First meeting

Sabalenka:

- Has reached the Australian Open final in her last three outings here, winning the title in 2023 (d. Rybakina in final) and 2024 (d. Zheng in final), and finishing as runner-up in 2025 (l. Keys)
- Making her 31st Grand Slam main draw appearance; she has claimed four Grand Slam singles titles, having also won the US Open title twice (in 2024 and 2025)
- Has now made the quarterfinals at the last 13 Grand Slam events she has contested; the last player to do this was Serena Williams (16 consecutive major QFs, 2000-2005)
- Has won her last 20 hard-court matches vs. opponents ranked outside the Top 10; her last hard-court loss to a player outside the Top 10 was to No.11 Mirra Andrejeva in the Indian Wells final last March
- Is the current PIF WTA World No.1 and cannot lose the ranking across the Australian Open fortnight. These next two weeks will be her 74th and 75th weeks in the No.1 position, sitting 11th on the all-time list
- Bidding to reach a 14th career Grand Slam SF, and a fourth consecutive Australian Open SF
- Sabalenka has won 20 consecutive tiebreaks at Grand Slam events, surpassing Novak Djokovic (19) for the outright most of any player in the Open Era
- Won the Australian Open doubles title with Elise Mertens in 2021

Jovic:

- Making her 2nd appearance at Australian Open; on her previous appearance in 2025 she reached the 2r (as a WC, I. Rybakina)
- Competing in her sixth career Grand Slam main draw, before this year's Australian Open she had never surpassed the 2r at a major
- She is the youngest player to reach the Australian Open quarterfinals since Nicole Pietrangeli in 2007; and the youngest to do so without dropping a set since Venus Williams in 1998
- Owns 11 match wins already this year, which is the most of any player on the Tour
- Holds 11-2 record so far in 2026, including Auckland SF (I. eventual champion Svitolina) and Hobart final (I. Cocciaretto)
- Defeated No.8 Jasmine Paolini in the 3r here to register career first Top 10 win (previously 0-3 vs. Top 10 players)
- Iva Jovic and Coco Gauff are the first pair of Americans to reach a major QF both before turning 22 since the Williams' sisters at Roland Garros 2002

Gauff leads 2-1

Gauff:

- Making her seventh appearance at the Australian Open; her tournament-best result is a semifinal run in 2024 (I. eventual champion Sabalenka)
- Is through to a 10th career Grand Slam QF, and a third consecutive Australian Open QF
- She is the youngest player to reach 3+ consecutive Australian Open quarterfinals since Maria Sharapova (four in a row between 2005 and 2008)
- This is her 26th Grand Slam main draw appearance; she is a two-time Grand Slam singles champion, winning titles at 2023 US Open and 2025 Roland Garros (d. Sabalenka in both finals)
- Holds a 5-4 career record in Grand Slam QF matches, 1-1 in Australian Open QF matches
- Has won her last 41 Grand Slam matches after taking the opening set; the last time she lost after winning the first set at a major was Wimbledon 2022 (I. Anisimova)
- Bidding to reach a 6th Grand Slam SF today, and first since title run at Roland Garros 2025

Svitolina:

- Making 13th appearance at Australian Open; she is bidding to reach the semifinals here for the first time after three QF finishes, in 2018 (I. Mertens), 2019 (I. eventual champion Osaka) and 2025 (I. eventual champion Keys)
- Contesting her 48th career Grand Slam main draw, she is through to a 14th major QF and is seeking her 4th career Grand Slam SF
- Her best results at Grand Slams are three semifinal finishes, at 2019 Wimbledon (I. eventual champion Halep), 2019 US Open (I. eventual R-Up Serena Williams) and 2023 Wimbledon (I. eventual champion Vondrousova)
- Is on a 9-match winning streak at Tour events, having claimed the title at Auckland earlier this month (d. Wang Xinyu in final)
- She is 30-2 after winning the first set at Australian Open, losing only to eventual champions Madison Keys in 2025 and Serena Williams in 2015
- Owns 43 career Top 10 wins at Tour events, most recently over No.8 Mirra Andrejeva in the 4r here
- Since her Grand Slam debut at US Open 2012, only Serena Williams (21), Simona Halep (16) and Aryna Sabalenka (15) have made more major QFs than Elina Svitolina (14)

- Making her 9th main draw appearance at the Australian Open. Has reached the final on her last 3 outings here, winning the title in 2023 (d. Rybakina in F) and 2024 (d. Zheng in F), and finishing as R-Up in 2025 (l. Keys)
- Overall this is her 31st Grand Slam main draw appearance; owns 4 Grand Slam singles titles, having also won the US Open twice (in 2024 and 2025). Has contested the Roland Garros final (l. Gauff in 2025) and is a three-time Wimbledon semifinalist
- Has now made the QF stage at her last 13 Grand Slam events contested
- Record in Grand Slam QF matches stands at 12-1 (3-0 at Australian Open), with her only major QF loss coming against a 17-year-old Mirra Andreieva at Roland Garros 2024
- Bidding to reach a 14th career Grand Slam SF, and a fourth consecutive Australian Open SF
- Currently on a 9-match winning streak to start the 2026 season (Brisbane title and Australian Open QF)
- Has won her past 20 hard court matches vs. opponents ranked outside the Top 10; her last hard court loss to a player outside the Top 10 was to No.11 Mirra Andreieva in the Indian Wells final last March
- Owns 74-22 career record against players from United States of America, 1-0 in 2026 with a win over Keys at Brisbane
- 19 of her 22 career WTA singles titles have come on hard court, including earlier this season when she defended her Brisbane title

- Competing in her sixth career Grand Slam main draw, before this year's Australian Open she had never surpassed the 2r at a major
- This is her first time being seeded in a Grand Slam main draw
- Owns 11 match wins already this year, which is the most of any player on the Tour
- Holds an 11-2 record so far in 2026, including Auckland SF (l. eventual champion Svitolina) and Hobart final (l. Cocciaretto)
- She is the youngest player to reach the quarterfinals at all her first three WTA level tournaments appeared in a single calendar year since Maria Sharapova in 2005
- Faces No.1 Aryna Sabalenka in today's QF; Jovic defeated No.8 Jasmine Paolini in the 3r here to register her career first Top 10 win (was 0-3 vs. Top 10 players prior to this year's Australian Open)
- Her one career WTA singles title came on hard court at Guadalajara 2025 as a 17-year-old (d. Arango in F)
- Nine players from the United States of America have won the title here in Melbourne, most recent is Madison Keys last year
- She is the youngest American to reach the Australian Open quarterfinals since Venus Williams in 1998
- Is currently ranked at a career-high of No.27; this time last year was ranked No.191
- She is the youngest player to reach the Australian Open quarterfinals since Nicole Pietrangeli in 2007; and the youngest to do so without dropping a set since Venus Williams in 1998

CAREER MILESTONES

- Won a Tour leading four titles in 2025, including her 4th career Grand Slam title at US Open (d. Anisimova in final) as well as Madrid, Miami and Brisbane; also finished runner-up at WTA Finals, Australian Open, Roland Garros, Indian Wells and Stuttgart for a Tour leading nine finals overall
- Ended 2025 by finishing at World No.1 for the second straight year, posting the most Tour match wins of any player with 63 and setting a new WTA single-season record in prize money with \$15,008,519
- Reached seven finals across 2024, defending her Australian Open crown, winning the US Open and also won titles at Cincinnati and Wuhan. Recaptured the No.1 ranking in October and finished the season as the WTA Year-End No.1 for the first time in her career
- Outstanding 2023 saw her win debut Grand Slam title at Australian Open (d. Rybakina in F), reach second Major final at US Open (l. Gauff in F) and become the WTA World No.1 player for the first time in career (after US Open). In addition won titles at Adelaide and Madrid
- Highlight of 2022 season was R-Up finish at WTA Finals in Fort Worth (l. Garcia in F); upset No.1 Swiatek, No.2 Jabeur and No.3 Pegula en route to final - only the fourth woman in history to beat the No.1, No.2 and No.3 at the same tournament
- Lifted two titles during 2021 campaign, at Abu Dhabi and Madrid, while was R-Up at Stuttgart. Also reached a further three SFs, including at Wimbledon and US Open
- In doubles, lifted second major at 2021 Australian Open (w/Mertens, d. Krejčíková/Siniakova in F)
- Won final nine matches of 2020 to end the year with back-to-back titles - at Ostrava (d. Azarenka in F) and Linz (d. Mertens in F) - and ranked at No.10. Having also taken home the silverware at Doha (d. Kvitová in F), was one of two players (also Halep) to lift three singles titles during disrupted 2020 season
- Ended as World No.11 for the second straight year in 2019 after capturing three WTA singles titles at Shenzhen (d. Riske in F), Wuhan (d. Riske in F) and Zhuhai (d. Bertens in F)
- Made Top-10 debut on January 28, 2019 following 3r run at 2019 Australian Open
- Ended 2019 at No.2 in WTA doubles rankings after capturing first Grand Slam doubles trophy at US Open (w/Mertens, d. Azarenka/Barty in F). Earlier in the season, the pair claimed the
- Had breakthrough week at WTA 500 Guadalajara in 2025, making her first Tour-level QF (saved MP vs. Jimenez Kasintseva) and going on to win her first Tour title at age 17 (d. Arango in final); rose from No.73 to No.36 following her triumph in Mexico
- Also in 2025, won WTA 125 title at Ilkley (d. Marino in final) and played all four Grand Slam main draws; made Top 100 and Top 50 debuts and peaked at No.33 on October 20
- In 2024, made US Open 2r in her first Grand Slam and Tour-level appearance (as wild card); reached final at ITF W100 Tyler and ended the year with a career-high ranking of No.194
- Claimed her first ITF title in 2023 at 25K Reading
- Played her first ITF tournament in 2022 reaching the final at 15K Los Angeles; also reached 3r at 2022 Junior US Open

- 'Sunshine Double' by winning back-to-back titles at Indian Wells (d. Krejčíková/Siniakova in F) and Miami (d. Stosur/ Zhang in F)
- Enjoyed breakthrough season in 2018, lifting two titles, at New Haven (d. Suarez Navarro in F) and Wuhan (d. Kontaveit in F), winning 46 matches and finishing at No.11 in the rankings. Entered Top 50 on April 16 after run to Lugano final, and Top 20 on August 27 following New Haven title
- Broke into Top 100 at No.76 on October 16, 2017 after reaching first Tour-level final at Tianjin (l. Sharapova). Also in 2017 made SF at Tashkent (l. Babos) and lifted WTA 125k Series title at Mumbai (d. Jakupovic)
- Made Grand Slam main draw debut at 2017 Wimbledon, falling in 2r (as qualifier, d. Khromacheva, l. Witthoeft)
- Fell 1r on main draw debut at 2017 Dubai (as qualifier, l. Ka.Bondarenko). WTA qualifying debut came at 2016 Rabat
- Lifted first three ITF Circuit titles in 2015, including a 13-match win streak towards the year's end, winning back-to-back trophies in Antalya, Turkey
- Made debut on ITF Circuit in Minsk in 2012

- Previously coached by Dmitry Tursunov and Didi Kindlmann
- Started playing tennis when she was 6 by an accident when her father Sergey drove by the tennis courts and decided to give it a try
- Has a sweet tooth and considers something sweet as a perfect present
- Loves her grandmother's cooking, and looks forward to her pancakes when she is away from home
- Has a tiger tattoo on her left arm, which earned her the nickname "The Tiger"
- She spends her time off with family, catching up with friends, or reading; her favorite book is "The Count of Monte Cristo"

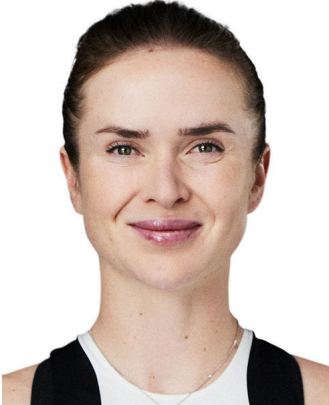
