[1] Aryna Sabalenka (#1) vs. [10] Victoria Mboko (CAN #10)

Sabalenka leads 1-0

Sabalenka:

- Making 7th appearance at Indian Wells; she is a two-time finalist here, finishing runner-up last year (l. Andreeva) and in 2023 (l. Rybakina)
- Has won 9 career WTA 1000 titles, including two last year at Madrid (d. Gauff in F) and Miami (d. Pegula in F); Only Serena Williams (13), Iga Swiatek (11) and Victoria Azarenka (10) have won more WTA 1000 titles
- Contesting her 60th career WTA 1000 main draw; after 1r bye, has defeated Himeno Sakatsume, Jaqueline Cristian and Naomi Osaka so far this week to reach her 31st career WTA 1000 quarterfinal
- Won the only previous career meeting against Victoria Mboko at Australian Open earlier this season
- Sabalenka is 5-1 vs. Top 20 players this year; the one loss was to Rybakina in the Australian Open F
- 19 of her 22 career Tour-level titles have come on hard court, including each of her 4 Grand Slam titles
- Is the first player to reach the quarter-finals in 14 consecutive WTA-level events appeared in since Justine Henin (25 quarter-finals in a row between Charleston 2006 and Miami 2008) - excluding the WTA Finals
- With a win today, would mark the 4th consecutive year the No.1 seed has reached the semifinals at Indian Wells and would be the first time that happened since 1998
- Will hold the No.1 ranking after Indian Wells

Mboko:

- Making her Indian Wells tournament debut
- She is the first player to enter the tournament's main draw as a Top 10 seed on debut since 2021, when Iga Swiatek (No.2) and Barbora Krejckova (No.3) did so
- Including R16 win over No.6 Anisimova, now has four Top 10 wins in 2026, a mark equaled by only Jessica Pegula
- Has won one WTA 1000 title, captured on home soil at Montreal 2025 as an 18-year-old wild card (d. Osaka in F)
- She reached her 2nd career WTA 1000 final last month at Doha (l. Muchova in F)
- Contesting just her 7th career WTA 1000 main draw (made WTA 1000 main draw debut last year at Miami)
- Is the fourth Canadian to reach the quarterfinals in women's singles at Indian Wells (and second youngest after Andreescu)
- Has won 16 Tour-level matches this year, tied for 2nd-most on Tour (Svitolina currently leads the Tour in match-wins, 17)
- If neither Belinda Bencic, Karolina Muchova nor Linda Noskova with the title, Mboko is projected to reach a career-high ranking of No.9

Rybakina leads 4-3

Pegula:

- Appearing in her 8th Indian Wells main draw; has equaled her best tournament result (also QF in 2021, l. eventual runner-up Azarenka)
- Indian Wells is one of the three WTA 1000 events she has appeared in without reaching the semifinals, along with Doha and Rome
- Has won four WTA 1000 titles: 2026 Dubai, 2024 Toronto, 2023 Montreal and 2022 Guadalajara
- Currently on an 8-match win streak after claiming the title at WTA 1000 Dubai last month (d. Svitolina in final)
- Pegula is 8-1 vs. Top 20 players this year (the one loss was to eventual champion Rybakina in the Australian Open semifinals)
- At this tournament, Pegula could become the first player to reach the semifinal at eight consecutive Tour events appeared in since Maria Sharapova (eight, between Beijing 2012 and Madrid 2013)
- Among American players, only Serena Williams (30) has reached more QFs at WTA 1000 events than Jessica Pegula (23), since the format's introduction in 2009
- Since the Tier format's introduction in 1990, only three players have a higher win rate at Tier I/WTA-1000 events than Jessica Pegula (75.0%, 45-15) after turning 30 – Serena Williams (86.6%), Martina Navratilova (78.4%) and Mary Pierce (76.0%)
- With a win today would surpass Coco Gauff as the top-ranked American; Pegula is projected to remain in the Top 5 after Indian Wells (No.5 with QF, No.4 with SF or F or No.3 with title)

Rybakina:

- Making 5th appearance at Indian Wells; she won the title in 2023 (d. Sabalenka in final) and made quarterfinals in 2022 (l. eventual runner-up Sakkari)
- Contesting her 44th career WTA 1000 main draw; she has won 2 WTA 1000 titles at 2023 Indian Wells and 2023 Rome (d. Kalinina in final)
- Owns 15 wins at Indian Wells, her most at a single WTA Tour event during her career (excluding Grand Slams)
- Currently this year's Tour leader in total aces (123)
- Has reached a 19th career QF at WTA 1000 events, with 17 of those now coming on hard court
- Looking to reach her 12th SF at WTA 1000 events; since 2023 Indian Wells where Rybakina reached her first WTA-1000 SF, only Iga Swiatek (15) has managed more in such events
- Elena Rybakina (76.5%, 26-8) trails just three active players (minimum 10 matches) for combined win rate at Indian Wells and Miami – Iga Swiatek, Bianca Andreescu and Victoria Azarenka
- Has a chance to move to No.2 in the PIF WTA Rankings this week; will need to finish one round better than Swiatek to do so

[14] Linda Noskova (CZE #14) vs. [Q] Talia Gibson (AUS #112)

First meeting

Noskova:

- Has reached QF for the first time at Indian Wells in her 4th appearance; previously made 3rd round in 2023 (l. Gauff) and 2024 (l. eventual champion Swiatek)
- This is her third WTA 1000 QF after her runner-up finish at Beijing last year (l. Anisimova in final) and QF at Dubai 2025 (l. eventual R-Up Tauson)
- Her last defeat to a player ranked outside the Top 100 was to No.176 Bianca Andreescu at 2024 Wimbledon
- Last loss to a player ranked outside Top 100 on hard court was in final at Prague in 2023 (l. No.136 Nao Hibino)
- Is 2-0 against players from Australia this season with wins over Preston at Australian Open and Joint at Doha
- Owns one career title (2024 Monterrey) and reached an additional five finals – all on hard court
- Best result by a Czech woman at Indian Wells was runner-up finish by Helena Sukova in 1990 (the second edition of the tournament)
- Would make Top 10 debut with Indian Wells title (No.14 with QF, No.13 with SF, No.11 with F, No.9 or 10 with title)

Gibson:

- Making her Indian Wells debut in her first WTA 1000 main draw
- Her R16 win over No.7 Jasmine Paolini was her first meeting and first win against a Top 10 player
- This is first Tour level quarterfinal after previously reaching R16 once before at 2025 Cleveland (as a qualifier)
- Is the first qualifier to reach Indian Wells quarterfinals since Lesia Tsurenko in 2015 (l. eventual runner-up Jankovic in quarterfinals)
- Since 2009, she is the fourth qualifier to claim three Top 20 wins at a WTA 1000 event after Simona Halep (Rome 2013), Caroline Garcia (Cincinnati 2022) and Anna Kalinskaya (Dubai 2024)
- In the past two decades, she is the third Australian to claim 3+ Top 20 wins at a single event, after Samantha Stosur and Ashleigh Barty, who last achieved the feat in 2022 (Adelaide 1)
- Best result by Australia at Indian Wells was R-Up finish by qualifier Jenny Byrne in 1989 (inaugural edition)
- With a win would be 14th player to reach the semifinals at a WTA 1000 event as a qualifier; twice has a qualifier reached the final of a WTA 1000 – Caroline Garcia (Won, 2022 Cincinnati) and Anna Kalinskaya (R-Up, Dubai)
- Will make Top 100 debut after Indian Wells and could climb as high as No.55 if she reaches the semifinals
- With a win would become the second player ranked outside the Top 100 to reach the Indian Wells semifinals

Swiatek leads 4-1

Svitolina:

- This is her 12th Indian Wells main draw appearance; bidding to equal her best result at this tournament having previously reached the 2019 semifinals (l. eventual champion Andreescu)
- She is a 4-time WTA 1000 champion, winning titles at 2017 Dubai, 2017 Toronto and 2017-2018 Rome
- Last month at Dubai, she made her first WTA 1000 final since 2018 (l. Pegula in final)
- Leads the Tour in number of match-wins this season with 18
- Began the season with 10 straight match-wins, winning the Auckland title (d. Wang Xinyu in final) and reaching semifinals at Australian Open (l. Sabalenka)
- Elina Svitolina has a 10-14 record against Top 2 opponents, the last win over a Top 2 was defeating today's opponent Iga Swiatek at Wimbledon 2023
- With a win today would become the oldest player to defeat a Top 2 player at Indian Wells since Flavia Pennetta in 2015
- With a win today would reach SF at Indian Wells for the second time in her career after a gap of seven years (2019); would equal the longest gap between the first two semifinals for any player at this event along with Li Na between 2007 and 2014 (7 years)
- Began the season with a 10-match winning streak, winning title at Auckland and reaching SF at Australian Open
- Currently ranked No.9, she returned to the Top 10 this season for the first time since October 2021; projected to move to No.8 in PIF WTA Rankings after Indian Wells unless Mboko wins title; if Svitolina reaches the final would move to No.7

Swiatek:

- A two-time Indian Wells champion in 2022 and 2024, is making 6th main draw appearance at Indian Wells
- Among active players, only Azarenka (35) has claimed more main draw wins than Swiatek (25) at Indian Wells
- Win over Muchova (R16) was her first Top 20 win of 2026 (previously 0-3 vs. Top 20)
- Contesting her 43rd career WTA 1000 main draw; she has won 11 WTA 1000 titles, most recently 2025 Cincinnati (d. Paolini in final)
- Iga Swiatek is the third player to reach QF in Indian Wells in five consecutive editions of the event (2022-2026) after Lindsay Davenport (1993-1998) and Martina Hingis (1998-2002).
- Indian Wells is now one of the three events where Iga Swiatek has claimed 25+ main draw wins, along with Roland Garros (40) and the Australian Open (26).
- Iga Swiatek has reached the quarterfinals in 62.8% (27/43) of WTA-1000 events she has appeared in - the highest rate of any player since the format introduction in 2009 (min. 10 appearances).
- Iga Swiatek is the third-youngest player to reach 20 WTA 1000 hard court QFs since the format's introduction in 2009, older only than Agnieszka Radwanska and Caroline Wozniacki.



CAREER MILESTONES

- Went 16-3 on clay at Tour-level events in 2025, including her 18th career title at Rouen, Madrid SF, Rome QF and Roland Garros QF; also made Australian Open QF (l. eventual champion Keys)
- Achieved runner-up in her opening tournament of 2024 at Auckland (l. Gauff in F) before finishing R16 at Australian Open (l. Noskova, retired due to low back injury). Reached QF at Wimbledon (l. Rybakina), 4r at Roland Garros (l. Rybakina) and 3r at US Open (l. Gauff). Ended season after US Open
- Returned to the Tour in April 2023, following birth of daughter Skai. Won Strasbourg (d. Blinkova) for a second time (also in 2020) before achieving Grand Slam results of QF at Roland Garros (l. Sabalenka) and SF at Wimbledon (l. eventual champion Vondrousova)
- 2022 season reached 3r at Australian Open (l. Azarenka) and QF at Monterrey (l. Osorio), before going on maternity leave in spring
- Highlight of 2021 was lifting 16th career title at Chicago [250]. Also made SF at Miami, Stuttgart and the Olympics (won bronze medal)
- Won her 14th and 15th titles in 2020, firstly at Monterrey (d. Bouzkova in F) and then Strasbourg (d. Rybakina in F). Contested her 30th consecutive major at 2020 Australian Open (streak ended by missing 2020 US Open)
- In 2019, made first two Grand Slam SFs of career at Wimbledon (l. eventual champion Halep) and US Open (l. S.Williams). Became the first woman from Ukraine to reach a major SF (on the men's, Andrei Medvedev made that stage at 1993 and 1999 Roland Garros, finishing runner-up in 1999)
- Also in 2019, made Australian Open QF and reached the title match as defending champion at the Shiseido WTA Finals (l. Barty)
- In 2018, won 13th - and most prestigious - career title at 2018 WTA Finals (d. Stephens in F), after going 3-0 during round robin stage. Ended year ranked No.4. Also won titles at Rome (as defending champion, d. No.1 Halep in F), Dubai (as defending champion, d. Kasatkina in F) and Brisbane (d. Sasnovich in F)
- Enjoyed standout 2017, finishing year at No.6, winning a tour-leading five titles and posting second-most wins (53, behind Wozniacki with 60). Season culminated by qualifying for WTA Finals in Singapore, becoming first Ukrainian woman to qualify for the season-ending tournament in singles (fell at round robin stage with 1-2 record)
- Won three singles titles in 2025, including her first Wimbledon title (her 6th Grand Slam title overall), Cincinnati and Seoul; finished at World No.2 for the second straight season

- Won her maiden Tour-level title at 2020 Roland-Garros without dropping a set, becoming the first player from Poland - man or woman - to win a Grand Slam singles title and first from her country to reach a major final since Agnieszka Radwanska at 2012 Wimbledon
