Rybakina leads 3-2

Kasatkina:

- Most recently defeated today's opponent Rybakina in the 1r at 2022 San Jose
- Making her 10th appearance at the Canadian Open; her previous best results here are QF runs in 2016 (at Montreal, I. Kerber) and 2023 (at Montreal, I. Rybakina)
- Best career finish at the WTA 1000 level is R-Up run at Indian Wells 2018 (I. Osaka in F)
- Seeking her first Top 10 win since defeating Paula Badosa at Roland Garros (R32) last season, and her first at a WTA 1000 event since also defeating Badosa at Rome (R16) in 2022
- Since 1990, Daria Kasatkina could become just the second player representing Australia to defeat a Top 10 opponent at the Canadian Open, after Samantha Stosur (d. No.6 Li Na in 2011 and No.6 Kuznetsova in 2009)
- Seeking her first win over a Grand Slam champion since defeating Sofia Kenin at Indian Wells (R64) last season
- Is currently ranked No.61 (career best No.8 in 2022); this time last year was ranked No.18

Rybakina:

- Last defeated today's opponent Kasatkina in the final at 2024 Abu Dhabi; they've met once before at the Canadian Open (QFs), where Rybakina won 7-6 in the third set
- Making her 5th appearance at the Canadian Open, her previous best results here are SF finishes in 2025 (I. eventual champion Mboko) and 2023 (I. Samsonova), which is also Kazakhstan's best result at the tournament
- Record against opponents ranked outside the Top 50 stands at 13-4 in 2026, with her most recent coming against No. 73 Boulter at London
- Owns seven Tour-level singles titles on hard court, most recently 2026 Australian Open (d. Sabalenka in F)
- Is currently ranked No.2; she has a chance to climb to No.1 after Toronto if she wins the title, and if Sabalenka does not reach the R16
- Rybakina has won her last 12 opening matches at WTA 1000 events, her last such defeat was at 2025 Miami (I. Krueger)
- She's served the most aces at WTA 1000 events this season (143) - she is one of the only two players with 100+ aces in such events this year, alongside Qinwen Zheng (117)

[Q] Kayla Day (USA #131) vs. [4] Coco Gauff (USA #4)

First meeting

Day:

- Making her 2nd main draw appearance at the Canadian Open, on her debut appearance in 2023 she fell in the 1r (as a qualifier, I. Bouzkova)
- Contesting just her fourth Tour-level main draw of the season after a 2r run at 2026 Indian Wells (d. F.Jones in 1r, I. Swiatek in 2r), and 1r exits at Charleston (as a qualifier, I. WC Badosa) and Wimbledon (as a qualifier, I. Keys)
- Her best career result at the WTA 1000 level is 3r run at 2017 Indian Wells (as a WC, I. Muguruza)
- Day is 0-4 in her career vs. Top 10 players; most recently losing to No.2 Swiatek at 2026 Indian Wells. Her career-highest win by ranking came over No.20 Keys at 2023 Roland Garros
- Best career results on hard court are R16 runs at Tokyo 2023 and Stanford 2017

Gauff:

- Making 6th appearance at the Canadian Open, her best results here are 3 consecutive QF showings in 2023 (I. eventual champion Pegula), 2022 (I. eventual champion Halep) and 2021 (I. eventual champion Giorgi)
- Three of her 11 career Tour-level singles titles have come at the WTA 1000 level - winning 2025 Wuhan (d. Pegula in F), 2024 Beijing (d. Muchova in F) and 2023 Cincinnati (d. Muchova in F)
- Gauff is 6-0 so far this season against fellow players from the USA; most recently defeating Pegula in the Wimbledon semifinals
- Among Americans, only Serena Williams (148) has claimed more WTA 1000 main draw wins than Coco Gauff (114) since the format's introduction in 2009
- She's won 31 matches so far this season; highlighted by R-Up finishes at Miami and Rome, and SF showings at Dubai and Wimbledon
- Gauff has saved the most break points in WTA 1000 events in 2026 (116); and she is the player with the most net points won in WTA 1000 events this season (148)

Renata Zarazua (MEX #73) vs. [30] Leylah Fernandez (CAN #34)

Fernandez leads 2-0

Zarazua:

- Making 2nd appearance at the Canadian Open after reaching 2r in 2025 (I. Ostapenko)
- With a win today, she would make it beyond R64 at a WTA 1000 for the first time in her career
- Owns 9 Tour wins in career over Top 50 players, most recently No.47 Tamara Korpatsch in the previous round here
- Equaled the best hard court result of her career last week with SF at Memphis (I. Vidmanova); also reached SF at Sao Paulo in 2025 and Acapulco in 2020
- Has defeated two seeded players so far this season: No.2 seed Kessler at Memphis and No.15 seed Baptiste at Charleston
- Only player from Mexico to feature in the main draw here this week

Fernandez:

- Making 7th main draw appearance at the tournament, with her best result achieved in 2023 with R16 (I. Collins in Montreal)
- Her best WTA 1000 result is QF which she reached at Madrid 2026, Cincinnati 2024, Doha 2024 and Guadalajara 2023
- Her only Tour main draw meeting against a player from Mexico was defeating Zarazua at 2020 Acapulco
- Owns five hard court titles: Osaka, Washington DC in 2025; Hong Kong in 2023; Monterrey in 2022 & 2021
- One of 3 players from Canada to reach 2r along with Cross and Sebov (defeated by Kostyuk in 2r)

Alycia Parks (USA #71) vs. [25] Alexandra Eala (PHI #20)

Parks leads 1-0

Parks:

- Defeated today's opponent Eala earlier this season on their only previous meeting, in 3 sets at Australian Open
- Making 3rd appearance at the Canadian Open, she is through to the 2r here for the second time in her career after 2r run in 2023 (as a qualifier, d. Davis in 1r, I. Bencic in 2r)
- Contesting her 8th career WTA 1000 main draw; her best results at this level are 3r runs at 2026 Miami (l. eventual finalist Gauff) and 2023 Madrid (l. Trevisan)
- She's won 15 Tour-level main draw matches this season (9-9 record on hard court); her best results have both come on this surface, reaching the quarterfinals at Athens (l. Sakkari) and Ostrava (l. Volynets)
- Owns 7 career wins over Top 20 players, most recently defeating No.11 Navarro at 2025 Monterrey. She's seeking her first Top 20 win of the season today (0-4 so far)

- She's won 28 Tour-level main draw matches so far this season; highlighted by her title run at Washington DC, and SF finishes at Berlin and Auckland

- Best results in 2025 were 4r runs at Australian Open and Roland Garros; ended her season early after Beijing to take mental health break. Ended the season ranked inside the Top 40 (No.37) for a fifth consecutive year
- In March 2025, Kasatkina announced that she would represent Australia at all tennis events in the future after being granted permanent residency

- In 2022, reached maiden Grand Slam SF at Roland Garros (l. eventual champion Swiatek) and won titles at San Jose (d. Rogers in F) and Granby (d. Saville in F); returned to Top 10 on August 8, after San Jose run
- Qualified for WTA Finals for the first time in 2022 going 1-2 in group play
- Broke back into Top 50 in early 2021, after lifting first titles since 2018, at the Phillip Island Trophy in Melbourne (d. Bouzkova in F) and then St. Petersburg (d. Gasparyan in F)

- Made Top 20 debut on February 26, 2018, following R-Up finish at Dubai (d. No.3
- In 2025, won her first WTA Finals title, where she posted a perfect round robin record before topping World No.1 Sabalenka in the final; by going undefeated (5-0) at 2025 WTA Finals Riyadh, she earned \$5.235m, the biggest prize money payout in women's sporting history
- Overall, won three titles in 2025, adding Strasbourg and Ningbo crowns to her Riyadh triumph; finished at No.5 in the rankings and as the year's Tour leader in total aces (516)
