[26] Sorana Cirstea (ROU #27) vs. Jelena Ostapenko (LAT #36)

Ostapenko leads 4-3

Cirstea:

- Making 8th appearance at Rome; she is through to the QFs here for the first time after R16 finishes in 2024 (I. Keys) and 2012 (I. Kvitova)
- This is her 94th career WTA 1000 main draw; her career-best WTA 1000 result is finishing runner-up at 2013 Toronto (I. S. Williams in F)
- This marks her 9th career QF at a WTA 1000 event, and her first since 2025 Dubai (I. Muchova in QF)
- Bidding for her 4th career WTA 1000 SF after 2024 Dubai, 2023 Miami and 2013 Toronto
- Defeated Aryna Sabalenka in the 3r for her first win over a reigning World No.1 – the 36-year-old became the oldest player to defeat the WTA Rankings World No.1 on clay (since WTA Rankings started being published in 1975)
- Holds a 9-2 clay-court record in 2026, making Madrid 3r (I. Gauff), Linz QF (I. eventual champion M. Andreeva) and Rouen SF (gave walkover to eventual R-Up Podrez, the walkover does not count as a loss)
- Holds 18-1 record in 2026 vs. opponents ranked outside the Top 20, losing only to No.47 Eala at Dubai
- Has won 24 Tour-level matches this year, 6th-most on Tour in 2026
- Since the format's introduction in 2009, Cirstea is the 4th player to reach a WTA 1000 QF after having turned 36, alongside Serena Williams, Venus Williams and Laura Siegemund. She is the second-oldest to achieve this feat on clay after Venus Williams at Rome 2017

Ostapenko:

- Making 11th appearance at Rome, her tournament-best result is SF run in 2023 (I. eventual champion Rybakina)
- This is her 5th time reaching the QFs here at Rome; among currently active players, only Venus Williams (8) and Elina Svitolina (6) have reached more
- Contesting her 82nd career WTA 1000 main draw; her career-best WTA 1000 results are R-Up finishes at 2025 Doha (I. Anisimova in F), 2018 Miami (I. Stephens in F) and 2016 Doha (I. Suarez Navarro in F)
- This marks her 14th career QF at a WTA 1000 event, and her second in 2026 after Doha (d. Cocciaretto in QF, I. Mboko in SF)
- Seeking her 10th career WTA 1000 SF, and second on clay after 2023 Rome (I. eventual champion Rybakina)
- Two of her 9 career WTA titles have come on clay: Stuttgart in 2025 and Roland Garros in 2017
- Has now won 20 main draw matches at Rome, it is the third Tour-level event in her career where she has registered 20+ match wins, after Doha (24) and Wimbledon (20)
- She is the only player able to have hit 100+ winners at Rome so far this year (119)

[3] Coco Gauff (USA #4) vs. [8] Mirra Andreeva (#7)

Gauff leads 4-0

Gauff:

- 2025 Rome runner-up is through to the quarterfinal here for a fourth time
- Has claimed a total of 20 main draw wins at Rome: she only has more at Roland Garros (27) at a single Tour level event
- The last time Gauff faced Andreeva was at the same stage at Rome last year; Gauff defeated Andreeva in QF
- Looking to reach her fourth Rome semifinal (2021, 2024 and 2025) - in the Open Era, only Gabriela Sabatini (seven) would have more before the age of 23 (Gauff would equal Martina Hingis)
- Could become the first player to reach three consecutive Rome semifinals since Karolina Pliskova (2019-2021) and the youngest since Amelie Mauresmo (1999-2001)
- Has won three WTA 1000 titles in her career, at 2023 Cincinnati (d. Muchova in F), 2024 Beijing (d. Muchova in F) and 2025 Wuhan (d. Pegula in F)
- Owns 34 wins in career over Top 10 players; this only her 4th such meeting in 2026 with a record of 1-2 (d. No.2 Swiatek at United Cup; l. No.9 Svitolina at Dubai, l. No.1 Sabalenka at Miami)
- Only Martina Hingis (39) has reached more Tier I/WTA 1000 QFs than Gauff (24) before turning 23

Andreeva:

- This is her third appearance at Rome and she has equalled her best previous result with quarterfinal in 2025 when she was defeated by Gauff in their most recent encounter
- Reached her third career WTA 1000 final at Madrid this year to become the first teenager to reach three WTA 1000 finals since the format's introduction in 2009
- Could become the youngest player to reach semifinals at both Madrid and Rome in the same year, surpassing the previous record held by Gauff in 2025
- Since the Tier I/WTA 1000 format's introduction in 1990, only Martina Hingis (35) and Jennifer Capriati (24) have more wins on clay as a teenager than Andreeva (21, equalling Iva Majoli) at this level
- Since 2009, only Gauff (five) has made more WTA 1000 semifinals than Andreeva (three, level with Victoria Azarenka)
- Owns two WTA 1000 titles which she won back-to-back in 2025 at Dubai (d. Tauson in F) and Indian Wells (d. Sabalenka in F)
- Her record on clay so far this season is 15-2; with her only losses in Stuttgart semifinal (l. eventual champion Rybakina) and the Madrid final (l. Kostyuk)
