[26] Sorana Cirstea (ROU #27) vs. [13] Linda Noskova (CZE #13)

Tied 2-2

Cirstea:

- Making 8th appearance at Rome and is into R16 for the 3rd time; she also posted R16 finishes in 2024 (l. Keys) and 2012 (l. Kvitova)
- This is her 94th career WTA 1000 main draw; her career-best WTA 1000 result is finishing runner-up at 2013 Toronto (l. S. Williams in F)
- Defeated Aryna Sabalenka in previous round for her first win over a reigning World No.1 – the 36-year-old became the oldest player to defeat the WTA Rankings World No.1 on clay (since WTA Rankings started being published in 1975)
- Holds an 8-2 clay-court record in 2026, making Madrid 3r (l. Gauff), Linz QF (l. eventual champion M. Andreeva) and Rouen SF (gave walkover to eventual R-Up Podrez, the walkover does not count as a loss)
- Won her 4th career WTA singles title earlier this year at Cluj-Napoca (d. Raducanu in F)
- Has won 23 Tour-level matches this year, 6th-most on Tour in 2026

Noskova:

- Making 4th appearance at Rome and is into R16 for the first time
- Her previous best tournament results were R32 in 2024 (l. Zheng Qinwen) and 2025 (l. M. Andreeva)
- Contesting her 27th career WTA 1000 main draw; her best WTA 1000 result is R-Up finish at Beijing last year (l. Anisimova in F)
- Seeking her 5th career WTA 1000 QF and second on clay (made QF at Madrid 2026, l. eventual champion Kostyuk)
- Best career Tour-level result on clay is SF which she reached at Prague in 2024 (l. eventual champion Linette)
- Best result this season so far is reaching SF at WTA 1000 Indian Wells (l. eventual champion Sabalenka)
- Holds a 13-5 Tour-level record this year vs. players ranked outside the Top 20

[3] Coco Gauff (USA #4) vs. [16] Iva Jovic (USA #17)

First meeting

Gauff:

- Making 7th appearance at Rome, where she finished runner-up last year (l. Paolini in F)
- Gauff's 19 career match-wins at this tournament is the most she has claimed at a single WTA-level event in her career (excluding Grand Slams)
- Has won 3 WTA 1000 titles in her career, at 2023 Cincinnati (d. Muchova in F), 2024 Beijing (d. Muchova in F) and 2025 Wuhan (d. Pegula in F)
- Seeking her 24th career WTA 1000 QF, and 3rd of this year – she was 2026 Miami R-Up (l. Sabalenka in F) and made 2026 Dubai SF (l. eventual R-Up Svitolina)
- 2 of her 11 career WTA singles titles have come on clay, at 2025 Roland Garros (d. Sabalenka in F) and 2021 Parma (d. Wang Qiang in F)
- On clay so far this year, Gauff made Stuttgart QF (l. eventual R-Up Muchova) and Madrid R16 (l. Noskova)

Jovic:

- Making her Rome tournament debut
- Contesting her 9th career WTA 1000 main draw, and is seeking her first WTA 1000 QF of career
- Has notched one Top 10 win in her career, over No.8 Jasmine Paolini in 2026 Australian Open 3r (0-3 vs. Top 10 players since then – two losses to Pegula and one to Sabalenka)
- Her career-best Tour-level result on clay is her Charleston SF run earlier this year (l. eventual champion Pegula)
- This is her 3rd clay-court event of the season; she also made 3r at Madrid (l. Fernandez)
- Has won 21 Tour-level matches so far this year, tied for 8th-most on Tour (level with today's opponent Gauff)
- Playing a fellow American for the 3rd straight round (d. Kessler and Townsend in the previous rounds)

Karolina Pliskova (CZE #130) vs. [2] Elena Rybakina (KAZ #2)

Rybakina leads 4-0

Pliskova:

- Making 10th appearance at Rome, and her first tournament appearance since 2023 (l. opener to Bondar that year)
- Pliskova made 3 consecutive finals here – she is the 2019 Rome champion (d. Konta in F), and she was also the runner-up in 2020 (l. Halep in F via ret.) and 2021 (l. Swiatek in F)
- She is a 2-time WTA 1000 champion: 2016 Cincinnati (d. Kerber in F) and 2019 Rome (d. Konta in F)
- Holds a 9-2 record on clay this year, making WTA 1000 Madrid QF (l. Potapova) and Linz QF (l. Vekic)
- Owns 39 Tour-level wins in career over Top 10 players, most recently No.4 Amanda Anisimova at 2026 Doha (via ret.)
- Her 2019 victory is the most recent Rome title by a Czech
- Achieved World No.1 ranking for the first time in July 2017 and held the top ranking for a total of 8 weeks

Rybakina:

- Making 5th appearance at Rome; she lifted the title here in 2023 (d. Kalinina in F via retirement)
- Owns two WTA 1000 titles, both won in 2023 at Rome and Indian Wells (d. Sabalenka in F)
- Leads the Tour this year in number of main draw match-wins with 29
- She has also hit the most aces of any player this year with 236 (the only player to hit more than 200 aces this season)
- She is 8-1 so far this season on clay, picking up her 13th career WTA title at Stuttgart (d. Muchova in F) and R16 run at Madrid (l. Potapova)
- 5 of her 13 career WTA titles have come on clay court: Stuttgart in 2026; Strasbourg in 2025; Stuttgart in 2024; Rome in 2023; Bucharest in 2019
- Rybakina's most recent loss to a player ranked outside the Top 100 was to fellow Grand Slam champion Bianca Andreescu here in Rome last year

[7] Elina Svitolina (UKR #10) vs. [LL] Nikola Bartunkova (CZE #94)

First meeting

Svitolina:

- Making 12th appearance at Rome, where she won back-to-back titles in 2017 and 2018 (d. Halep in both finals)
- Contesting her 91st appearance in a WTA 1000 main draw, and she has won 4 WTA 1000 titles
- Along with her two Rome titles, her other WTA 1000 titles occurred at 2017 Dubai and 2017 Toronto (d. Wozniacki in both of those finals)
- Has reached the Rome R16 for the 7th time, and she has a 5-1 win-loss record in Rome R16 matches (the one loss was to eventual R-Up Sabalenka in 2024, in a 3rd-set tiebreak)
- Holds a 13-1 record in Tour-level matches this year vs. players ranked outside the Top 50 (the 1 loss was to No.63 Bondar at Madrid)
- Has won 24 Tour-level matches so far in 2026, 5th-most on Tour this year
- This year, she returned to the Top 10 of the PIF WTA Rankings for the first time since October 2021

Bartunkova:

- Making tournament debut at Rome, and competing in her first career WTA 1000 main draw
- As a lucky loser, defeated Tyra Caterina Grant and Madison Keys in the main draw so far this week – her first WTA 1000 main draw match-wins, and her first career clay-court Tour-level wins
- Seeking her 2nd career Top 10 win, having defeated No.10 Bencic at 2026 Australian Open
- Aiming to become the first lucky loser to make the Rome QF since Tier I/WTA 1000 events began in 1990
- Contesting her 4th Tour-level main draw of 2026; this year she made Ostrava QF (I. Parry), Austin R16 (I. eventual R-Up Townsend), and 3r on her Grand Slam main draw debut at Australian Open (I. Mertens)
- Made her Top 100 debut on March 30 of this year - one of 8 players to make their PIF WTA Rankings Top 100 debut in 2026

[15] Naomi Osaka (JPN #16) vs. [4] Iga Swiatek (POL #3)

Swiatek leads 2-1

Osaka:

- Making 7th appearance at Rome, where her previous best tournament result is QF in 2019
- She has made the Rome R16 for the third straight year
- She is a 2-time WTA 1000 champion, winning titles at 2018 Indian Wells (d. Kasatkina in F) and 2019 Beijing (d. Barty in F)
- Looking to reach her 13th career QF at a WTA 1000 event - and third on clay after Madrid and Rome in 2019
- Seeking her first WTA 1000 QF since Montreal last season, where she eventually reached the final (I. Mboko)
- Bidding to earn first Top 10 win on clay - Osaka is 0-7 on clay against Top 10 opponents, with five of those matches going to a deciding set (including vs. today's opponent Swiatek at 2024 Roland Garros)
- Career-best Tour-level result on clay is SF at 2019 Stuttgart
- Her best finish of the year so far is R16 at both Indian Wells and Madrid (I. Sabalenka on both occasions)

Swiatek:

- Making 7th appearance at Rome; she is a three-time champion at this event, winning titles in 2024 (d. Sabalenka in F), 2022 (d. Jabeur in F) and 2021 (d. Pliskova in F)
- She has won 11 WTA 1000 titles in her career (4 of those on clay); her most recent WTA 1000 title is 2025 Cincinnati on hard court (d. Paolini in F)
- Contesting her 3rd clay-court event of the year; she made 3r at Madrid last week (retired vs. Li due to illness), and reached Stuttgart QF (I. Andreeva)
- Could claim a 24th match-win at Rome – since the WTA 1000 format's introduction in 2009, only Victoria Azarenka (27) will have claimed more wins at this event
- 10 of her 25 career WTA singles titles have come on clay; her most recent clay-court title is her 4th Roland Garros title in 2024 (d. Paolini in F)
- Since the WTA 1000 format was introduced in 2009, only Serena Williams (5) has claimed more clay-court WTA 1000 titles than Swiatek (4, level with Sharapova)

CAREER MILESTONES

- In 2025, won Cleveland title as qualifier (first WTA Tour singles final since 2021; d. Li in final) en route to tenth straight Top 100 year-end finish in singles; also won her biggest career doubles title at WTA 1000 Madrid (w/Kalinskaya)
- Highlights of 2024 came in the Middle East, making QF at Abu Dhabi and saving six match points in her Dubai QF match against Vondrousova to reach SF (l. eventual champion Paolini). Ended her 2024 season after Wimbledon to undergo foot surgery
- 2023 saw her best results achieved in the USA: advanced to Indian Wells QF for first time (l. Swiatek), then made SF at Miami (l. eventual champion Kvitova) and QF at US Open (l. Muchova)
- In 2022, reached SF on all three surfaces: hard court at Lyon (l. Yastremska), clay at Istanbul (l. Kudermetova), and grass at Birmingham (l. Zhang). Also enjoyed success at the Australian Open, where she fell in R16 (l. Swiatek)
- Highlight of 2021 was ending near-13-year wait for 2nd WTA Tour singles title, triumphing at Istanbul (d. Mertens in F). Also finished R-Up at Strasbourg (l. Krejckikova), reached QF at Grampians Trophy and Portoroz, and R16 at Roland Garros
- Ended 2020 by winning singles title at ITF/\$100K Dubai-UAE in December (d. Siniakova in F). Also in 2020, reached 3r at US Open and advanced to 2r at Australian Open
- In 2019, advanced to fourth career Tour singles final at Tashkent (l. Van Uytvanck); also captured fifth career Tour doubles title at 2019 Lugano (w/Mitu, d. Kudermetova/Voskoboeva in F)
- Reached R16 at 2017 Australian Open - first time advancing to that stage at a Slam since she made 2009 Roland Garros QF (l. Stosur)
- In 2016, played a mix of WTA and ITF events, improving ranking by 163 ranking places to No.81 on comeback from shoulder injury, with highlights being a SF run at Rio de Janeiro (l. Rogers) and making QF at Madrid (as wildcard, l. eventual R-Up Cibulkova) and Mallorca (as qualifier, l. Jankovic)
- Reached biggest singles final of career at 2013 Toronto - posted three Top 10 wins en route to final (No.10 Wozniacki, No.7 Kvitova and No.5 Li) before falling to No.1 S. Williams. Following Toronto run, posted career-high ranking of No.21 on August 21, 2013
- Won first WTA singles title at 2008 Tashkent (d. Lisicki in F)

- Claimed five titles in 2024, making it a three-peat at Roland-Garros and also winning Doha, Indian Wells, Madrid and Rome. Crossed \$30m in prize money and qualified for her fourth WTA Finals
- Won six titles across 2023, including winning fourth Grand Slam title at Roland-Garros (d. Muchova in F) and going undefeated at the WTA Finals in Cancun (d. Pegula in F). Finished season as WTA World No.1 player for second consecutive year.
- In 2022, lifted second and third Grand Slam titles, at Roland-Garros (d. Gauff in F) and US Open (d. Jabeur in F). Triumph in Paris was the last of six straight titles during 37-match winning streak - joint-longest unbeaten run on Tour since 1990
- Won two titles in 2021, at Adelaide and Rome. Other highlights included QF at Roland-Garros and SF at Ostrava and qualifying for WTA Finals Guadalajara (fell in group stage). Also finished doubles R-Up at 2021 Roland-Garros (w/Mattek-Sands, l. Krejciikova/Siniakova)
- Won her maiden Tour-level title at 2020 Roland-Garros without dropping a set, becoming the first player from Poland - man or woman - to win a Grand Slam singles title and first from her country to reach a major final since Agnieszka Radwanska at 2012 Wimbledon
- Ranked No.54, she became the lowest-ranked woman to win the Roland-Garros title in the Open Era and the lowest-ranked finalist since 1977 (No.56 Mihai). At 19y 132d, is the youngest champion in Paris since Monica Seles (18y 187d) in 1992
- Also became the first player to win her debut Tour-level title at a Grand Slam since Jelena Ostapenko at 2017 Roland-Garros
- Won WTA Most Improved Player of the Year for 2020, as voted on by members of the media. Also won the 2020 WTA Fan Favorite Award
- Ended 2019 season ranked No.61 after a campaign highlighted by R-Up finish at Lugano (l. Hercog) and R16 run at Roland-Garros (l. Halep). That year also reached 3r at Toronto (l.

- 342d) and the youngest player from Japan to reach R16 in Melbourne since Kimiko Date in 1990 (197, 122d)
- Book-ended 2017 season with QF showings at Auckland and Hong Kong; other highlights included 3r runs at Wimbledon and US Open
- Scored first Top 5 win of career when she defeated No.5 V.Williams at 2017 Hong Kong. Upset win over defending champion and No.6-ranked Kerber at 2017 US Open marked first career Top 10 win
- Voted 2016 WTA Newcomer of the Year; highlight was career-first WTA final at Tokyo [PPO] (L. Wozniacki). Also reached QF on three occasions and 3r at Australian Open, Roland Garros and US Open
- Ranked No.406, made WTA main draw debut at 2014 Stanford. As an alternate, won through qualifying (achieving first WTA qualifying wins), and came from match point down to shock No.19 Stosur in 1r of main draw, before losing to No.18 Petkovic in 2r
- Made WTA qualifying debut at Quebec City in 2013 (L. Dabrowski)

- Osaka) and made 2r five times (incl. Australian and US Open)
- Broke into Top 100 at No.88 after R-Up finish at 2019 Lugano. Made WTA qualifying debut at 2019 Auckland
- Ended 2018 season ranked No.175 (up from No.690 in 2017), after posting 42-6 record and winning four titles on ITF Circuit
- On professional debut, came through qualifying to win title at \$10k ITF/Stockholm-SWE in 2016
- Enjoyed stellar junior career, including winning girls' singles at 2018 Wimbledon (d. Kung in F) and leading Poland to Junior Fed Cup in 2016
