TOURNAMENT QUICK HITS

- This is the second time in the Open Era that all eight quarterfinalists are seeded at the Canadian Open, following 1991 - Gabriela Sabatini (1), Manuela Maleeva-Fragniere (2), Jennifer Capriati (3), Katerina Maleeva (4), Helena Sukova (6), Amy Frazier (8), Natalia Zvereva (9), Laura Arraya (10)
- On Monday, Iga Swiatek became the first player to advance to this fortnight's semifinals. Swiatek is seeking her first WTA 1000 final of the season – she has reached at least one WTA 1000 final in each of the last five years (since 2021)
- Swiatek has now made WTA 1000 semifinals on both hard court and clay for the fifth straight season (2022-26), becoming just the third player since 2009 to achieve that feat after Halep (2014-19) and Sabalenka (2021-25)
- Elina Svitolina joined Swiatek in the semifinals on Monday. Svitolina won the most recent WTA 1000 event (2026 Rome) and has now won 10 straight WTA 1000 matches. Since the WTA 1000 format began in 2009, Svitolina has become the 2nd player aged 30+ to claim 10+ consecutive WTA 1000 match-wins, after Serena Williams

Gauff leads 6-2

Bencic:

- Making her 6th appearance at this tournament; on her Canadian Open debut in 2015 she won the title (d. Halep in F via ret.)
- This is her 4th time in the Canadian Open QF, after her title run in 2015 and QF finishes in 2022 and 2023
- Attempting to reach her 2nd Canadian Open SF, after claiming the title in 2015 – if this occurs, that would become the longest seasonal gap between two SF appearances at this event in the Open Era
- Owns two WTA 1000 titles, winning 2015 Toronto (d. Halep in F via ret.) and 2019 Dubai (d. Kvitova in F)
- This is her 13th career WTA 1000 QF, and her second WTA 1000 QF this season after QF finish at Miami (l. eventual R-Up and today's opponent Gauff)
- Seeking her 6th career WTA 1000 SF, and her first since a SF finish at 2022 Miami
- Bencic is 15-4 on hard court this season, highlighted by a 5-0 singles record at the United Cup that helped Team Switzerland finish runner-up
- 8 of her 10 career WTA titles have come on hard court, most recently 2025 Tokyo (d. Noskova in F)
- In 2015, Bencic became the second woman from Switzerland to win the Canadian Open title, after Martina Hingis in 1999 and 2000
- Only three active players have claimed more career match-wins at the Canadian Open than Belinda Bencic (18, level with Karolina Pliskova) - Serena Williams (35), Jessica Pegula (20) and Elina Svitolina (20)

Gauff:

- Making her 6th appearance at the Canadian Open and has reached QF for the 4th time
- Seeking her first SF at this event - she posted 3 consecutive QF finishes in 2021 (l. eventual champion Giorgi), 2022 (l. eventual champion Halep) and 2023 (l. eventual champion Pegula)
- Three of her 11 career Tour-level singles titles have come at the WTA 1000 level, winning 2023 Cincinnati (d. Muchova in F), 2024 Beijing (d. Muchova in F) and 2025 Wuhan (d. Pegula in F)
- This is her 25th career WTA 1000 QF, and her 4th WTA 1000 QF this season after R-Up finishes at Miami and Rome, and SF run at Dubai
- She has become just the second player since 1990 to reach 25+ Tier I/WTA 1000 quarterfinals before turning 23, joining Martina Hingis (39)
- Attempting to reach her 16th career WTA 1000 semifinal
- Gauff is 3-0 in WTA 1000 QF matches this year, including a win over today's opponent Bencic in Miami QF
- Since the start of the 2020 season, only two players have claimed more WTA 1000 main draw match-wins than Gauff (116) - Swiatek (136) and Sabalenka (125)
- 9 of her 11 career WTA titles have come on hard court, most recently 2025 Wuhan (d. Pegula in F)
- Gauff has won her last 4 meetings with Bencic, including twice this year in Miami QF and Wimbledon R16

Osaka:

- Making her 7th main draw appearance at this event; her best tournament result is R-Up last year (l. Mboko in F)
- Owns two WTA 1000 titles, winning 2018 Indian Wells (d. Kasatkina in F) and 2019 Beijing (d. Barty in F)
- This is her 13th career WTA 1000 QF, and her first since her R-Up finish at this event last year
- Seeking her 7th career WTA 1000 SF (the previous 6 have all been on hard court)
- This is her 4th Tour-level QF of the year – all occurring in her 4 most recent events (runner-up finish at Bad Homburg, Wimbledon QF, Washington DC SF and Toronto QF)
- She has now made the QF or better at 4 consecutive Tour-level events she has entered for the first time since 2021 (US Open 2020; Gippsland Trophy, Australian Open, Miami 2021)
- Osaka has conceded just 17 games at this year's Canadian Open so far – her fewest games conceded en route to a WTA 1000 quarterfinal since 2021 Miami (16)
- Owns 15 career Top 10 wins, most recently defeating World No.1 Aryna Sabalenka in 2026 Wimbledon R16
- At this event, she has claimed 3 consecutive hard court wins for the first time since last year's US Open SF run
- All 7 of her Tour-level titles have come on hard court; she is a 4-time Grand Slam champion, winning all of her Grand Slam titles on hard court at Australian Open in 2019 & 2021, and US Open in 2018 & 2020
- Reached World No.1 ranking for the first time on January 28, 2019, and held the top ranking for 25 weeks in her career

Rybakina:

- Making her 5th appearance at this event; her previous best results here are SF finishes in 2023 (l. eventual R-Up Samsonova) and 2025 (l. eventual champion Mboko)
- Owns two WTA 1000 titles, winning 2023 Indian Wells (d. Sabalenka in F) and 2023 Rome (d. Kalinina in F via ret.)
- This is her 22nd career WTA 1000 QF, and 5th WTA 1000 QF of this season after R-Up finish at Indian Wells, SF showing at Miami and QFs at Rome and Doha
- Bidding to reach her 14th career SF at WTA 1000 events, and her third WTA 1000 SF of 2026 after Indian Wells R-Up and Miami SF
- 7 of her 13 career Tour-level titles have come on hard court, including winning her 2nd Grand Slam title at this year's Australian Open (d. Sabalenka in F)
- Aiming for her 25th hard court match-win of the year, which would tie her with Sabalenka and Svitolina for the most Tour-level wins of any player on this surface so far this season
- Best results by Kazakhstan at this tournament are Rybakina's SF showings in 2023 and 2025
- Has served the most aces on Tour this year (317), including a tournament-leading 28 aces so far this fortnight
- Is currently ranked a career-high No.2 (reached for the first time on March 16 of this year); this time last year was ranked No.12

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CAREER MILESTONES

- During 2025, skyrocketed from No.421 at the start of January to No.11 year-end ranking, in her first full season after maternity leave; went 2-0 in Tour finals, winning titles at WTA 500 events at Abu Dhabi and Tokyo, and also reached her second career Grand Slam SF at Wimbledon
- After giving birth to daughter Bella, returned to the courts in October 2024 to play a handful of ITF matches, as well as winning her Billie Jean King Cup Playoff match for Switzerland over Serbia's Lola Radivojevic in November
- Played last tournament of 2023 at San Diego before taking maternity leave
- In 2023, won two titles at Adelaide 2 (d. Kasatkina in F) and Abu Dhabi (d. Samsonova in F); also finished R-Up at Charleston (l. Jabeur)
- Won sixth career title in 2022, triumphing at Charleston, while finishing R-Up at Berlin (l. Jabeur) and helped Switzerland lift Billie Jean King Cup Finals in Glasgow; also reached SF at Miami (l. Osaka) and Tallinn (l. Krejčíková)
- Captured gold medal for Switzerland at Tokyo Olympics in 2021 (d. Vondroušová in F); also claimed silver in doubles (w/Golubic)
- Other 2021 highlights included R-Up finish at Adelaide (l. Świątek) and Berlin (l. Samsonova), and six further QFs (including US Open)
- Across a disrupted 2020 reached three QFs, at Adelaide, St. Petersburg and Doha
- Was voted WTA Comeback Player of the Year in 2019 - lifted two titles at Dubai (d. Kvitová in F) and Moscow (d. Pavlyuchenkova in F) and posted a career-best 49 Tour-level match wins in 2019 fourth most among all players and breaking back into Top 10 on September 9
