- Her best tournament finish so far this year is SF at WTA 1000 Rome (l. eventual champion Svitolina)
- 14 of her 25 career WTA titles have come on hard court, most recently 2025 Seoul (d. Alexandrova in F)
- Only Serena Williams (84.1%, 148-28) has a better win rate than Swiatek (79.6%, 137-35) in WTA 1000 matches since the format's introduction in 2009 (minimum 10 matches played)

[3] Jessica Pegula (USA #3) vs. [15] Diana Shnaider (#17)

Pegula leads 4-0

Pegula:

- Making 6th appearance at this tournament; she is a two-time champion here, winning back-to-back titles in 2023 (in Montreal, d. Samsonova in F) and 2024 (in Toronto, d. Anisimova in F)
- Has reached an additional two semifinals at this event, in 2021 (l. eventual champion Giorgi) and 2022 (l. eventual champion Halep)
- She owns a 20-3 career record at this tournament; excluding the Grand Slams, her only Tour-level event with more wins is Charleston (21)
- Among active players, only S.Williams (35) has more main draw wins at this event than Pegula (20)
- Pegula owns four WTA 1000 titles, capturing her fourth this year at Dubai (d. Svitolina in F)
- She is 24-5 on hard court in 2026, highlighted by the title at Dubai, a runner-up finish at Washington DC, and semifinal appearances at Brisbane and Australian Open
- Pegula's 3r win over Rakhimova was her 40th Tour-level win of the year - she is the first player to claim 40 wins in WTA main draws this season

Shnaider:

- Making 3rd appearance at this tournament, where she reached SF on debut in 2024 (l. eventual champion and today's opponent Pegula)
- Her SF run at 2024 Toronto is her career-best result at a WTA 1000 event
- Owns 2 wins in career over Top 10 players, defeating No.2 Coco Gauff at this event in 2024, and No.1 Aryna Sabalenka at 2026 Roland Garros
- 3 of her 5 career WTA titles have come on hard court: 2024 Hua Hin (d. Zhu in F), 2024 Hong Kong (d. Boulter in F) and 2025 Monterrey (d. Alexandrova in F)
- Her top results this year are 3 semifinals, including her first Grand Slam SF of career at Roland Garros on clay (l. eventual R-Up Chwalinska)
- Her 2 other semifinals this year came on hard court, at Adelaide in January (l. eventual champion M.Andreeva) and Washington DC last week (l. eventual R-Up and today's opponent Pegula)

[1] Aryna Sabalenka (#1) vs. [16] Ekaterina Alexandrova (#19)

Sabalenka leads 5-4

Sabalenka:

- Making her 7th appearance at this tournament, where her best result is SF in 2021 (l. eventual R-Up Pliskova)
- Has won 11 WTA 1000 titles, including two this year (the Sunshine Double of Indian Wells and Miami)
- Has claimed the most hard court wins in 2026 at Tour-level events (25) - she has won 25 of her 26 matches played this season on the surface, only losing to Elena Rybakina in the Australian Open final
- 21 of her 24 career WTA titles have come on hard court, including her three titles this year at Brisbane (d. Kostyuk in F), Indian Wells (d. Rybakina in F) and Miami (d. Gauff in F)
- Tied with Mirra Andreeva for the most Tour-level titles won this year (3)
- Looking to reach her 4th WTA 1000 QF of the season after title runs at Indian Wells and Miami, and QF finish at Madrid
- She's hit 1236 winners so far in 2026, only Rybakina with 1262 has more this season
- Sabalenka is bidding to become just the second player after Serena Williams since the WTA 1000 format's introduction in 2009 to reach the quarterfinals of all four existing North American WTA 1000 events (Canada, Cincinnati, Miami and Indian Wells) as the World No. 1

Alexandrova:

- Last defeated Sabalenka at 2025 Doha (2r), where Alexandrova won 7-6 in the third set in a 2hr 36m match
- Making her 4th appearance at the Canadian Open, she's through to the R16 here for the second time in her career after 2019 (l. eventual finalist S. Williams)
- Her best career results at the WTA 1000 level are semifinal showings at 2025 Doha, 2024 Miami and 2022 Madrid
- She's contesting her first WTA 1000 R16 of the season today; and is looking to reach a sixth career WTA 1000 quarterfinal (her first since SF finish at 2025 Doha)
- Alexandrova is 1-1 so far this season against Top 10 players, with a win over No.5 Andreeva at Bad Homburg and a loss to No.1 Sabalenka at Berlin
- Three of her 5 career titles have come on hard court: 2025 Linz (d. Yastremska in F), 2022 Seoul (d. Ostapenko in F) and 2020 Shenzhen (d. Rybakina in F)
- Since 2000, Alexandrova could become the second oldest player to defeat the World No.1 at the Canadian Open after Venus Williams defeated Serena Williams in 2014

[9] Elina Svitolina (UKR #9) vs. [8] Amanda Anisimova (USA #10)

Svitolina leads 4-1

Svitolina:

- Contesting her 10th main draw at the tournament, she won the title in 2017 (d. Wozniacki in F)
- Owns five WTA 1000 titles: 2026, 2018 & 2017 Rome, 2017 Toronto and 2017 Dubai
- Looking to reach her fifth career Canadian Open quarterfinal; only Rome (6) has seen her reach more at a WTA 1000 event
- Seeking her fourth WTA 1000 QF of the season today after title run at Rome, R-Up finish at Dubai and SF showing at Indian Wells
- Owns 12 hard court titles including one this year at Auckland (d. Wang Xinyu in F)
- Only Pegula (40) and M.Andreeva (39) have claimed more WTA level main draw wins than Svitolina (38, equal with Sabalenka) so far in 2026
- Defeated Anisimova in their most recent meeting at the Canadian Open last season

Anisimova:

- Making her 5th appearance at the Canadian Open, she is a former finalist, finishing runner-up to Jessica Pegula here in Toronto in 2024
- Two of her four career Tour-level titles have come at the WTA 1000 level - winning Doha (d. Ostapenko in F) and Beijing (d. Noskova in F) in 2025
- Anisimova could reach the Canadian Open quarterfinals for the second time in her career after her 2024 run, which would mark her first WTA 1000 event with multiple QF appearances
- Looking to reach a 7th career WTA 1000 QF today; and her second this season after Dubai (l. Pegula in SF)
- Three of her four career titles have come on hard court: Beijing and Doha in 2025, and Melbourne 250 in 2022
- She's won 17 matches so far this season; highlighted by SF showing at Dubai and QF runs at Australian Open and London
- Has defeated Svitolina once before in her career, six years ago at 2020 Doha

Was first player born in 2002 to play in a Grand Slam main draw. Was also youngest player to reach the 3r at a major since 1997 US Open when Mirjana Lucic-Baroni (15 years, 182 days) reached this stage
- Won three singles titles in 2025, including her first Wimbledon title (her 6th Grand Slam title overall), Cincinnati and Seoul; finished at World No.2 for the second straight season
- Posted 62 Tour match wins in 2025, becoming the first player to achieve four consecutive 60-win seasons at Tour level since Martina Hingis (1997-2001) and Lindsay Davenport (1998-2001)

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CAREER MILESTONES

- Went 16-3 on clay at Tour-level events in 2025, including her 18th career title at Rouen, Madrid SF, Rome QF and Roland Garros QF; also made Australian Open QF (l. eventual champion Keys)
- Achieved runner-up in her opening tournament of 2024 at Auckland (l. Gauff in F) before finishing R16 at Australian Open (l. Noskova, retired due to low back injury). Reached QF at Wimbledon (l. Rybakina), 4r at Roland Garros (l. Rybakina) and 3r at US Open (l. Gauff). Ended season after US Open
- Returned to the Tour in April 2023, following birth of daughter Skai. Won Strasbourg (d. Blinkova) for a second time (also in 2020) before achieving Grand Slam results of QF at Roland Garros (l. Sabalenka) and SF at Wimbledon (l. eventual champion Vondrousova)
- 2022 season reached 3r at Australian Open (l. Azarenka) and QF at Monterrey (l. Osorio), before going on maternity leave in spring
- Highlight of 2021 was lifting 16th career title at Chicago [250]. Also made SF at Miami, Stuttgart and the Olympics (won bronze medal)
- Won her 14th and 15th titles in 2020, firstly at Monterrey (d. Bouzkova in F) and then Strasbourg (d. Rybakina in F). Contested her 30th consecutive major at 2020 Australian Open (streak ended by missing 2020 US Open)
- In 2019, made first two Grand Slam SFs of career at Wimbledon (l. eventual champion Halep) and US Open (l. S.Williams). Became the first woman from Ukraine to reach a major SF (on the men's, Andrei Medvedev made that stage at 1993 and 1999 Roland Garros, finishing runner-up in 1999)
- Also in 2019, made Australian Open QF and reached the title match as defending champion at the Shiseido WTA Finals (l. Barty)
- In 2018, won 13th - and most prestigious - career title at 2018 WTA Finals (d. Stephens in F), after going 3-0 during round robin stage. Ended year ranked No.4. Also won titles at Rome (as defending champion, d. No.1 Halep in F), Dubai (as defending champion, d. Kasatkina in F) and Brisbane (d. Sasnovich in F)
- Enjoyed standout 2017, finishing year at No.6, winning a tour-leading five titles and posting second-most wins (53, behind Wozniacki with 60). Season culminated by qualifying for WTA Finals in Singapore, becoming first Ukrainian woman to qualify for the season-ending tournament in singles (fell at round robin stage with 1-2 record)
- In 2025, won first two WTA 1000 titles of her career at Doha (d. Ostapenko in final) and Beijing (d. Noskova in final), and reached her first two Grand Slam finals at Wimbledon (l. Swiatek) and US Open (l. Sabalenka)
- Made Top 20, Top 10 and Top 5 debuts during 2025, finishing the season at a career-high No.4 ranking
- In 2024 made first WTA 1000 final of career at Toronto, finishing R-Up to Pegula (defeated No.3 Sabalenka en route). Also enjoyed run to R16 at Australian Open, her third time reaching that stage in Melbourne
- Played a small number of tournaments in 2023 before taking a break away from the sport after Madrid in April
- Lifted second career title at Melbourne Summer Set 2 (d. Sasnovich in F) in January 2022. Also in 2022, made SF at Charleston (l. Jabeur) and five further QFs, including at Wimbledon (l. Halep)
- Ended 2021 season with 3r run at Indian Wells to secure her fourth consecutive Top-100 finish. Best results were QF runs at Parma and Bad Homburg
- Opened 2020 with SF showing at Auckland, going on to reach 3r at US Open, Roland Garros and Doha; during Doha run, earned third career Top 10 win over No.7 Svitolina (l. Kuznetsova in 3r due to walkover)
- Posted career best Grand Slam result with SF run at 2019 Roland Garros - first player (man or woman) born in 2000s to advance to this stage of a major. Scored maiden win over a Top 5 player during 2019 Roland Garros, upsetting No.3 and defending champion Halep in QF
- Won maiden title at 2019 Bogota (d. Sharma in F); at 17y 222d was the youngest American to win a title since S. Williams at 1999 Indian Wells (17y 169d)
- Made Top 100 debut at No.95 on September 17, 2018, after reaching first WTA final at Hiroshima (as qualifier, l. Hsieh)
- Also in 2018, upset No.9 Kvitova to become the joint-youngest player to reach R16 at Indian Wells, along with Majoli, who made SF in 1994 (both aged 16 years, 199 days)
- Played only two ITF tournaments before making WTA main draw debut at 2017 Miami (l. Townsend in 3s), with Grand Slam bow coming at 2017 Roland Garros (l. Nara in 1r)
- In juniors, won US Open girls' singles in 2017 (d. Gauff in F) and was R-Up at 2016 Roland Garros; reached No.2 in junior world rankings

- In 2017, became first player to win three Premier 5 titles in a single season (Dubai, Rome, Toronto), since such tournaments were introduced in 2009
- One of five players to make Top 10 debut in 2017, after winning Dubai in February (also Ostapenko, Garcia, Mladenovic and Vandeweghe). Peaked in rankings at No.3 on September 11, 2017
- On four occasions could have reached World No.1 - at 2017 US Open, then needed to win 2017 Beijing (fell QF), then needed to triumph at 2017 WTA Finals (fell in group stage), or reach final at 2018 Australian Open (fell in QF)
- End to 2016 season also saw her reach first SF at Premier Mandatory level at Beijing (l. A.Radwanska). Qualified for 2016 WTA Elite Trophy Zhuhai for the second time (l. Kvitova in F)
- Reached three finals in 2016, winning Kuala Lumpur (d. Bouchard in F) and R-Up at New Haven (l. A.Radwanska) and Zhuhai (l. Kvitova). Another 2016 season highlight was QF at Rio Olympics
- Owns two career doubles titles: 2014 Istanbul (w/Doi) and 2015 Istanbul (w/Gavrilova)
- Made WTA main draw debut at 2012 Baku (lost in 1r but went on to win title there in both 2013 and 2014)
- Played first ITF Circuit events of career in 2008
- Junior highlights include winning 2010 Roland Garros girls' title at age 15 (d. Jabeur in F)

- Made professional debut at 2016 US Open qualifying (l. Hozumi in 2r)
