## DAY 6 – MONDAY, MARCH 9

### [8] Mirra Andreeva (#8) vs. Katerina Siniakova (CZE #44)

First meeting

#### **Andreeva:**

- Making her 3rd appearance at Indian Wells, where she is defending champion (d. Sabalenka in last year's final)
- Attempting to become just the 2nd woman since the event's inauguration in 1989 to claim back-to-back titles at Indian Wells, joining Martina Navratilova (1990-1991)
- Last year, she became the 3rd-youngest woman to win the title at Indian Wells, older only than Martina Hingis in 1998 and Serena Williams in 1999
- Holds a 7-0 record this year vs. players ranked outside the Top 40
- Bested Sierra 6-0, 6-0 in the previous round – she is the first player to win a Tour-level match 6-0, 6-0 this year
- She is also the first woman to win an Indian Wells main-draw match 6-0, 6-0 since Victoria Azarenka defeated Magdalena Rybarikova by that scoreline in 2016

#### **Siniakova:**

- Making 11th appearance at Indian Wells; she has reached the tournament's 3rd round for the 3rd time in her career (also 2017 and last year) but has yet to advance to Round of 16 here
- Her career-best WTA 1000 finishes are 3 QFs, all in China and each time as a qualifier - 2018 Beijing (l. eventual champion Wozniacki), 2018 Wuhan (l. eventual finalist Kontaveit) and 2025 Wuhan (l. eventual finalist Pegula)
- At 3 hours and 28 minutes, Siniakova's 2r win over Fernandez this week is the 2nd-longest Tour-level match of the year (Jacquemot d. Kostyuk in Australian Open 1r in 3 hours and 31 minutes is the longest)
- Owns 10 Tour-level wins in career over Top 10 players, most recently No.6 Zheng Qinwen at 2025 Wimbledon
- Best result by a Czech woman at Indian Wells was runner-up finish by Helena Sukova in 1990

### [32] Maria Sakkari (GRE #34) vs. [2] Iga Swiatek (POL #2)

Tied 4-4

#### **Sakkari:**

- Making 8th main draw appearance at Indian Wells, where she is a 2-time runner-up in 2022 and 2024 – she lost both of those finals in straight sets to today's opponent Swiatek
- Seeking her 5th trip to the Indian Wells Round of 16 after 2018, 2022, 2023 and 2024
- Contesting her 60th career WTA 1000 main draw; she has won one WTA 1000 title at 2023 Guadalajara (d. Dolehide in final) and made 3 additional WTA 1000 finals
- Owns 30 wins in career over Top 10 players, most recently over today's opponent Swiatek at Doha last month
- Trying to notch 3 Top 10 wins in a single season for the first time since 2023 (Sakkari beat both No.2 Swiatek and No.8 Paolini at 2026 Doha)
- Her best result of the year so far is her semifinal finish at WTA 1000 Doha (l. eventual champion Muchova)



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#### ***Swiatek:***

- Making 6th main draw appearance at Indian Wells; she is a two-time Indian Wells champion in 2022 and 2024 (d. today's opponent Sakkari in both finals in straight sets)
- Among active players, only Azarenka (35) has claimed more main draw wins than Swiatek (23) at Indian Wells
- Swiatek could become the first woman to reach the Round of 16 in 6 consecutive years at Indian Wells since Agnieszka Radwanska and Caroline Wozniacki between 2008-2014
- Contesting her 43rd career WTA 1000 main draw; she has won 11 WTA 1000 titles, most recently 2025 Cincinnati (d. Paolini in final)
- Has won 33 of her last 34 matches vs. players ranked outside the Top 20 - the one loss was to today's opponent Sakkari at Doha last month
- Holds a level 4-4 head-to-head vs. Sakkari - Sakkari won their first three meetings before Swiatek won the next four, but Sakkari got the win in their most recent match at 2026 Doha

#### **[28] Marta Kostyuk (UKR #28) vs. [3] Elena Rybakina (KAZ #3)**

**Rybakina leads 3-1**

#### ***Kostyuk:***

- Making 6th Indian Wells showing; her tournament-best finish is 2024 semifinals (l. eventual champion Swiatek)
- Contesting her 40th career WTA 1000 main draw; her career-best WTA 1000 showing is her semifinal run here 2 years ago
- Competing in just her 3rd event of the year; she reached the Brisbane final (l. Sabalenka), then lost 1st round at Australian Open (l. Jacquemot in 3rd-set tiebreak - longest Tour match of the year at 3 hours and 31 minutes)
- Owns 12 wins in career over Top 10 players, most recently posting 3 Top 10 wins en route to 2026 Brisbane final (d. No.3 Anisimova in Round of 16, No.9 Andreeva in quarterfinals and No.6 Pegula in semifinals)
- Trying to become the first Ukrainian woman to make the Round of 16 at Indian Wells in 3 consecutive years

#### ***Rybakina:***

- Making 5th appearance at Indian Wells; she won this title in 2023 (d. Sabalenka in final)
- Seeking her 4th trip to the Indian Wells Round of 16 (also made quarterfinals in 2022 and Round of 16 last year)
- Contesting her 44th career WTA 1000 main draw; she has won 2 WTA 1000 titles at 2023 Indian Wells and 2023 Rome (d. Kalinina in final)
- Has won 15 of her last 16 matches against opponents ranked outside the Top 20, with the one loss coming against No.67 Ruzic via retirement at 2026 Dubai
- 7 of her 12 career WTA Tour-level titles have come on hard court, most recently her 2nd career Grand Slam title at 2026 Australian Open (d. Sabalenka in final)
- Currently this year's Tour leader in aces (116)



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#### [5] Jessica Pegula (USA #5) vs. [26] Jelena Ostapenko (LAT #26)

**Pegula leads 3-2**

##### ***Pegula:***

- Appearing in her 8th Indian Wells main draw; her best tournament result was the quarterfinals in 2021 (l. eventual runner-up Azarenka)
- Indian Wells is one of the three WTA 1000 events she has appeared in without reaching the semifinals, along with Doha and Rome
- Has won four WTA 1000 titles: 2026 Dubai, 2024 Toronto, 2023 Montreal and 2022 Guadalajara
- At this tournament, Pegula could become the first player to reach the semifinal at eight consecutive Tour events appeared in since Maria Sharapova (eight, between Beijing 2012 and Madrid 2013)
- Currently on a 6-match winning streak after claiming the title at 2026 Dubai (d. Svitolina in final)
- Holds a 7-1 record this year vs. players ranked outside the Top 20 (the loss was to No.26 Kostyuk at Brisbane)

##### ***Ostapenko:***

- Making 9th Indian Wells showing; her tournament-best result is 2021 semifinals (l. eventual runner-up Azarenka)
- She is a 3-time WTA 1000 runner-up at 2016 Doha (l. Suarez Navarro in final), 2018 Miami (l. Stephens in final) and 2025 Doha (l. Anisimova in final)
- Owns 25 Tour-level wins in career over Top 10 players, most recently over No.10 Ekaterina Alexandrova at 2026 Doha
- Ostapenko has won 4 of her last 5 matches vs. Top 5 players; she had won four straight before her loss to then-No.5 Paolini at 2025 Rome (Paolini went on to win the title)
- 5 of her 9 career WTA singles titles have come on hard court; her most recent hard-court title is WTA 500 Linz in February 2024 (d. Alexandrova in final)

#### [15] Madison Keys (USA #15) vs. Sonay Kartal (GBR #54)

**Keys leads 1-0**

##### ***Keys:***

- Making 13th main draw appearance at Indian Wells; her tournament-best showing is semifinals last year (l. eventual runner-up Sabalenka), and she also reached quarterfinals in 2022 (l. eventual champion Swiatek)
- Contesting her 87th career WTA 1000 main draw; she has won one WTA 1000 title at 2019 Cincinnati (d. Kuznetsova in final) and reached two additional WTA 1000 finals in 2016
- Has won 9 of her last 10 meetings vs. players ranked outside the Top 50 (5-0 this year); the one loss was to Zarazua in 2025 US Open 1st round
- 5 of her 10 career WTA Tour-level singles titles have come on hard court, most recently her first Grand Slam title at 2025 Australian Open (d. Sabalenka in final)
- Competing in her 4th event of the year; she made Brisbane quarterfinals (l. eventual champion Sabalenka), Adelaide quarterfinals (l. eventual runner-up Mboko) and Australian Open Round of 16 (l. Pegula)



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#### ***Kartal:***

- Making 2nd appearance at Indian Wells; she reached last year's Round of 16 as a lucky loser (l. eventual runner-up Sabalenka), which was her first-ever WTA 1000 main draw appearance
- Contesting her 7th career WTA 1000 main draw; her career-best WTA 1000 result is quarterfinals at Beijing last year (l. eventual runner-up Noskova)
- Her victory over World No.25 Emma Navarro in the previous round was her first Top 25 win of this year
- Owns 4 wins in career over Top 20 players, most recently over No.5 Andreeva at 2025 Beijing (which was also her first career Top 10 win)
- Attempting to become the first British woman to reach the Indian Wells R16 more than once
- Her best results so far this season are quarterfinal finishes at Auckland (l. eventual champion Svitolina) and Abu Dhabi (l. eventual champion Bejlek)

### PLAYER NOTES

- Making her 3rd appearance at Indian Wells, where she returns as the defending champion (d. Sabalenka in last year's final)
- Attempting to become just the 2nd woman since the event's inauguration in 1989 to claim back-to-back titles at Indian Wells after Martina Navratilova (1990-1991)
- Last year's title here was part of a 13-match winning streak, during which she won her first two WTA 1000 titles consecutively at Dubai and Indian Wells
- Her 2025 Dubai title made her the youngest WTA 1000 champion since this tournament tier began in 2009
- Last year she became the 3rd-youngest player to win the Indian Wells title, older only than Martina Hingis in 1998 and Serena Williams in 1999
- Contesting her 21st career WTA 1000 main draw
- After 1r bye, defeated Solana Sierra in 2r by 6-0, 6-0; it was her 100th career Tour-level match-win
- Andreeva is the first player this year to win a Tour-level match 6-0, 6-0
- Faces No.44 Katerina Siniakova in 3r today; Andreeva is 7-0 this year vs. players ranked outside Top 40
- Owns 14-4 career Tour-level record against players from Czech Republic (2-0 in 2026; d. Noskova at Brisbane and d. Bouzkova at Adelaide)
- 3 of her 4 career WTA singles titles have come on hard court (2025 Dubai, 2025 Indian Wells and 2026 Adelaide)
- Is currently ranked No.8; this time last year was ranked No.11. Reached career-high ranking of No.5 in July of last year
- Holds a 12-4 win-loss record so far this year, with top result of 2026 being Adelaide title run (d. Mboko in F)

- Contesting her 71st career WTA 1000 main draw; her career-best WTA 1000 finishes are 3 QFs, all in China and each time as a qualifier - 2018 Beijing (l. eventual champion Wozniacki), 2018 Wuhan (l. eventual finalist Kontaveit) and 2025 Wuhan (l. eventual finalist Pegula)
- Defeated Top 50 players Sofia Kenin and No.27 seed Leylah Fernandez to return to 3r
- At 3 hours and 28 minutes, Siniakova's 2r win over Fernandez is the 2nd-longest Tour-level match of the year (Jacquemot d. Kostyuk in Australian Open 1r in 3 hours and 31 minutes is the longest)
- Faces No.8 Mirra Andreeva in 3r today; owns 10 Tour-level wins in career over Top 10 players, most recently No.6 Zheng Qinwen at 2025 Wimbledon
- 3 of her 5 career WTA singles titles have come on hard court: 2017 Shenzhen, 2022 Portoroz and 2023 Nanchang
- One of 3 players from Czech Republic to reach 3r (also No.13 seed Muchova and No.14 seed Noskova)
- Last time 3 or more players from Czech Republic reached 3r at Indian Wells was 2023 (6 Czechs made 3r that year)
- Best result by a Czech player at Indian Wells was R-Up finish by Helena Sukova in 1990 (the 2nd edition of the tournament)
- Is currently ranked No.44; this time last year was ranked No.59. Reached career-high singles ranking of No.27 in June 2024
- Has also spent 180 weeks in her career ranked WTA Doubles World No.1, 3rd-most behind only Martina Navratilova (237 weeks) and Liezel Huber (199 weeks); currently ranked No.3 in doubles

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## CAREER MILESTONES

- In 2025 won two WTA 1000 titles back-to-back at Dubai and Indian Wells - becoming the youngest WTA 1000 champion since the tournament tier began in 2009 at 17-years-old. Made her Top 10 debut in February before breaking into the Top 5 for the first time in July
  - Won maiden WTA doubles title in 2025 with Diana Shnaider at Brisbane, followed by a second title at Miami and finished the 2025 season making her WTA Finals debut in doubles with Shnaider
  - Reached first two WTA finals of career in 2024 winning the title at Iasi and finishing runner-up at Ningbo
  - Made first Grand Slam semifinal at 2024 Roland Garros beating World No.2 Aryna Sabalenka in the quarterfinals
  - Made Top 20 debut on October 8, 2024 finishing the year at World No.16; also won 2024 Paris Olympic silver medal in women's doubles with Diana Shnaider
  - Opened 2023 season in April by winning 13 matches straight to claim back-to-back ITF titles in Switzerland; as WC, advanced to R16 at Madrid with wins over Fernandez, Haddad Maia and Linette (l. Sabalenka); subsequently made debut at Roland Garros (as qualifier, l. Gauff in 3r), Wimbledon (as qualifier, l. Keys in R16) and US Open (l. eventual champion Gauff in 2r)
  - Also in 2023 reached R16 at Beijing (l. Rybakina), leading to Top 50 debut (started season just inside Top 300); voted WTA Newcomer of the Year
  - In 2022, posted 39-9 win-loss record on ITF Circuit, winning first four titles at this level
  - Fell in 1r on WTA main draw debut at 2022 Monastir (as WC, l. Potapova)
  - Made professional debut at W15 ITF Circuit event at Sharm El-Sheikh in February 2022
  - Owns six ITF Circuit singles titles
  - As a junior, finished R-Up at 2023 Australian Open (l. Korneeva)
  - Singles highlights of 2025 included semifinals at Cluj-Napoca and Seoul as well as quarterfinals at WTA 1000 Wuhan (as a qualifier) and Prague; at WTA 125 level earned a title at Warsaw
- In doubles in 2025 won a 10th Grand Slam trophy at Australian Open (w/Townsend), followed by a maiden Grand Slam mixed doubles title at Wimbledon (w/Verbeek). Also won trophies at Wuhan (w/Hunter), Seoul (w/Krejciikova) and Dubai (w/Townsend). Finished the 2025 season ranked PIF Doubles World No.1 for a fifth time (2018, 2021, 2022, 2024), now equal Martina Navratilova for the most year-end No.1 finishes in WTA history
- Reached two WTA singles finals in 2024, at Cleveland and Guangzhou; additionally, champion at WTA 125 event at Lleida (d. Sherif in F). 

- In 2025, reached QF at WTA 500 events in Linz and Washington D.C.; notched Top 10 win over No.6 Paolini to make R16 at WTA 1000 Madrid

# MATCH NOTES

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## CAREER MILESTONES

- Won two singles titles in 2025, including maiden Grand Slam title at Australian Open becoming the oldest first-time Australian Open champion at 29 years old, and the player with the longest gap between their first two major finals in the Open Era (US Open 2017). Returned to a career-high ranking of No.7, then broke into the Top 5 for the first time in February
  - In 2025 also qualified for the WTA Finals for the second time in her career after 2016
  - In 2024, won eighth career title at Strasbourg (d. Collins in F dropping only three games). Reached SF at Madrid (l. eventual champion Swiatek) and Eastbourne (l. Fernandez), and another QF at Rome (l. eventual champion Swiatek). At Grand Slams, reached 4r at Wimbledon (l. Paolini, retired in 3r set due to left thigh injury), made 3r at Roland Garros (l. Navarro) and US Open (l. Mertens)
  - In 2023, won seventh career title at Eastbourne (d. Kasatkina in F), reached SF at US Open and reached four QFs including Wimbledon; also qualified for WTA Elite Trophy in Zhuhai (0-2 in group play)
  - At 2022 Adelaide, won first title in over two years (d. Riske in F), followed by SF run at Australian Open - best Slam showing since 2018
  - Other highlights in 2022 were SF at Cincinnati and two further QF runs, including at Indian Wells
  - In Grand Slam play, 2021 season was highlighted by R16 run at Wimbledon (l. Golubic). Finished campaign inside Top 100 for ninth successive year, but outside Top 20 for first time since 2014
  - Ended 2020 ranked No.16, with best result being R-Up finish at Brisbane (l. Ka. Pliskova)
  - Lifted biggest title of career during 2019 season at WTA 1000 Cincinnati (d. Kuznetsova in F); afterwards returned to Top 10 for first time since week of June 25, 2018
  - Also won title at Charleston (d. Wozniacki) and reached QF at 2019 Roland Garros (l. Barty), one of three Americans to make last eight (also Anisimova and Stephens) - the first time since 2004 (Capriati, S.Williams and V.Williams)  
Reached three SFs in 2018 at Charleston, Roland Garros and US Open
  - Reached first Grand Slam final in 2017 at US Open, losing to Sloane Stephens in 10th all-American final in the Open Era. At 22, became the youngest Flushing Meadows finalist since 19-year-old Caroline Wozniacki lost to Kim Clijsters in 2009 Also in 2017, won third WTA title at Stanford (d. Vandeweghe)
  - In 2025, made first career Grand Slam R16 at home major of Wimbledon (l. Pavlyuchenkova). Also reached Indian Wells R16 in first career WTA 1000 main draw appearance (as LL, l. Sabalenka), eventually following up with first WTA 1000 QF at Beijing (l. Noskova); peaked at career-high ranking of No.44 on July 14
  - Breakthrough year in 2024 saw her win first title at Monastir and reach 3r at Wimbledon as a qualifier. Her ranking entered the Top 100 for the first time and peaked at No.85 by year-end
- In 2023 reached main draw at Nottingham as a qualifier
- Played first WTA main draw matches in 2022 on grass at Nottingham and Wimbledon
  - Began on the ITF circuit in 2019 and won her first ITF titles in 2021 at W15 Antalya and W15 Monastir

- Enjoyed first Top 10 year-end finish in 2016 (at No.8), was youngest player in Top 20; won second title at Birmingham (d. Strycova) and reached final at Rome (l. S.Williams) and Montreal (l. Halep)
- Broke into Top 10 on June 20 as first American to make Top 10 debut since S.Williams in 1999
- Made WTA Finals debut at Singapore in 2016, going 1-2 in round-robin play
- Represented USA at 2016 Rio Olympics, reaching SF (l. Bronze medal match to Petra Kvitova)
- Qualified for WTA Elite Trophy Zhuhai in 2015, 2018-19; went 1-1 in round-robin stage on all three appearances, with best result SF run in 2018 (withdrew before match vs. Muguruza w/left knee injury)
- Advanced to maiden major SF at 2015 Australian Open (l. eventual champion S.Williams); broke into Top 20 following conclusion of tournament, on February 2
- Also in 2015, won second career title at Charleston and reached QF at Wimbledon
- Won first career title at 2014 Eastbourne (d. No.9 Kerber in F); was second-youngest player to win a WTA title in 2014, (after Vekic at Kuala Lumpur); also, youngest American to win a title since Vania King in October 2006 (17y 254d at Bangkok)
- Made Billie Jean King Cup debut for USA in 2014
- Broke into Top 100 at beginning of 2013 season and finished the year No.39; highlights were SF at Osaka, QFs at Sydney, Charleston and Birmingham and 3r at Australian Open and Wimbledon
- Earned first Top 20 win over No.17 Lucie Safarova while ranked No.135 at 2013 Sydney; then earned first Top 10 win over No.5 Na Li as LL at Madrid
- In 2012, reached 2r at Miami and played main draw at Australian Open, Memphis and Cincinnati; also won two titles on ITF circuit
- Earned first Grand Slam win at 2011 US Open (d. Craybas, l. Safarova in 2r), also played main draw at Miami and contested qualifying at Indian Wells
- Won first title on ITF circuit at 2010 \$10k/ITF Cleveland, OH, USA; also contested qualifying at US Open in 2010
- Made professional debut in 2009 and Tour-level debut at 2009 Ponte Vedra Beach (as WC, d. Kudryavtseva, l. No.10 Nadia Petrova); was seventh youngest player to win a WTA main draw match at 14y 48d and youngest since Hingis in 1994
