DAY 2 – MONDAY, JANUARY 19

[Q] Yuan Yue (CHN #130) vs. [2] Iga Swiatek (POL #2)

Swiatek leads 1-0

Yuan:

- Making her fourth main draw appearance at the Australian Open today, and bidding for her first win after losing openers in 2023 (l. Sakkari), 2024 (l. Boulter) and 2025 (l. Pavlyuchenkova)
- Came through three qualifying rounds to reach 2026 main draw, defeating Chirico, Carle and Zidansek
- Owns a 1-12 record vs. Top 10 players, defeating No.8 Zheng Qinwen at Indian Wells 2024
- Her sole career WTA Tour-level title came on hard court at Austin 2024 (d. Wang Xiyu in F)

Swiatek:

- Is a six-time Grand Slam champion, with four titles at Roland-Garros (2020, 2022-24), one US Open crown (2022) and most recently winning Wimbledon 2025
- Should she win Australian Open 2026, would become the seventh woman in the Open Era to complete the career Grand Slam, and the third-youngest to do so (after 19-year-old Graf and 21-year-old S. Williams)
- Has only lost one 1r match at the Slams (26-1 record), falling only at Wimbledon 2019 (l. Golubic)
- Owns 14-1 career record against players from China, with only loss coming to Zheng Qinwen at the 2024 Paris Olympics

[3] Coco Gauff (USA #3) vs. Kamilla Rakhimova (UZB #91)

Gauff leads 1-0

Gauff:

- Making her seventh Grand Slam main draw appearance at the Australian Open, with best result here coming with semifinal run in 2024 (l. Sabalenka)
- Overall this is her 26th Grand Slam main draw appearance, she is a two-time Slam champion, winning the US Open in 2023 and Roland Garros 2025, defeating Sabalenka in both finals
- A win today would be her 75th Grand Slam main draw win (current record stands at 74-23)
- At Grand Slam level, has won her last 21 matches against players ranked outside the Top 50, last falling to No.128 Kenin at Wimbledon 2023

Rakhimova:

- Making fourth main draw appearance at Australian Open, and bidding to reach 2r for the second time, making this stage in 2024 (l. Parry)
- Overall this is her 16th Grand Slam main draw appearance, with best result being 3r runs at US Open 2021, Roland Garros 2023 and Wimbledon 2025
- Faces No.3 Gauff today - owns a 1-8 record vs. Top 10 players, defeating No.5 Paolini at 2025 Wimbledon
- Bidding for her 10th Grand Slam main draw win today, and owns a 6-9 record in Slam 1r matches

Simona Waltert (SUI #86) vs. [4] Amanda Anisimova (USA #4)

First meeting

Waltert:

- Making main draw debut at Australian Open, having previously fallen four times in qualifying (2022-25)
- Overall this is her third Grand Slam main draw appearance, making 2r at Roland Garros 2023 (d. Mandlik, l. Cocciaretto) and falling 1r at Wimbledon 2023 (l. Bouzkova)
- Currently on a career-high ranking of No.86 (first posted in November, 2025), this time last year was ranked No.167
- Owns 1 career win over Top 10 players, defeating No.7 Collins at Lausanne 2022

Anisimova:

- Has reached the R16 here three times, in 2019 (l. eventual R-Up Kvitova), 2022 (l. eventual champion Barty) and 2024 (l. eventual champion Sabalenka)
- Has contested two Slam finals, finishing R-Up in 2025 at Wimbledon (l. Swiatek) and US Open (l. Sabalenka)
- Contesting Australian Open 2026 at a career-high ranking of No.4 (posted Jan 5, 2026), meaning this is her highest-seeding at a Slam
- Is 15-8 in 1r matches at the majors, most recent such loss coming at US Open 2024 (l. Zheng Qinwen)
- Three of her four WTA titles have come on hard court: Beijing 2025, Doha 2025, Melbourne 250 2022

[6] Jessica Pegula (USA #6) vs. Anastasia Zakharova (#103)

First meeting

Pegula:

- Has made the QF here three times, in 2021 (l. eventual finalist Brady), 2022 (l. eventual champion Barty) and 2023 (l. Azarenka)
- Owns a 57-26 record across the majors, having made main draw debut at US Open 2015
- Bidding to be the second player from the USA in a row to triumph at the Australian Open, following Keys' success in 2025
- Made strong start to the season by reaching the SF at Brisbane (l. Kostyuk)
- Six of her 9 WTA titles have come on hard court

Zakharova:

- Made 3r here in 2024 on what was her Grand Slam main draw debut
- This is her fourth Grand Slam main draw appearance, having also made the 2r at Wimbledon and US Open in 2025
- Has only faced a Top 10 opponent once, falling to No.8 Keys at London 2025
- Best win of career came over No.21 Vekic (also at 2025 Queen's)
- Best career result on hard court is SF run at Cleveland 2025 (l. Cirstea)

Donna Vekic (CRO #70) vs. [8] Mirra Andreeva (#8)

Andreeva leads 1-0

Vekic:

- Making her 14th main draw appearance in Melbourne, with her best result coming with QF run in 2023 (l. eventual champion Sabalenka)
- Has also made the R16 twice, in 2021 (l. eventual finalist Brady) and 2025 (l. Pavlyuchenkova)
- Overall this is her 49th Grand Slam main draw appearance, her best result is a SF run at Wimbledon 2024 (l. Paolini)
- Australian Open is her happiest Slam hunting ground, with a 16-13 record here (second is Wimbledon, 14-11)

Andreeva:

- Has reached the R16 on her two previous Melbourne outings, in 2024 (l. Krejcikova) and 2025 (l. eventual R-Up Sabalenka)
- Approaching her 30th Grand Slam main draw win, current record standing at 28-11
- Opened the 2026 season with a title run at Adelaide (d. Mboko in F) and a QF run at Brisbane (l. eventual R-Up Kostyuk)
- Owns an impressive 10-1 career record in 1r Slam matches, sole loss coming at Wimbledon 2024 (l. Fruhvirtova)

Magda Linette (POL #53) vs. [15] Emma Navarro (USA #15)

Navarro leads 1-0

Linette:

- Making 10th appearance at Australian Open, where her previous best result was reaching SF in 2023 (l. eventual champion Sabalenka), which is also her best result across all Grand Slams
- Owns 17 career wins over Top 20 players, most recently defeated No.4 Jessica Pegula at Cincinnati 2025
- Record in 1r at Grand Slams stands at 15-26 (3-6 at Australian Open)
- Owns two singles titles on hard court at Hua Hin 2020 and Bronx (New York) 2019
- Started 2026 season with back-to-back QFs at Auckland (l. Eala) and Hobart (l. eventual finalist Jovic)

Navarro:

- Making 3rd appearance at Australian Open, where her previous best result was reaching QF in 2025 (l. Swiatek)
- Best result at a Grand Slam is SF run at US Open 2024 (l. eventual champion Sabalenka); also reached QF at Wimbledon 2024 (l. eventual finalist Paolini)
- Both of her two career singles titles have come on hard court - Merida 2025 and Hobart 2024
- Record in 1r matches at Grand Slams stands at 8-4 (2-0 at Australian Open), most recent 1r Major loss was at Roland Garros 2025 (l. Bouzas Maneiro)
- Started 2026 season with a QF run at Adelaide (l. Shnaider) and 1r loss at Auckland (l. F. Jones)

[17] Victoria Mboko (CAN #17) vs. [WC] Emerson Jones (AUS #155)

First meeting

Mboko:

- Making Australian Open debut; made her Grand Slam main draw debuts at Roland Garros, Wimbledon and US Open in 2025 posting her best result at Roland Garros by reaching 3r as a qualifier (l. Zheng Qinwen)
- Owns 6-1 career record vs. players ranked outside the Top 100; has won the last 6 consecutively
- Both her career titles have come on hard court, at Hong Kong 2025 and Montreal 2025 (as an 18-year-old wild card)
- Is currently ranked at a career-high of No.17; this time last year was ranked No.337
- So far during this year's Australian swing, competed for Canada at United Cup (went 1-1 in singles play), and reached a third career final at Adelaide (l. Andreeva)

Jones:

- Making 2nd appearance at Australian Open, on her previous appearance in 2025 she fell in the 1r (as a wild card, l. Rybakina)
- Owns 0-4 career record vs. Top 20 players, most recent loss was to No.15 Navarro at Adelaide 2026
- First career meeting against a player from Canada
- Best career result on hard court is 2r twice: Brisbane 2026 (as a WC, l. Samsonova) and Adelaide 2025 (as a WC, l. Kasatkina)
- One of 10 players from Australia competing in this year's field

Barbora Krejcikova (CZE #55) vs. [23] Diana Shnaider (#23)

First meeting

Krejcikova:

- Making 6th main draw appearance at Australian Open; her best tournament results are quarterfinals in 2022 (l. Keys) and 2024 (l. eventual champion Sabalenka)
- Holds a 5-0 record in Australian Open 1r matches (17-5 in Grand Slam 1r matches overall)
- Two-time Grand Slam singles champion, winning titles at 2021 Roland Garros (d. Pavlyuchenkova in final) and 2024 Wimbledon (d. Paolini in final)
- Owns 34 wins in career over Top 25 players, most recently No.11 Alexandrova at 2025 Beijing
- Missed all of last year's Australian swing due to back injury

Shnaider:

- Making 4th appearance at Australian Open; her best tournament result is reaching 3r last year (l. Vekic)
- Career-best Grand Slam showing is R16 at US Open 2024 (l. eventual finalist Pegula)
- Three of her five career WTA singles titles have come on hard court: Hua Hin 2024, Hong Kong 2024 and Monterrey 2025
- So far this season, made Brisbane R16 (l. Keys) and Adelaide SF (l. M. Andreeva)

[27] Sofia Kenin (USA #28) vs. Peyton Stearns (USA #52)

First meeting

Kenin:

- The 2020 Australian Open Champion returns for a ninth consecutive main draw appearance
- This is her first time being seeded at Australian Open since 2022
- Looking for her first win at Australian Open today since 2021 (d. Maddison Inglis in 1r)
- This is her fifth time playing an American at Australian Open (2-2 in previous matches)
- Is currently ranked No.28; this time last year was ranked No.74. Broke into the World's Top 5 in March 2020 (No.4)

Stearns:

- Making 3rd main draw appearance at Australian Open, where she is seeking to advance to the 2r for the first time
- Best career result at a Grand Slam was 4r run at US Open 2023 (l. No.9 Vondrousova)
- At three hours and 20 minutes, her defeat against Emma Navarro was the longest match in the Women's Singles at the Australian Open 2025
- Her match against Navarro was the only other time she played an American at a Grand Slam
- Owns 18 career wins (four at Grand Slams) over Top 50 players, most recently defeated No.14 Svitolina at Rome 2025

[Q] Storm Hunter (AUS #363) vs. Jessica Bouzas Maneiro (ESP #40)

First meeting

Hunter:

- Making 7th appearance at Australian Open, where her previous best result was reaching 3r in 2024 (as qualifier, l. Krejčíková), which is also her best result across all four majors
- Owns 3 career wins over Top 50 players, most recently defeated No.22 Donna Vekic at Hamburg 2023
- Record in 1r matches at Grand Slams is 2-9 (1-5 at Australian Open)
- Best career results on hard court are QF runs at Prague 2021 and Adelaide 2021
- Prior to this year's Australian Open, competed for Australia at United Cup where they reached QF (went 1-0 in singles play)

Bouzas Maneiro:

- Making 2nd appearance at Australian Open, where her previous result was reaching 2r in 2025 (l. eventual finalist Sabalenka)
- Career best result at a Grand Slam was R16 run at Wimbledon 2025 (l. Samsonova)
- Tour-level career record against opponents outside the Top 300 stands at 4-0, most recently defeating No.644 Venus Williams at Cincinnati 2025
- Best career results on hard court are QF runs at Montreal 2025 (l. eventual champion Mboko) and Guangzhou 2024 (l. eventual finalist Dolehide)
- Is currently ranked at a new career-high of No.40 (first achieved in Aug 2025)

[Q] Yuliia Starodubtseva (UKR #110) vs. Ajla Tomljanovic (AUS #76)

Tomljanovic leads 1-0

Starodubtseva:

- Came through qualifying to make her 3rd appearance at Australian Open; fell in the 1r in 2024 (as qualifier, l. Jabeur) and 2025 (l. Fernandez)
- Career-best Grand Slam result is 3r at 2025 Roland Garros (l. Paolini)
- In 2024, played all four Grand Slam main draws as a qualifier – first woman in the Open Era to successfully qualify for all four majors in a single calendar year
- Seeking first Top 100 win since defeating Putintseva at Ningbo last October
- Best result by Ukraine at Australian Open was semifinal run by Yastremska in 2024 (as a qualifier)

Tomljanovic:

- Making 11th main draw appearance at Australian Open
- Has reached Australian Open 2r on six occasions (including the last two years) but is yet to advance beyond that round
- Best Grand Slam results are 3 quarterfinal finishes: 2021 Wimbledon (l. eventual champion Barty), 2022 Wimbledon (l. eventual champion Rybakina), and 2022 US Open (l. eventual finalist Jabeur)
- Most recent Australian to win this title is Ashleigh Barty in 2022

[WC] Priscilla Hon (AUS #121) vs. [Q] Marina Stakusic (USA #127)

Hon leads 1-0

Hon:

- Making 5th main draw appearance at Australian Open, she has surpassed the 1r only once, in 2020 (l. Kerber in 2r)
- Appearing in her 10th Grand Slam main draw at this year's Australian Open; her best result is a 3r run at US Open 2025 (l. Li)
- Best career results on hard court are two QF runs at Seoul in 2019 and Seoul in 2017
- Is currently ranked No.121; this time last year was ranked No.162. Broke into the Top 100 for the first time in October 2025 after a 3r run at Beijing

Stakusic:

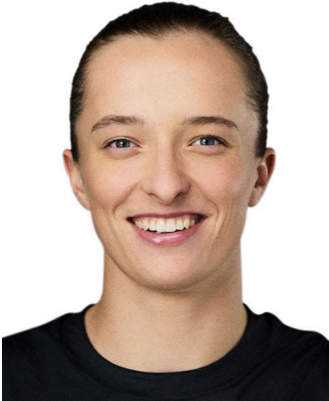
- Making her Australian Open main draw debut today; and her 2nd Grand Slam appearance after qualifying for the main draw at Wimbledon 2024 (l. Siniakova in the 1r)
- Best career results on hard court are two QF runs at Guadalajara in 2025 (l. eventual finalist Arango) and Guadalajara in 2024 (l. eventual champion Frech)
- Best result by a player from Canada at Australian Open was SF run by Eugenie Bouchard in 2014
- Is currently ranked No.127; this time last year was ranked No.121. Reached a career-high ranking of No.105 in August 2025

- Making her eighth main draw appearance at the Australian Open, where she is a two-time semifinalist, making the last four in 2022 (l. Collins) and 2025 (l. eventual finalist Keys)
- Is a six-time Grand Slam champion, with four titles at Roland-Garros (2020, 2022-24), one US Open crown (2022) and most recently winning Wimbledon 2025
- Should she win Australian Open 2026, would become the seventh woman in the Open Era to complete the career Grand Slam, and the third-youngest to do so (after 19-year-old Graf and 21-year-old S.Williams)
- Overall this is her 28th consecutive Grand Slam main draw appearance and her record at this level stands at 104-21
- Made her Grand Slam main draw debut here at the Australian Open in 2019, making the 2r (l. Giorgi)
- Has only lost one 1r match at the Slams (26-1 record), falling at Wimbledon 2019 (l. Golubic)
- Enters Australian Open 2026 off the back of playing a pivotal role for Team Poland's triumph at the United Cup 2026 (d. Switzerland in F)
- Faces No.84 Yuan today; has won her last 18 matches against players ranked outside the Top 50, last falling to No.140 Eala at Miami 2025
- At Slam level, a loss today would be the worst result ranking wise for 2.5 years, since falling to No.76 Svitolina at Wimbledon 2023
- Owns 14-1 career record against players from China, with only loss coming to Zheng Qinwen at the 2024 Paris Olympics
- 14 of her 25 WTA Tour-level titles have come on hard court: Seoul and Cincinnati in 2025; Indian Wells and Doha in 2024; WTA Finals, Beijing, Warsaw and Doha in 2023; San Diego, US Open, Miami, Indian Wells, Doha in 2022; Adelaide 500 in 2021
- Other Polish women to make the SF here are Magda Linette in 2023, and Agnieszka Radwanska in 2016 and 2014
- Is currently ranked No.2; this time last year was ranked No.2. Was last ranked World No.1 in 2023

- Making her fourth main draw appearance at the Australian Open today, and bidding for first win, having lost openers in 2023 (l. Sakkari), 2024 (l. Boulter) and 2025 (l.Pavyluchenkova)
- Came through three qualifying rounds to reach 2026 main draw, defeating Chirico, Carle and Zidansek
- Has previously fallen in qualifying here from 2020-22
- Overall this is her 13th Grand Slam main draw appearance having contested all the Majors, and has progressed passed the 1r once, at 2022 US Open making the 3r (as qualifier, d. Fourlis and Begu, l. Pegula)
- Faces No.2 Swiatek today - owns a 1-12 record vs. Top 10 players, defeating No.8 Zheng Qinwen at Indian Wells 2024
- Highest-ranked opponent faced in career so far was Swiatek when also ranked No.2, at 2025 Beijing (l. 6-0 6-3)
- Owns 0-1 career record against players from Poland, with loss coming against today's opponent Swiatek
- Her sole career WTA Tour-level title came on hard court at Austin 2024 (d. Wang Xiyu in F)
- Best result by a player from China at Australian Open was title run by Na Li in 2014
- Is currently ranked No.130; this time last year was ranked No.53. Reached a career-high ranking of No.36 in May 2024

- Won three singles titles in 2025, including her first Wimbledon title (her 6th Grand Slam title overall), Cincinnati and Seoul; finished at World No.2 for the second straight season
