QUARTERFINAL QUICK HITS

- Pegula vs. Anisimova will be the first all-American QF at the Australian Open since 2021 (Jennifer Brady defeated Pegula)
- Jovic will make her Top 20 debut after the Australian Open; she will make her Top 10 debut if she wins the title
- Jovic could become the youngest American to reach the Australian Open semifinals since 1982 - Andrea Jaeger
- If Svitolina wins her quarterfinal match, she will return to the Top 10 for the first time since the week of Oct 25, 2021 (barring a title run by Jovic)
- Four USA players (Gauff, Pegula, Jovic, Anisimova) have made quarterfinals at a Grand Slam for the first time since US Open 2017 (Coco Vandeweghe, Madison Keys, Venus Williams and Sloane Stephens)



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- 4+ Americans (Gauff, Pegula, Jovic, Anisimova) have made quarterfinals at the Australian Open for the first time since 2001 (Serena Williams, Venus Williams, Jennifer Capriati, Monica Seles and Lindsay Davenport)
- This is the first time the top 6 seeds have reached a Slam QF since the 1998 US Open, and the first time at the Australian Open since 1991
- It is the first time in the Open Era where the top 6 seeds have reached the QF in both the women's and men's singles at a Grand Slam
- It is the first time at the Australian Open where the WTA Top 5 have reached the QF since the 128 player draws were introduced in 1987. It's the first time at a Grand Slam event overall since Roland Garros in 2013
- All the top 4 seeds (Sabenka, Swiatek, Gauff and Anisimova) have made QFs at the Australian Open for the first time since 2013 (Azarenka, Sharapova, S.Williams and Radwanska)
- The last time the top four seeds reached the SF at a Grand Slam was at Wimbledon in 2009 (Dinara Safina, S.Williams, V.Williams, Elena Dementieva) and 1993 at the Australian Open (Monica Seles, Steffi Graf, Gabriela Sabatini, Arantxa Sanchez Vicario)

[5] Elena Rybakina (KAZ #5) vs. [2] Iga Swiatek (POL #2)

Swiatek leads 6-5

Rybakina:

- Making 7th main draw appearance at Australian Open, where her best result was a runner-up finish in 2023 (I. Sabalenka in final)
- Owns one Grand Slam title, at 2022 Wimbledon (d. Jabeur in final)
- Is through to a 7th career Grand Slam QF, and first since 2024; this is the fourth time she has reached a major QF without dropping a set
- Bidding to reach 4th Grand Slam semifinal after Wimbledon in 2024 and 2022, and Australian Open in 2023
- Owns the most wins on Tour since the end of Wimbledon last year (35); and has won 17 of her last 18 matches – only losing to Muchova in the QFs at Brisbane earlier this month
- Has won her last 21 matches after winning the first set, last losing to Victoria Mboko at Montreal 2025
- Only Swiatek (14) and Sabalenka (13) managed more quarterfinals at WTA Tour level than Rybakina (12) during the 2025 season

Swiatek:

- Faced Rybakina five times during the 2025 season, with Swiatek winning four of their five contests; Rybakina won their most recent encounter during her title run at 2025 WTA Finals
- Making her eighth appearance at the Australian Open, where she has been a two-time semifinalist, in 2022 (I. eventual runner-up Collins) and 2025 (I. eventual champion Keys)
- Is a six-time Grand Slam champion, with four titles at Roland Garros (2020, 2022-24), one US Open crown (2022) and most recently winning Wimbledon 2025
- Bidding to become the third youngest player in the Open Era to complete a career Grand Slam
- Seeking 10th career Grand Slam SF; holds a 9-4 record in Grand Slam QF matches (2-0 at Australian Open)
- Is the youngest woman to reach QF at six consecutive Grand Slam events since S.Williams between Roland Garros 2002 and Wimbledon 2003
- Owns 20 career wins over Top 5 players, with her most recent victory over No.4 Paolini at Bad Homburg 2025



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[6] Jessica Pegula (USA #6) vs. [4] Amanda Anisimova (USA #4)

Pegula leads 3-0

Pegula:

- Contesting her 28th Grand Slam main draw, she is through to her ninth Grand Slam QF (4th at Australian Open)
- A win today would be her first Australian Open semifinal after making consecutive quarterfinals from 2021 to 2023 (l. eventual finalist Brady in 2021, l. eventual champion Party in 2022 and l. Azarenka in 2023)
- Has progressed beyond QF on two occasions at a Grand Slam, both at US Open; reached final in 2024 and SF in 2025 (l. Sabalenka both times)
- Is undefeated against Anisimova with their most recent meeting in the title match at Toronto in 2024
- Owns 11 career wins over Top 5 players, most recently defeating No.3 Gauff at 2025 WTA Finals Riyadh
- This is her third all American match so far at 2026 Australian Open after defeating Kessler in 2r and 2025 Australian Open champion Keys in 4r
- Has won 13 of her last 14 meetings against her fellow American players - only losing to Gauff in the 2025 Wuhan final during that span

Anisimova:

- Making 7th appearance at Australian Open and has reached QF for the first time - it was the only Grand Slam event where she was yet to reach at least the QFs
- This is her 24th Grand Slam main draw appearance; she has contested two Grand Slam finals, finishing R-Up at 2025 Wimbledon (l. Swiatek) and 2025 US Open (l. Sabalenka)
- Australian Open and Roland Garros are the events where she has claimed the most Tour level career wins with 14
- Is undefeated at the Australian Open after taking the opening set (12-0)
- Owns 18 Top 10 career wins and this is her first such meeting in 2026
- Posted a 4-4 record against players from USA in 2025, winning three of those against Top 10 players: No.10 Navarro at London, No.3 Gauff at Beijing and No.7 Keys at WTA Finals
- Also defeated USA player Stearns in 3r here at 2026 Australian Open
- Is the second youngest player to make quarterfinals at all four Grand Slams this decade (after Swiatek at Wimbledon 2023)

- Making 7th main draw appearance at Australian Open, where her best result was a Runner-Up finish in 2023 (l. Sabalenka in F)
- She owns one Grand Slam singles title - 2022 Wimbledon (d. Jabeur in final)
- Contesting her 26th Grand Slam main draw, and is into a Grand Slam QF for the 7th time in her career, this is the fourth time she has done this without dropping a set
- The last Grand Slam QF she reached was Wimbledon 2024; last year, she fell at R16 stage on 3 occasions and lost 3r once
- Holds a 3-3 record in Grand Slam QF matches (1-0 in Australian Open QF matches)
- Bidding to reach a fourth Grand Slam semifinal today after Wimbledon 2024, Australian Open 2023 and Wimbledon 2022
- Faces No.2 Iga Swiatek in QF today; owns 17 career wins over Top 5 players, most recently defeated PIF World No.1 Sabalenka in the final at the year-end WTA Finals in 2025
- The pair played each other five times during the 2025 season with Swiatek winning 4 of the 5 contests; however Rybakina won their most recent contest at the year-end WTA Finals
- 6 of her 11 career WTA singles titles have come on hard court, most recently her undefeated run at the 2025 WTA Finals Riyadh
- Best result by Kazakhstan at Australian Open was Rybakina's Runner-Up finish in 2023
- Only Swiatek (14) and Sabalenka (13) managed more quarterfinals at WTA Tour-level than Rybakina (12) during the 2025 season
- Is currently ranked No.5; this time last year was ranked No.7. Reached career-high ranking of No.3 for the first time in June of 2023
- Owes the most match wins on the Tour since the end of Wimbledon last year (35); and has won 17 of her last 18 matches - only losing to Muchova in the QFs at Brisbane earlier this month

- Contesting her 28th career Grand Slam main draw, and is making her 14th appearance in a Grand Slam QF
- Seeking her 10th career Grand Slam SF; holds a 9-4 record in Grand Slam QF matches (2-0 at Australian Open)
- Is the youngest woman to reach QF at 6 consecutive Grand Slam events since Serena Williams between Roland Garros 2002 and Wimbledon 2003
- Faces No.5 Elena Rybakina in today's QF; owns 20 career wins over Top 5 players, most recent was a win over No.4 Paolini at Bad Homburg in June 2025
- Owes 6-5 career record vs. Rybakina, last defeating her during title run at Cincinnati 2025
- 14 of her 25 WTA Tour-level titles have come on hard court, most recently Seoul and Cincinnati in 2025
- Best results by Poland at Australian Open were SF runs by Swiatek in 2022 and 2025, Magda Linette in 2023, and Agnieszka Radwanska in 2014 and 2016
- Registered her 50th career Grand Slam win on hard court in the 4r here, she is the second Polish player to do so after Agnieszka Radwanska (59)
- She is the youngest player to reach 14 Grand Slam QFs since Maria Sharapova at Roland Garros 2011
- Is currently ranked No.2; this time last year was ranked No.2. Reached World No.1 for the first time on April 4, 2022, and held the top ranking for 125 weeks during her career (7th-most all time)

- In 2025, won her first WTA Finals title, where she posted a perfect round robin record before topping World No.1 Sabalenka in the final; by going undefeated (5-0) at 2025 WTA Finals Riyadh, she earned \$5.235m, the biggest prize money payout in women's sporting history

- Professional debut came at \$10k ITF/Antalya-TUR in 2014

- Won three singles titles in 2025, including her first Wimbledon title (her 6th Grand Slam title overall), Cincinnati and Seoul; finished at World No.2 for the second straight season
- Posted 62 Tour match wins in 2025, becoming the first player to achieve four consecutive 60-win seasons at Tour level since Martina Hingis (1997-2001) and Lindsay Davenport (1998-2001)
- Claimed five titles in 2024, making it a three-peat at Roland-Garros and also winning Doha, Indian Wells, Madrid and Rome. Crossed \$30m in prize money and qualified for her fourth WTA Finals
