TOURNAMENT QUICK HITS

- All four semifinalists are currently ranked inside the Top 10. The last time that happened at the Canadian Open was 2000 - No.1 Hingis (won title), No.7 S. Williams (R-Up), No.6 Martinez (SF) and No.9 Sanchez-Vicario (SF)
- Iga Swiatek and Elina Svitolina will face off in the first semifinal. Swiatek leads their head-to-head 4-3, but Svitolina has won both of their meetings this year, in Indian Wells QF and Rome SF (both three-set matches)
- Swiatek is a win away from her first WTA 1000 final of the season – she could become the only player to reach the final of a WTA 1000 event in each of the last six seasons (since 2021)
- Svitolina has saved the most break points in WTA 1000 main draw matches this season (128)
- Coco Gauff and Elena Rybakina will meet in the second semifinal. They have played each other only once before – here in Toronto in 2022, with Gauff winning their second-round match that year in a third-set tiebreak
- Rybakina leads the 2026 Canadian Open in aces (43), while Gauff has the best percentage of return games won among all players at this year's event (69.23%)

RANKINGS WATCH

- Rybakina will remain at No.2 following the tournament. She could come within 4 points of Sabalenka at World No.1 if she wins the title
- Gauff will stay at No.4 following the tournament
- Currently ranked No.8, Swiatek will drop to No.9 if she loses in the SF, but she is projected to move up to No.6 if she advances to the final. She has a chance to return to the Top 5 (at No.5) by winning the title
- If No.9 Svitolina defeats Swiatek in the SF, then Svitolina is projected to move up to No.8. She could move to No.6 if she wins the title

Swiatek leads 4-3

Svitolina:

- Making 10th appearance at this tournament – she won this title in 2017 (notched four Top 10 wins during that title run; d. Wozniacki in F) and was also a semifinalist in 2018 (l. eventual R-Up Stephens)
- She is a 5-time WTA 1000 champion, winning titles at 2017, 2018 and 2026 Rome, 2017 Dubai and 2017 Toronto
- Has reached her 16th career WTA 1000 SF, and 4th of this year after Rome title (d. Gauff in F), Dubai R-Up (l. Pegula in F) and Indian Wells SF (l. eventual R-Up Rybakina)
- Seeking her 7th career WTA 1000 final, and 3rd of this year after winning Rome and R-Up at Dubai
- Holds an 8-3 record vs. Top 10 players in 2026, including a 2-0 record this year vs. today's opponent Swiatek (defeated Swiatek at Indian Wells and Rome this year)
- Has won 40 Tour-level matches this year – tied with Pegula for the most Tour-level matches won in 2026
- Svitolina won the most recent WTA 1000 title (2026 Rome) – she has now claimed 10 consecutive WTA 1000 match-wins for the second time in her career (after 11 straight between Rome and Cincinnati in 2017)
- Since the WTA 1000 format was introduced in 2009, Svitolina has become the second player aged 30+ to claim 10 or more consecutive WTA 1000 match-wins, after Serena Williams
- Has posted 25 hard court match-wins this year, tying her with Sabalenka and Rybakina for the most Tour-level wins on this surface so far this season

Swiatek:

- Making 5th appearance at this tournament, where she has reached SF for the 2nd time (also made SF in 2023, l. eventual champion Pegula)
- Has won 11 WTA 1000 titles in her career, most recently at 2025 Cincinnati (d. Paolini in F)
- This is her 23rd career WTA 1000 SF, and her 2nd of the year after Rome SF (l. eventual champion and today's opponent Svitolina in SF)
- Bidding for her 14th career WTA 1000 final, and first since her Cincinnati title run last year
- Also seeking her first Tour-level final of this year - her most recent WTA final was her title run at 2025 Seoul (d. Alexandrova in F)
- 14 of her 25 career WTA titles have come on hard court, most recently 2025 Seoul
- Owns 53 Tour-level wins in career over Top 10 players, most recently No.5 Jessica Pegula at 2026 Rome
- Only Serena Williams (84.1%, 148-28) has a better career win rate than Swiatek (79.9%, 139-35) in WTA 1000 matches since the format's introduction in 2009 (minimum 10 matches played)
- Swiatek has now made WTA 1000 semifinals on both hard court and clay for the fifth straight season (2022-26), becoming just the third player since 2009 to achieve that feat after Halep (2014-19) and Sabalenka (2021-25)

Gauff leads 1-0

Gauff:

- Making her 6th appearance at this tournament, and has reached Canadian Open SF for the first time
- Her previous best tournament results were 3 consecutive QF finishes in 2021 (l. eventual champion Giorgi), 2022 (l. eventual champion Halep) and 2023 (l. eventual champion Pegula)
- Three of her 11 career Tour-level singles titles have come at the WTA 1000 level, winning 2023 Cincinnati (d. Muchova in F), 2024 Beijing (d. Muchova in F) and 2025 Wuhan (d. Pegula in F)
- This is her 16th career WTA 1000 SF, and 4th of this year (she is undefeated in WTA 1000 QF matches this year)
- Seeking her 8th career WTA 1000 final, and 3rd of this year after R-Up finishes at Miami (l. Sabalenka in F) and Rome (l. Svitolina in F)
- Owns 36 wins in career over Top 10 players, most recently No.4 Jessica Pegula at 2026 Wimbledon
- Nine of her 11 career Tour-level titles have come on hard court, most recently 2025 Wuhan (d. Pegula in F)
- Since the start of the 2020 season, only two players have claimed more WTA 1000 main draw match-wins than Gauff (116) - Swiatek (136) and Sabalenka (125)
- With her 16th WTA 1000 SF, Gauff has equaled Iga Swiatek for the third-most Tier I/WTA 1000 semifinals reached before the age of 23 (dating back to 1990) – they trail only Martina Hingis (33) and Maria Sharapova (17)
- Gauff won her only prior meeting with Rybakina, which took place here in Toronto in 2022 (won in third-set tiebreak)

Rybakina:

- Making her 5th appearance at the Canadian Open, and has reached SF of this tournament for the 3rd time
- She previously made Canadian Open SFs in 2023 (l. eventual R-Up Samsonova in SF) and 2025 (l. eventual champion Mboko in SF)
- Owns two WTA 1000 titles, winning 2023 Indian Wells (d. Sabalenka in F) and 2023 Rome (d. Kalinina in F via ret.)
- She is contesting her 14th career WTA 1000 SF, and 3rd of this year after Indian Wells R-Up and Miami SF (l. eventual champion Sabalenka on both of those occasions)
- Defeated last year's runner-up Naomi Osaka in yesterday's QF to reach her 5th Tour-level SF of the year - and her first Tour-level SF since Stuttgart title run in April (d. Muchova in F)
- Owns 37 Tour-level wins in career over Top 10 players, most recently No.9 Mirra Andrejeva in 2026 Stuttgart SF
- Seven of her 13 career Tour-level titles have come on hard court, including winning her 2nd Grand Slam title at this year's Australian Open (d. Sabalenka in F)
- Has posted 25 hard court match-wins this year, tying her with Sabalenka and Svitolina for the most Tour-level wins on this surface so far this season
- Has served the most aces on Tour this year (332), including a tournament-leading 43 aces so far this fortnight

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CAREER MILESTONES

- Went 16-3 on clay at Tour-level events in 2025, including her 18th career title at Rouen, Madrid SF, Rome QF and Roland Garros QF; also made Australian Open QF (l. eventual champion Keys)
- Achieved runner-up in her opening tournament of 2024 at Auckland (l. Gauff in F) before finishing R16 at Australian Open (l. Noskova, retired due to low back injury). Reached QF at Wimbledon (l. Rybakina), 4r at Roland Garros (l. Rybakina) and 3r at US Open (l. Gauff). Ended season after US Open
- Returned to the Tour in April 2023, following birth of daughter Skai. Won Strasbourg (d. Blinkova) for a second time (also in 2020) before achieving Grand Slam results of QF at Roland Garros (l. Sabalenka) and SF at Wimbledon (l. eventual champion Vondrousova)
- 2022 season reached 3r at Australian Open (l. Azarenka) and QF at Monterrey (l. Osorio), before going on maternity leave in spring
- Highlight of 2021 was lifting 16th career title at Chicago [250]. Also made SF at Miami, Stuttgart and the Olympics (won bronze medal)
- Won her 14th and 15th titles in 2020, firstly at Monterrey (d. Bouzkova in F) and then Strasbourg (d. Rybakina in F). Contested her 30th consecutive major at 2020 Australian Open (streak ended by missing 2020 US Open)
- In 2019, made first two Grand Slam SFs of career at Wimbledon (l. eventual champion Halep) and US Open (l. S.Williams). Became the first woman from Ukraine to reach a major SF (on the men's, Andrei Medvedev made that stage at 1993 and 1999 Roland Garros, finishing runner-up in 1999)
- Also in 2019, made Australian Open QF and reached the title match as defending champion at the Shiseido WTA Finals (l. Barty)
- In 2018, won 13th - and most prestigious - career title at 2018 WTA Finals (d. Stephens in F), after going 3-0 during round robin stage. Ended year ranked No.4. Also won titles at Rome (as defending champion, d. No.1 Halep in F), Dubai (as defending champion, d. Kasatkina in F) and Brisbane (d. Sasnovich in F)
