QUICK HITS FOR THE FINAL

- No.2 seed Elena Rybakina and No.7 seed Iga Swiatek will meet for the title at the 2026 National Bank Open presented by Rogers. They have played each other on 12 previous occasions, and have evenly split their previous meetings at six wins apiece.
- This is the second time they will meet in a final. Swiatek defeated Rybakina in the WTA 1000 Doha final in 2024, 7-6(8) 6-2.
- Swiatek leads Rybakina 5-4 in their hard court meetings.
- Rybakina has won their last two meetings, which both came on hard court at 2025 WTA Finals (group stage) and 2026 Australian Open (QF). Rybakina went on to win each of those titles.
- This is the first Canadian Open final between two Top 10 players since 2018 (No.1 Halep d. No.3 Stephens in F).
- The winner receives 1000 ranking points and \$1,085,220. The runner-up gets 650 ranking points and \$564,920.

PIF WTA RANKINGS WATCH

- Rybakina will remain at No.2 in the PIF WTA Rankings following the tournament. She could come within 4 points of Sabalenka at World No.1 if she wins the title
- Currently ranked No.8, Swiatek is projected to move up to No.6 if she finishes runner-up, and could return to the Top 5 (at No.5) by winning the title

RACE TO THE WTA FINALS UPDATE

- Rybakina will rise to No.1 in the Race to the 2026 WTA Finals following the Toronto final, win or lose. She entered Toronto in the No.3 position on the Race.
- Swiatek is projected to rise from No.12 to No.10 in the Race to the 2026 WTA Finals following the Toronto final, win or lose.

Swiatek:

- Making her 5th appearance at the Canadian Open and is into the final for the first time
- Her previous best result at this tournament was reaching SF in 2023 (l. eventual champion Pegula)
- Has now reached the final at nine of the 10 current WTA 1000 events, with Wuhan now being the sole exception
- Has won 11 WTA 1000 titles in her career, most recently at 2025 Cincinnati (d. Paolini in F)
- She has reached her 14th career WTA 1000 final, and first since her Cincinnati title run last year
- Since the WTA 1000 format was introduced in 2009, only five players have made more WTA 1000 finals than Swiatek (14) – Halep (18), S. Williams (18), Sharapova (16), Azarenka (15) and Sabalenka (15)
- This is also her first Tour-level final of this year – before this event, her most recent WTA final was her title run at 2025 Seoul (d. Alexandrova in F)
- She is bidding for her 26th career Tour-level title (holds a 25-5 career record in Tour-level finals)
- Owns 54 Tour-level wins in career over Top 10 players, most recently No.9 Elina Svitolina in yesterday's SF
- Has defeated three Top 20 players this fortnight (No.11 Kostyuk, No.17 Shnaider and No.9 Svitolina) – it is the first time she has posted three Top 20 wins at a single event since her title run at 2024 Roland Garros
- 14 of her 25 career Tour-level titles have come on hard court, most recently 2025 Seoul
- Has become the only player to reach the final of a WTA 1000 event in each of the last six seasons (since 2021), and is attempting to become the only player to win a WTA 1000 title in each of those seasons as well

Rybakina:

- Making her 5th appearance at the Canadian Open and is into the final for the first time
- Her previous best results at this tournament were SF finishes in 2023 (l. eventual R-Up Samsonova) and 2025 (l. eventual champion Mboko)
- Owns two WTA 1000 titles, winning 2023 Indian Wells (d. Sabalenka in F) and 2023 Rome (d. Kalinina in F via ret.)
- This is her 7th career WTA 1000 final, and 2nd of this year after Indian Wells R-Up (l. Sabalenka in F)
- Seeking her 14th career Tour-level title, and 3rd of this year after Australian Open (d. Sabalenka in F) and Stuttgart (d. Muchova in F)
- Owns 38 Tour-level wins in career over Top 10 players, most recently No.4 Coco Gauff in yesterday's SF
- Seven of her 13 career Tour-level titles have come on hard court, including winning her 2nd Grand Slam title at this year's Australian Open (d. Sabalenka in F)
- Has posted 26 hard court match-wins this year, which is the most Tour-level wins on this surface so far this season (moving ahead of Sabalenka and Svitolina, both with 25)
- Overall, she has won 39 Tour-level matches this year, trailing only Pegula (40) and Svitolina (40) for most Tour-level wins in 2026
- Has served the most aces on Tour this year (337), including a tournament-leading 48 aces so far at the 2026 Canadian Open
- She is now the 4th player in the Open Era to claim four three-set wins en route to the Canadian Open final, after Lina Krasnoroutskaya (2003 R-Up), Venus Williams (2014 R-Up) and Bianca Andreescu (2019 champion)

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CAREER MILESTONES

- Won three singles titles in 2025, including her first Wimbledon title (her 6th Grand Slam title overall), Cincinnati and Seoul; finished at World No.2 for the second straight season
- Posted 62 Tour match wins in 2025, becoming the first player to achieve four consecutive 60-win seasons at Tour level since Martina Hingis (1997-2001) and Lindsay Davenport (1998-2001)
- Claimed five titles in 2024, making it a three-peat at Roland-Garros and also winning Doha, Indian Wells, Madrid and Rome. Crossed \$30m in prize money and qualified for her fourth WTA Finals
- Won six titles across 2023, including winning fourth Grand Slam title at Roland-Garros (d. Muchova in F) and going undefeated at the WTA Finals in Cancun (d. Pegula in F). Finished season as WTA World No.1 player for second consecutive year.
- In 2022, lifted second and third Grand Slam titles, at Roland-Garros (d. Gauff in F) and US Open (d. Jabeur in F). Triumph in Paris was the last of six straight titles during 37-match winning streak - joint-longest unbeaten run on Tour since 1990
- Won two titles in 2021, at Adelaide and Rome. Other highlights included QF at Roland-Garros and SF at Ostrava and qualifying for WTA Finals Guadalajara (fell in group stage). Also finished doubles R-Up at 2021 Roland-Garros (w/Mattek-Sands, l. Krejčíková/Siniakova)
- Won her maiden Tour-level title at 2020 Roland-Garros without dropping a set, becoming the first player from Poland - man or woman - to win a Grand Slam singles title and first from her country to reach a major final since Agnieszka Radwanska at 2012 Wimbledon
- Ranked No.54, she became the lowest-ranked woman to win the Roland-Garros title in the Open Era and the lowest-ranked finalist since 1977 (No.56 Mihai). At 19y 132d, is the youngest champion in Paris since Monica Seles (18y 187d) in 1992
- Also became the first player to win her debut Tour-level title at a Grand Slam since Jelena Ostapenko at 2017 Roland-Garros
- Won WTA Most Improved Player of the Year for 2020, as voted on by members of the media. Also won the 2020 WTA Fan Favorite Award
- Ended 2019 season ranked No.61 after a campaign highlighted by R-Up finish at Lugano (l. Hercog) and R16 run at Roland-Garros (l. Halep). That year also reached 3r at Toronto (l.
- In 2025, won her first WTA Finals title, where she posted a perfect round robin record before topping World No.1 Sabalenka in the final; by going undefeated (5-0) at 2025 WTA Finals Riyadh, she earned \$5.235m, the biggest prize money payout in women's sporting history
- Overall, won three titles in 2025, adding Strasbourg and Ningbo crowns to her Riyadh triumph; finished at No.5 in the rankings and as the year's Tour leader in total aces (516)
- Won three titles from five finals in 2024, tasting success at Brisbane, Abu Dhabi and Stuttgart and finishing R-Up at Doha and Miami. Qualified for her second WTA Finals and defeated WTA World No.1 Sabalenka in the group stage
- Reached second Grand Slam final at 2023 Australian Open (l. Sabalenka in 3s); made Top-10 debut following tournament (January 30, 2023). Also in 2023 won first two WTA 1000 titles at Indian Wells and Rome and finished R-Up at Miami. Qualified for first WTA Finals, going 1-2 in group stage.
- Lifted maiden Grand Slam title at 2022 Wimbledon (d. Jabeur in F); also finished R-Up at Adelaide (l. Barty) and Portoroz (l. Siniakova)
- Best results of 2021 were SFs at Eastbourne, Olympics and Chicago [500], and QFs at Abu Dhabi, Roland Garros, San Jose and Ostrava
- Opened 2020 by reaching the championship match at four of her first five tournaments, including a title run at Hobart (d. Zhang in F), and made Top 20 debut at No.19 on February 17, after reaching St. Petersburg final. First Top-5 win came over No.3 Ka. Pliskova during R-Up finish at 2020 Dubai
- Won maiden WTA singles title at 2019 Bucharest (d. Tig in F), breaking into Top 100 for the first time in the following week's rankings at No.65 (July 22). Went on to make Top 50 debut on September 16 after reaching second career Tour final at Nanchang (l. Peterson)
- Highlights of 2018 included reaching maiden WTA QF at St. Petersburg (l. Goerges) and clinching title at \$15K ITF/Kazan. First Top 10 win came over No.7 Garcia at 2018 St. Petersburg
- Made WTA qualifying and main draw debut at 2017 Moscow (as qualifier, l. Begu in 1r)
- Professional debut came at \$10k ITF/Antalya-TUR in 2014

- Osaka) and made 2r five times (incl. Australian and US Open)
- Broke into Top 100 at No.88 after R-Up finish at 2019 Lugano. Made WTA qualifying debut at 2019 Auckland
- Ended 2018 season ranked No.175 (up from No.690 in 2017), after posting 42-6 record and winning four titles on ITF Circuit
