### ***Raducanu:***

- Making 6th appearance at Indian Wells; her best result here is a Round of 16 run in 2023 (l. Swiatek)
- Career-best result at the WTA 1000 level is quarterfinal run at Miami 2025 (l. eventual finalist Pegula)
- Defeated today's opponent Anisimova twice in 2025 at Australian Open and Miami
- Owns 3-17 career record against Top 10 players; most recent Top 10 win came over No.10 Navarro at Miami 2025 (has lost her last 9 matches against Top 10 players since then)
- Her most recent win over an American at an American tournament was against Anisimova at Miami 2025
- The 2021 US Open champion Raducanu reached her second career Tour-level final last month at Cluj-Napoca (l. Cirstea in final)

##### ***Anisimova:***

- Making 7th appearance at Indian Wells, her best result at the event came on her debut in 2018 when she reached the Round of 16 (l. Ka. Pliskova)
- Has won two WTA 1000 titles, both in 2025: Doha (d. Ostapenko in final) and Beijing (d. Noskova in final)
- Defeated today's opponent Raducanu in their most recent meeting at Montreal 2025
- Has won 8 matches so far in 2026, including reaching quarterfinals at Australian Open for the first time and a semifinal run at WTA 1000 Dubai (l. Pegula at both events)
- Reached a career-high ranking of No. 3 at the start of the 2026 season
- The most recent American woman to win the Indian Wells title is Serena Williams in 2001

#### **[10] Victoria Mboko (CAN #10) vs. [23] Anna Kalinskaya (#22)**

**Mboko leads 2-0**

##### ***Mboko:***

- Making her Indian Wells tournament debut this season
- Has won one WTA 1000 title, captured on home soil at Montreal 2025 as an 18-year-old wild card
- Reached her 2nd career WTA 1000 final last month in Doha (l. Muchova in final)
- Holds a 10-0 record this year vs. players ranked outside the Top 20
- Aiming to become the first Canadian woman to make Indian Wells Round of 16 since Fernandez in 2022
- Broke into the WTA Rankings Top 10 for the first time last month; this time last year she was ranked No.188
- Has won 14 Tour-level matches this year, tied for 2nd-most on Tour (Svitolina currently leads the Tour in match-wins with 16)

##### ***Kalinskaya:***

- Making her 6th appearance at Indian Wells
- Her tournament-best result is Round of 16 as a No.151-ranked qualifier in her 2021 tournament debut (l. Jabeur)
- Owns 14 wins in career over Top 10 players, most recently No.9 Elina Svitolina at 2026 Doha
- Holds an 0-6 career Tour-level record against players from Canada; her last 2 losses vs. Canadians were both to Mboko, at 2025 Hong Kong (via retirement) and 2026 Adelaide (in a third-set tiebreak)
- Her career-best showing at a WTA 1000 event is a runner-up finish at 2024 Dubai (as a qualifier, l. Paolini in final)

## CAREER MILESTONES

- Won a Tour leading four titles in 2025, including her 4th career Grand Slam title at US Open (d. Anisimova in final) as well as Madrid, Miami and Brisbane; also finished runner-up at WTA Finals, Australian Open, Roland Garros, Indian Wells and Stuttgart for a Tour leading nine finals overall
- Ended 2025 by finishing at World No.1 for the second straight year, posting the most Tour match wins of any player with 63 and setting a new WTA single-season record in prize money with \$15,008,519
- Reached seven finals across 2024, defending her Australian Open crown, winning the US Open and also won titles at Cincinnati and Wuhan. Recaptured the No.1 ranking in October and finished the season as the WTA Year-End No.1 for the first time in her career
- Outstanding 2023 saw her win debut Grand Slam title at Australian Open (d. Rybakina in F), reach second Major final at US Open (l. Gauff in F) and become the WTA World No.1 player for the first time in career (after US Open). In addition won titles at Adelaide and Madrid
- Highlight of 2022 season was R-Up finish at WTA Finals in Fort Worth (l. Garcia in F); upset No.1 Swiatek, No.2 Jabeur and No.3 Pegula en route to final - only the fourth woman in history to beat the No.1, No.2 and No.3 at the same tournament
- Lifted two titles during 2021 campaign, at Abu Dhabi and Madrid, while was R-Up at Stuttgart. Also reached a further three SFs, including at Wimbledon and US Open
- In doubles, lifted second major at 2021 Australian Open (w/Mertens, d. Krejčíková/Siniakova in F)
- Won final nine matches of 2020 to end the year with back-to-back titles - at Ostrava (d. Azarenka in F) and Linz (d. Mertens in F) - and ranked at No.10. Having also taken home the silverware at Doha (d. Kvitová in F), was one of two players (also Halep) to lift three singles titles during disrupted 2020 season
- Ended as World No.11 for the second straight year in 2019 after capturing three WTA singles titles at Shenzhen (d. Riske in F), Wuhan (d. Riske in F) and Zhuhai (d. Bertens in F)
- Made Top-10 debut on January 28, 2019 following 3r run at 2019 Australian Open
- Ended 2019 at No.2 in WTA doubles rankings after capturing first Grand Slam doubles trophy at US Open (w/Mertens, d. Azarenka/Barty in F). Earlier in the season, the pair claimed the
- Best result of 2025 was reaching second career Tour final at Rabat (l. Joint in F); also achieved her best Grand Slam results with 3r at Australian Open, Roland Garros and US Open. Won her first WTA 125 title at Puerto Vallarta and ended the season at a career high ranking of No.39
- A strong 2024 season began with semifinal at Cluj-Napoca followed by a further three quarterfinals at Charleston, Palermo and Iasi taking her ranking to a career high of No.57 in July
- In 2023 reached semifinal at Prague (l. Hibino) and also WTA 125 semifinals at Bucharest and Rouen
- Suffered knee injury in 2r match at Doha 2022 against Kasatkina and took the next six months off
- Ended 2021 campaign in fine form, reaching SF at Nur-Sultan (l. eventual champion Van Uytvanck), QF at Cluj-Napoca (l. Halep) before finishing R-Up at Linz (l. Riske)
- Broke into Top 100 on November 8, 2021
- Advanced to maiden WTA QF at 2021 St. Petersburg (l. Kuznetsova)
- Season highlight in 2020 was 2r run at Lyon (as qualifier, l. Kenin)

- Struggled with injuries and form throughout 2022 dropping as low as No.83 after 1r exit at US Open
- Best performance came late in the year with SF run in Seoul (l. Ostapenko via ret. w/left glute injury). Also made QF at Stuttgart (l. eventual champion Swiatek) and Washington DC (l. eventual champion Samsonova) with best win-by-ranking coming over No.22 Azarenka during 3r run at Cincinnati

- Won title at \$25k ITF/Pune-IND in 2019
- Lifted first two ITF Circuit titles in 2018, at \$15k ITF/Antalya-TUR and \$15k ITF/Tiberias-GRE
- In Juniors she reached back-to-back quarterfinals at Wimbledon and US Open in 2018

## CAREER MILESTONES
