[13] Sara Bejlek (CZE #40) vs. [3] Belinda Bencic (SUI #12)

First meeting

Bejlek:

- Making her Charleston debut
- Earned her first WTA 500 title this season at Abu Dhabi (d. Alexandrova in F)
- Facing Bencic for the first time after withdrawing prior to their match at Dubai this season through injury
- A win today would be the third quarterfinal of her career after winning Abu Dhabi this year and reaching QF at 2024 Prague (l. Wang Xinyu)
- Owns a career record of 2-1 against Top 20 players with both wins achieved at 2026 Abu Dhabi (d. No.11 Alexandrova and No.16 Tauson); her one loss to a Top 20 player was to No.4 Rybakina at 2024 Madrid
- Competing close to her career high ranking of No.37 achieved in February this season

Bencic:

- Making 9th appearance at Charleston, where she won the 2022 title (d. Jabeur in final)
- Also achieved Charleston R-Up in 2023 after a 2022 final rematch against Jabeur
- Reached SF in her Charleston debut in 2014 as a 17-year-old qualifier ranked No.140 (l. eventual runner-up Cepelova)
- Seven of her 10 WTA singles titles have come at WTA 500 events, including her two titles last year at Abu Dhabi (d. Krueger in final) and Tokyo (d. Noskova in final)
- Fell to a Czech player once this season, losing to qualifier No. 126 Bartunkova at Australian Open
- Has 8-1 record this year vs. players ranked outside Top 20 (the one loss was to Bartunkova at Australian Open)
- Notched her 300th career Tour-level match-win by defeating Yastremska in 2r

[1] Jessica Pegula (USA #5) vs. [14] Elisabetta Cocciaretto (ITA #43)

Tied 1-1

Pegula:

- The defending champion returns to make her 8th appearance at Charleston; she defeated fellow American Sofia Kenin in last year's final for her first WTA clay-court title
- After 1r bye, defeated Yulia Putintseva in her opening match this week, raising her record against opponents outside Top 50 to 6-0 in 2026
- Record against opponents outside Top 20 stands at 12-1 in 2026, with the only loss to No.26 Kostyuk at Brisbane
- She is a three-time WTA 500 champion, winning titles at Charleston 2025, Bad Homburg 2025 (d. Swiatek in final) and Berlin 2024 (d. Kalinskaya in final)
- Has won 20 matches so far in 2026; she is ranked joint-3rd for match-wins this year alongside Svitolina, behind Sabalenka (23) and Rybakina (21)

Cocciaretto:

- Making 3rd appearance at Charleston and is into R16 for the first time; her previous best result was reaching R32 in 2024 (l. Azarenka)
- With her R16 showing, she has equaled her best result at WTA 500 events, also reaching this round at Monterrey 2025 (l. Ruzic) and Linz 2024 (l. Potapova)
- Owns 3 wins in career over Top 10 players, defeating No.5 Coco Gauff at Doha 2026, today's opponent No.3 Pegula at Wimbledon 2025 and No.10 Petra Kvitova at Roland Garros 2023
- Best career result on clay is her title run at Lausanne 2023 (d. Burel in F)
- Picked up her second career WTA singles title earlier this year at Hobart (d. Jovic in F)

[5] Madison Keys (USA #18) vs. Anna Bondar (HUN #68)

First meeting

Keys:

- The former champion is making her 13th appearance at Charleston
- Keys defeated Caroline Wozniacki in the 2019 Charleston final to claim her first WTA clay-court title; she was also the runner-up here in 2015 (l. Kerber in F)
- Seven of her 10 Tour-level singles titles have come at WTA 500 events; her most recent WTA 500 title was 2025 Adelaide (d. Pegula in F)
- Two of her 10 titles have come on clay, at Strasbourg in 2024 (d. Collins in F) and here in 2019
- Her 2026 record against players ranked outside the Top 50 stands at 7-1, with the only loss to No.54 Kartal at Indian Wells
- Best results so far this season are QF runs at Brisbane (l. eventual champion Sabalenka) and Adelaide (l. eventual runner-up Mboko)

Bondar:

- Making 3rd appearance at Charleston; she reached 2r in 2022 (l. Badosa) and fell 1r in 2023 (l. Blinkova)
- Has beaten Darja Vidmanova and No.11 seed Magdalena Frech to reach R16, which is her career-best result across all WTA 500 events
- Owns 3 wins in career over Top 20 players, most recently No.15 Elina Svitolina at 2025 US Open; she also defeated No.16 Alexandrova at 2025 Hamburg and No.14 Ka. Pliskova at 2023 Rome
- Career-best Tour-level result on clay is runner-up finish at 2025 Hamburg (l. Boisson in F)
- Season-best result is QF run at Hobart (l. eventual champion Cocciaretto)

[4] Iva Jovic (USA #16) vs. [16] Sofia Kenin (USA #47)

First meeting

Jovic:

- Making Charleston tournament debut
- Competing in just her third career Tour-level event on clay after 2r finishes at Bogota and Roland Garros in 2025
- This week, after 1r bye, defeated Alycia Parks in 2r for her 3rd career clay-court win at Tour level
- Owns one WTA title, which came at the WTA 500 level on hard court at 2025 Guadalajara (d. Arango in F)
- Is currently ranked at a new career-high of No.16; this time last year was ranked No.150
- Owns 16 match wins already this season, including a R-Up finish at Hobart (l. Cocciaretto in F) and her first career Grand Slam QF at Australian Open (l. eventual R-Up Sabalenka)

Kenin:

- Making 8th appearance at Charleston, where she finished as runner-up last year (l. Pegula in F)
- This week, after 1r bye, defeated fellow Grand Slam champion Bianca Andreescu for her 2nd match-win of the year, snapping an 8-match losing streak in the process
- Owns 28 wins in career over Top 20 players, most recently No.10 Ekaterina Alexandrova at 2025 Tokyo (0-4 vs. Top 20 players since then)
- She is a 3-time WTA 500 runner-up, at 2023 San Diego (l. Krejciikova in F), 2024 Tokyo (l. Zheng Qinwen in F) and 2025 Charleston (l. Pegula in F)
- She has reached two WTA Tour clay-court finals in her career: along with 2025 Charleston, she finished runner-up at 2020 Roland Garros (l. Swiatek in F)

[WC] Paula Badosa (ESP #113) vs. [8] Anna Kalinskaya (#22)

Badosa leads 1-0

Badosa:

- Making 5th appearance at Charleston, where her best result is a SF run in her 2021 tournament debut (l. eventual champion V. Kudermetova)
- Defeated Kayla Day and No.10 seed Maria Sakkari so far this week, making Charleston 3r for the first time since her QF run in 2023 (l. Pegula)
- This week, she has won back-to-back matches at Tour level for the first time in 2026
- Owns two WTA 500 titles at Washington DC in 2024 (d. Bouzkova in F) and Sydney in 2022 (d. Krejckova in F)
- Her first career WTA singles title came on clay at 2021 Belgrade (d. Konjuh in F)
- Badosa is the only main draw wild card to reach R16 this week – Stephens and Brady lost in 1r, and Andreescu lost in 2r

Kalinskaya:

- Making 3rd appearance at Charleston; she reached QF in both of her prior tournament appearances in 2023 (l. eventual champion Jabeur) and 2025 (l. eventual R-Up Kenin)
- Since the start of 2025, Kalinskaya is 9-2 in Tour-level matches vs. players ranked outside the Top 100 (1-0 this year, d. No.169 Tomova in previous round)
- Career-best Tour-level results on clay are 3 QFs: 2 here in Charleston (2023 and 2025) as well as 2025 Strasbourg (gave walkover vs. Collins)
- She is a 2-time R-Up at WTA 500 events, at 2024 Berlin (on grass, l. Pegula in F) and 2025 Washington DC (on hard court, l. Fernandez in F)
- Top result so far in the 2026 season is QF finish at WTA 1000 Doha (l. eventual champion Muchova)

CAREER MILESTONES

- In 2025 reached QF at Tour level for the first time at Prague (l. Wang Xinyu) and registered her first Grand Slam main draw match win by reaching 2r at Roland Garros as a qualifier (defeated No.25 Marta Kostyuk in 1r)
- Also in 2025 won three WTA 125 titles at Makarska, Rende and Queretaro, and broke into the Top 100 for the first time reaching a career-high of No.75 in November
- 2024 breakthrough performance saw her reach R16 at WTA 1000 Madrid as a qualifier. Also reached main draw as a qualifying at Australian Open and made two WTA 125 SFs at Colina and Buenos Aires and achieve a career high ranking of No.114 in May
- In 2023, played main draw at Australian Open (l. Krejčíková) and Roland Garros (l. Rakhimova) both as a qualifier; also played qualifying at Austin, Rome, Wimbledon and US Open
- Also in 2023, won title at WTA 125K event at Colina, Chile and two titles on ITF circuit at W25 Santa Margherita di Pula, ITA and W25 Parnu, EST
- Made Tour-level qualifying debut at 2022 Wimbledon and made WTA main draw debut at 2022 US Open coming through qualifying where she fell to No.35 Liudmila Samsonova in 1r
- Also in 2022, won three ITF titles at W60 Olomouc, CZE; W60 Ceska Lipa, CZE; and W25 Santa Margherita di Pula, ITA
- Standout junior results came at 2022 Roland Garros (l. Havlickova), when she reached SF in singles and won girls' doubles title w/Havlickova
- Made professional debut in 2021 on ITF circuit winning first title at W60 Olumouc, CZE
- During 2025, skyrocketed from No.421 at the start of January to No.11 year-end ranking, in her first full season after maternity leave; went 2-0 in Tour finals, winning titles at WTA 500 events at Abu Dhabi and Tokyo, and also reached her second career Grand Slam SF at Wimbledon
- After giving birth to daughter Bella, returned to the courts in October 2024 to play a handful of ITF matches, as well as winning her Billie Jean King Cup Playoff match for Switzerland over Serbia's Lola Radivojevic in November
- Played last tournament of 2023 at San Diego before taking maternity leave
- In 2023, won two titles at Adelaide 2 (d. Kasatkina in F) and Abu Dhabi (d. Samsonova in F); also finished R-Up at Charleston (l. Jabeur)
- Won sixth career title in 2022, triumphing at Charleston, while finishing R-Up at Berlin (l. Jabeur) and helped Switzerland lift Billie Jean King Cup Finals in Glasgow; also reached SF at Miami (l. Osaka) and Tallinn (l. Krejčíková)
- Captured gold medal for Switzerland at Tokyo Olympics in 2021 (d. Vondrousova in F); also claimed silver in doubles (w/Golubic)
- Other 2021 highlights included R-Up finish at Adelaide (l. Swiatek) and Berlin (l. Samsonova), and six further QFs (including US Open)
- Across a disrupted 2020 reached three QFs, at Adelaide, St. Petersburg and Doha
- Was voted WTA Comeback Player of the Year in 2019 - lifted two titles at Dubai (d. Kvitova in F) and Moscow (d. Pavlyuchenkova in F) and posted a career-best 49 Tour-level match wins in 2019 fourth most among all players and breaking back into Top 10 on September 9
- Earned spot at 2019 WTA Finals in Shenzhen, becoming first Swiss player to compete in singles at the WTA Finals since Hingis in 2006, going on to reach SF at the season-ending showpiece (l. defending champion Svitolina)
- Also in 2019, marked 20th Grand Slam main draw by reaching her maiden major SF at US Open (l. eventual champion Andreescu) and finished R-Up at Mallorca (l. Kenin)
Led the WTA with six victories over Top 5 players in 2019, including upsets over No.1 Naomi Osaka at Indian Wells, Madrid and US Open
- Standout result in 2018 was R-Up finish at Luxembourg (as qualifier, l. Goerges)
- In first round at 2018 Australian Open, defeated No.5 Venus Williams. Having also upset then-No.1 Serena Williams in SF at 2015 Toronto is one of seven women to defeat both Williams sisters

- before their 21st birthday (also Hingis, Sharapova, Clijsters, Henin, Chakvetadze and Osaka)
- Underwent left wrist surgery in spring 2017, missing five months - ranking fell outside Top 300; reached QF at Linz as WC in first WTA event back after surgery
- Run to 2016 St. Petersburg final (l. Vinci in F) saw her break into Top 10 at No.9 for the first time in her career. Also in 2016, reached SF at Sydney and s-Hertogenbosch
- Won first career titles in 2015 at Eastbourne (d. Radwanska in F) and Toronto (d. Halep in F); also reached final at s-Hertogenbosch (l. Giorgi) and Tokyo (l. Radwanska)
- At Toronto, beat four Top 10 players en route to the title including World No.1 Serena Williams
- Qualified for 2015 WTA Elite Trophy in Zhuhai however withdrew due to hand injury
- Won second WTA doubles title of career in 2015 at Washington, DC (w/Mladenovic), the first coming earlier in the year at Prague(w/Siniakova)
- Voted 2014 WTA Newcomer of the Year after a campaign highlighted by R-Up finish at Tianjin (l. Riske), SF at Charleston and QF run at 2014 US Open (defeated No.7 Kerber in 3r, No.10 Jankovic in R16); at 17 years of age, was youngest player through to last eight at Flushing Meadows since 1997 when Hingis won the title and broke into Top 50 on Sept 8, 2014
- Won junior singles titles at Roland Garros and Wimbledon in 2013; was named ITF Junior World Champion for 2013

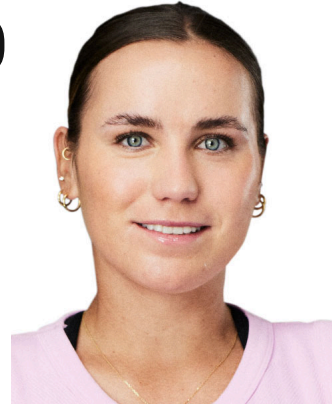

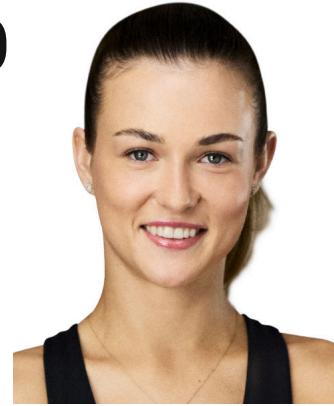
