- Looking to reach her fifth WTA 1000 quarterfinal of the season today after R-Up finish at Indian Wells, SF showing at Miami and QFs at Rome and Doha
- Owns seven Tour-level singles titles on hard court, most recently 2026 Australian Open (d. Sabalenka in F)
- Has won 36 matches so far in 2026, highlighted by title runs at Australian Open and Stuttgart (d. Muchova in F), and R-Up finish at Indian Wells (l. Sabalenka in F)
- Has served the most aces on Tour this season (306)

[Q] Alina Korneeva (#89) vs. [4] Coco Gauff (USA #4)

First meeting

Korneeva:

- Making her Canadian Open main draw debut
- Contesting just her second career WTA 1000 main draw after 2026 Rome (as a qualifier, l. Udvardy in 1r)
- Looking to reach her third career Tour-level QF today after SF showings at 2026 Athens and 2024 Merida
- She's 1-1 against players ranked inside the Top 20, with a win over No.16 Jovic in the 3r here, and a loss to No.12 Haddad Maia at 2024 Australian Open; this is her first meeting against a Top 10 player
- Owns 4-0 career Tour-level main draw record against players from United States of America, 3-0 in 2026 including wins over Jovic and Navarro here this week
- Best results by qualifiers at the Canadian Open are SF runs by Bouzkova (2019), Kucova (2016), Zi Yan (2007), Po Messerli (1996) and J.Evert (1997)

Gauff:

- Making her 6th appearance at the Canadian Open, her best results here are 3 consecutive QF showings in 2023 (l. eventual champion Pegula), 2022 (l. eventual champion Halep) and 2021 (l. eventual champion Giorgi)
- Three of her 11 career Tour-level singles titles have come at the WTA 1000 level - winning 2025 Wuhan (d. Pegula in F), 2024 Beijing (d. Muchova in F) and 2023 Cincinnati (d. Muchova in F)
- Looking to reach her 25th career WTA 1000 QF today; and a fourth this season after R-Up finishes at Miami and Rome, and SF run at Dubai
- Could become just the second player since 1990 to reach 25+ Tier I/WTA 1000 quarterfinals before turning 23, joining Martina Hingis (39)
- Among Americans, only Serena Williams (148) has claimed more WTA 1000 main draw wins than Coco Gauff (116) since the format's introduction in 2009
- She's won 33 matches so far this season; highlighted by R-Up finishes at Miami and Rome, and SF showings at Dubai and Wimbledon

[30] Leylah Fernandez (CAN #34) vs. [11] Naomi Osaka (JPN #13)

Tied 1-1

Fernandez:

- Defeated today's opponent Osaka in their first meeting, winning in three sets during Fernandez's run to the 2021 US Open final
- Making her 7th main draw appearance at the tournament, she's through to the R16 here for the second time in her career after 2023 (l. Collins in Montreal)
- Since the Tier format's introduction in 1990, Fernandez is just the second Canadian to reach multiple Canadian Open R16s after Stephanie Dubois (2006 and 2008)
- Looking to reach her 5th career WTA 1000 quarterfinal after QF finishes at Madrid 2026, Cincinnati 2024, Doha 2024 and Guadalajara 2023
- Owns five hard court titles: Osaka, Washington DC in 2025; Hong Kong in 2023; Monterrey in 2022 & 2021
- Has won 15 Tour matches so far in 2026, with her best results being QF runs at Strasbourg, Madrid and Stuttgart
- Looking to become the fifth Canadian since 1990 to reach the QFs at the Canadian Open after Patricia Hy Boulaid, Aleksandra Wozniak, Bianca Andreescu and Victoria Mboko

Osaka:

- Defeated Fernandez on their most recent encounter in three sets at 2025 Wuhan
- Making her 7th appearance at this tournament; her best result here is R-Up last year (l. Mboko in F)
- Owns two WTA 1000 titles - winning 2018 Indian Wells (d. Kasatkina in F) and 2019 Beijing (d. Barty in F)
- Looking to reach her 13th career WTA 1000 quarterfinal; and her first since 2025 Montreal
- She's won 24 matches so far this season; highlighted by runner-up finish at Bad Homburg, SF showing at Washington DC and a maiden Wimbledon QF appearance
- All seven of her career titles have come on hard court; she is a four-time Grand Slam champion, winning all four titles on hard court at Australian Open in 2021 & 2019, and US Open titles in 2020 & 2018
- Reached World No.1 ranking for the first time on January 28, 2019, and held the top ranking for 25 weeks in her career
- Looking to claim three consecutive hard court wins for the first time since reaching the US Open SF last season

Bencic:

- Bencic is 14-4 on hard court this season, highlighted by a 5-0 singles record at the United Cup that helped Switzerland finish runner-up
- 8 of her 10 career titles have come on hard court; most recently 2025 Tokyo (d. Noskova in F)
- In 2015 Bencic became the second woman from Switzerland to win the Canadian Open title, after Hingis in 2000 and 1999

- Earned spot at 2019 WTA Finals in Shenzhen, becoming first Swiss player to compete in singles at the WTA Finals since Hingis in 2006, going on to reach SF at the season-ending showpiece (L. defending champion Svitolina)
- Also in 2019, marked 20th Grand Slam main draw by reaching her maiden major SF at US Open (L. eventual champion Andreescu) and finished R-Up at Mallorca (L. Kenin)
Led the WTA with six victories over Top 5 players in 2019, including upsets over No.1 Naomi Osaka at Indian Wells, Madrid and US Open
- Standout result in 2018 was R-Up finish at Luxembourg (as qualifier, L. Goerges)
- In first round at 2018 Australian Open, defeated No.5 Venus Williams. Having also upset then-No.1 Serena Williams in SF at 2015 Toronto is one of seven women to defeat both Williams sisters

- before their 21st birthday (also Hingis, Sharapova, Clijsters, Henin, Chakvetadze and Osaka)
- Underwent left wrist surgery in spring 2017, missing five months - ranking fell outside Top 300; reached QF at Linz as WC in first WTA event back after surgery

- At Toronto, beat four Top 10 players en route to the title including World No.1 Serena Williams
- Qualified for 2015 WTA Elite Trophy in Zhuhai however withdrew due to hand injury
- Won second WTA doubles title of career in 2015 at Washington, DC (w/Mladenovic), the first coming earlier in the year at Prague(w/Siniakova)
- Voted 2014 WTA Newcomer of the Year after a campaign highlighted by R-Up finish at Tianjin (l. Riske), SF at Charleston and QF run at 2014 US Open (defeated No.7 Kerber in 3r, No.10 Jankovic in R16); at 17 years of age, was youngest player through to last eight at Flushing Meadows since 1997 when Hingis won the title and broke into Top 50 on Sept 8, 2014
- Won junior singles titles at Roland Garros and Wimbledon in 2013; was named ITF Junior World Champion for 2013
- Played first WTA qualifying event at Luxembourg in October 2011, and first WTA main draw 12 months later at same event as WC (l. V.Williams, 1r); only 15 years, 7 months at the time
- Made professional debut on ITF circuit in 2011
