DAY 3 – TUESDAY, JANUARY 20

[5] Elena Rybakina (KAZ #5) vs. Kaja Juvan (SLO #100)

Rybakina leads 1-0

Rybakina:

- Making her 7th main draw appearance at the Australian Open, where she was the 2023 runner-up (l. Sabalenka)
- Has reached at least the R16 at all the Slams, winning the 2022 Wimbledon title, making two QF appearances at Roland Garros and reaching the R16 at the 2025 US Open
- Owns a 22-3 record in Grand Slam 1r matches (a perfect 6-0 here in Melbourne 1r matches) and has won her last 12 Slam openers in a row
- 6 of her 11 career WTA singles titles have come on hard court, most recently her undefeated run through the 2025 WTA Finals Riyadh
- Had the highest percentage of first-serve points won at major events last season (74.9%)

Juvan:

- Making her sixth main draw appearance at the Australian Open; her joint-best Grand Slam result came here with a run to 3r in 2021 (l. eventual runner-up Brady)
- This is her 19th Grand Slam main draw appearance, and she owns a 12-6 record in Grand Slam 1r matches
- Holds a 2-5 career record vs. Top 10 players, with wins over No.2 Sabalenka at 2022 Adelaide and No.8 Ka.Pliskova at 2022 Strasbourg (win over Pliskova was en route to 1st career WTA singles final)
- Her sole previous meeting vs. Rybakina also came at this event (Rybakina d. Juvan in 2r during Rybakina's run to the 2023 Australian Open final)

Oleksandra Oliynykova (UKR #92) vs. [9] Madison Keys (USA #9)

First meeting

Oliynykova:

- Making her Grand Slam and Tour-level main draw debut today, which is also her 2026 season opener
- This is her first time facing a Top 50-ranked opponent in her career
- Seeking her first match-win at a Grand Slam event, including qualifying rounds; in 2025, she lost in the first qualifying round at both Wimbledon (to Diane Parry) and US Open (to Lizette Cabrera)
- Currently ranked just shy of her career-high No.90; this time last year was ranked No.285
- Won three WTA 125 titles last year (Tolentino, Tucuman and Colina), joint-most of any player in 2025

Keys:

- Returns to the Australian Open to make her 12th appearance, this time as the defending champion (defeated Sabalenka in 2025 final for 1st career Grand Slam title)
- This will be Keys' 50th Grand Slam main draw appearance of her career
- Since the start of 2025, Keys has gone 17-5 vs. players ranked outside the Top 50
- Keys lost her first-ever main draw match at the Australian Open (as a wild card, l. Zheng Jie in 2012 1r), but she has won all of her first-round matches at this event since then (now 10-1 overall in Australian Open 1r matches)
- Only one women's singles defending champion has lost their opening match at this tournament during the Open Era: Jennifer Capriati in 2003 (l. to Marlene Weingartner)

Katie Boulter (GBR #113) vs. [10] Belinda Bencic (SUI #10)

Bencic leads 1-0

Boulter:

- Making 6th main draw appearance at Australian Open
- Has reached the Australian Open 2r on 3 occasions (including each of the last 2 years) but has yet to advance beyond that round in Melbourne
- Career-best Grand Slam showings are three 3r finishes (2022 and 2023 Wimbledon; 2023 US Open)
- Has posted 4 wins in career over Top 10 players, most recently No.9 Paula Badosa at 2025 Wimbledon
- Most recent woman from the United Kingdom to win the Australian Open title was Virginia Wade in 1972

Bencic:

- Making 12th appearance at Australian Open
- Career-best Grand Slam showings are semifinals at 2019 US Open (l. eventual champion Andreescu) and 2025 Wimbledon (l. eventual champion Swiatek)
- Currently on an 11-match winning streak (not including walkovers), which features a 5-0 singles record at United Cup to start the 2026 season
- Since her return from maternity leave at the end of 2024, Bencic is 11-0 in Tour-level matches vs. players ranked outside the Top 100
- Most recent Swiss woman to win the Australian Open title was Martina Hingis; she reached six straight finals from 1997 to 2002, winning three straight titles during that stretch (1997-1999)

[16] Naomi Osaka (JPN #17) vs. Antonia Ruzic (CRO #65)

First meeting

Osaka:

- Making 10th appearance at Australian Open
- 2-time Australian Open champion, winning the tournament in 2019 (d. Kvitova in final) and 2021 (d. Brady in final)
- She has won a total of four Grand Slam titles, also prevailing at the US Open in 2018 (d. S.Williams in final) and 2020 (d. Azarenka in final)
- At Grand Slam events, Osaka is 38-9 vs. players ranked outside the Top 50
- Her record in Australian Open 1r matches stands at 8-1, with the one loss to Caroline Garcia in 2024 – a result she reversed by defeating Garcia in the 2025 Australian Open 1r
- Osaka is one win away from becoming the second Japanese woman in the Open Era to claim 70 Grand Slam main draw match-wins, joining Ai Sugiyama (84)

Ruzic:

- Making her Australian Open main draw debut this year (lost in qualifying last year)
- This is her 2nd Grand Slam main draw appearance; she made her Grand Slam main draw debut at last year's US Open (l. Townsend in 1r)
- Comes into this event having just made the Hobart semifinals last week (l. eventual champion Cocciaretto) – this was her first career Tour-level SF, as well as her career-best Tour-level result on hard court
- Has lost all of her three previous meetings against Top 20 opponents
- Reached a new career-high ranking of No.65 in Monday, January 19's updated rankings

Laura Siegemund (GER #48) vs. [18] Liudmila Samsonova (#18)

Tied 2-2

Siegemund:

- Making 9th main draw appearance at Australian Open, where she has reached 3r on three occasions, including last year (l. Pavlyuchenkova)
- Career-best Grand Slam results are quarterfinal runs at 2020 Roland Garros (l. Kvitova) and last year's Wimbledon (l. Sabalenka)
- By defeating Zheng Qinwen in the 2r at Melbourne last year, Siegemund became the first German woman to claim a Top 5 win at the Australian Open since Angelique Kerber defeated Serena Williams in the 2016 final
- Owns 23 wins in career over Top 20 players, most recently No.5 Mirra Andrejeva at 2025 Wuhan

Samsonova:

- Making 7th main draw appearance at Australian Open
- Has reached 2r here on four occasions, but is yet to advance beyond that round in Melbourne
- Posted best Grand Slam result last year by making first Slam QF at Wimbledon (l. eventual champion Swiatek)
- Three out of her five career WTA singles titles have come on hard court, all in 2022, at Tokyo, Cleveland and Washington DC
- Won nine Grand Slam main draw matches in 2025, her highest career tally in an entire calendar year

[22] Leylah Fernandez (CAN #23) vs. Janice Tjen (INA #59)

First meeting

Fernandez:

- Making 7th appearance at Australian Open; posted her best tournament result last year by making 3r (l. Gauff)
- Career-best Grand Slam showing is runner-up at 2021 US Open (l. qualifier Raducanu in all-teenage final)
- In 2025, Fernandez went 20-6 in Tour-level matches vs. players ranked outside the Top 50
- This will be her 50th Grand Slam main draw match, becoming 5th Canadian woman in Open Era to contest 50+ Grand Slam matches after Patricia Hy-Boulais, Eugenie Bouchard, Carling Bassett-Seguso and Helen Kelesi
- All of her 5 career WTA singles titles have come on hard court, including 2 last year (Washington DC and Osaka)

Tjen:

- First Indonesian woman to play the Australian Open main draw since Angelique Widjaja in 2004
- Seeking to become the first Indonesian woman to win a round at this event since Yayuk Basuki made 1998 R16
- Has faced only one Top 25 player previously in her career (d. No.25 V. Kudrmetova in her Grand Slam main draw debut at 2025 US Open)
- Is currently ranked No.59 (near her career-high of No.53); this time last year was ranked No.413
- Won her first career WTA singles title last year at Chennai (d. Birrell in final), becoming the first Indonesian to win a Tour singles title since Angelique Widjaja at 2002 Pattaya City

Rebecca Sramkova (SVK #73) vs. [24] Jelena Ostapenko (LAT #24)

Ostapenko leads 3-1

Sramkova:

- Making 3rd main draw appearance at Australian Open, where her previous best result was 2r in 2025 (l. Swiatek)
- Her 1r win over Volynets here last year is her only main-draw victory at a Grand Slam event (1-8 record)
- Best result by Slovakia at Australian Open was runner-up finish by Dominika Cibulkova in 2014 (l. Li Na in final)
- Among players who started their careers in the Open Era, only Tracy Austin (13 years between 1981 and 1994) has a bigger gap than Sramkova (eight years, 2017 and 2025) between their first two main draw appearances at the Australian Open

Ostapenko:

- Making 11th appearance at Australian Open, where her best tournament result was reaching QF in 2023 (l. eventual finalist Rybakina)
- Owns one Grand Slam singles title, triumphing at 2017 Roland Garros (d. Halep in final)
- Currently one win away from claiming her 60th career Grand Slam main draw match-win in singles
- Reached consecutive Australian Open women's doubles finals in 2024 (w/L. Kichenok) and 2025 (w/Hsieh); finished runner-up on both occasions

Tereza Valentova (CZE #54) vs. [30] Maya Joint (AUS #31)

First meeting

Valentova:

- Making her debut appearance at the Australian Open
- Contesting her 3rd career Grand Slam main draw; reached 2r at Roland Garros and US Open last year, both times as a qualifier (2-0 in Grand Slam 1r matches)
- Owns 5 wins over Top 50 players, most recently over No.24 Jelena Ostapenko (via ret.) at Adelaide this year
- Was the fourth-youngest player to reach a Tour-level final in 2025 (runner-up in Osaka) - older only than Lilli Tagger (Jiujiang runner-up), Iva Jovic (Guadalajara winner) and Mirra Andreeva (Dubai and Indian Wells winner)
- Currently ranked at a new career-high of No.54; this time last year was ranked No.242

Joint:

- The Australian No.1 is making her 2nd main draw appearance at the Australian Open, where her previous result was 1r in 2025 (l. No.7 seed Pegula)
- Contesting her 6th career Grand Slam main draw; best Grand Slam results are 2r finishes at US Open 2024 (l. Keys) and 2025 (l. eventual finalist Anisimova)
- First time being seeded at a Grand Slam event (as No.30 seed); she is also the first Australian woman to be seeded at this tournament since No.1 seed Barty won the 2022 title
- In 2025, Joint became the first teenager competing for Australia to claim 30+ Tour-level wins in a single calendar year since Jelena Dokic in 2000
- Is currently ranked at a new career-high of No.31; this time last year was ranked No.105

Daria Kasatkina (AUS #43) vs. [Q] Nikola Bartunkova (CZE #126)

First meeting

Kasatkina:

- Making 11th appearance at Australian Open (all consecutive since 2016), and is contesting the 40th Grand Slam main draw of her career
- Has won her last 11 first-round matches at Grand Slam events (30-9 record in Grand Slam 1r matches overall)
- Career-best showing at the tournament is her R16 run last year (l. Navarro in a meeting between Top 10 players)
- Best Grand Slam performance is SF at 2022 Roland Garros (l. eventual champion Swiatek); also made QFs at 2018 Roland Garros (l. eventual finalist Stephens) and 2018 Wimbledon (l. eventual champion Kerber)
- Since the start of 2023, Kasatkina has won 19 of 25 matches vs. players ranked outside the Top 100

Bartunkova:

- Successfully came through qualifying to make her Grand Slam main draw debut
- Seeking her 2nd career Top 50 win (d. No.30 Magdalena Frech at WTA 500 Guadalajara last year)
- Career-best Tour-level result on hard court is reaching SF at WTA 500 Guadalajara last year as a wild card (l. eventual champion Jovic); she made her Top 200 debut following that breakthrough run
- 19-year-old Bartunkova is one of eight teenagers to start this fortnight's main draw (one of the eight, her fellow Czech Sara Bejlek, will turn 20 just before the end of the tournament)

Zhang Shuai (CHN #75) vs. [WC] Taylah Preston (AUS #161)

Zhang leads 1-0

Zhang:

- Making 14th main draw appearance at Australian Open
- Her best Australian Open singles result is reaching the quarterfinals as a qualifier in 2016 (l. Konta); before that breakthrough run, she had been 0-14 in Grand Slam main draw matches
- Reached her second career Grand Slam quarterfinal at 2019 Wimbledon (l. eventual champion Halep)
- Only 2014 Australian Open champion Li Na (34) has won more main draw matches at the Australian Open than Zhang Shuai (16) among Chinese players in the Open Era
- Won 2019 Australian Open women's doubles title alongside Australia's Samantha Stosur; they also teamed up to win the 2021 US Open women's doubles title

Preston:

- Making 2nd main draw appearance at Australian Open; her previous main draw result was 1r in 2024 (l. Svitolina)
- Contested another Grand Slam main draw at 2024 US Open (as wild card, l. Pavlyuchenkova in 1r); still seeking her first Grand Slam main draw match-win
- Last week, had breakthrough run to first career Tour-level semifinal in Hobart, where she posted her career-best win by ranking over No.29 Raducanu in QF (l. Jovic in SF)
- Earlier this month, lost to today's opponent Zhang Shuai in three sets in Brisbane qualifying

[Q] Maddison Inglis (AUS #168) vs. Kimberly Birrell (AUS #76)

Birrell leads 5-2

Inglis:

- Successfully came through qualifying to reach her 4th Australian Open main draw (first since 2022)
- Best result at Australian Open was reaching 3r in 2022 as a wild card (d. Fernandez and Baptiste, I. Kanepi)
- Contesting her 7th career Grand Slam main draw; her 2022 run in Melbourne is the only time she has won Grand Slam main draw matches
- Most recent Tour-level main draw win over a Top 100 player was over No.24 Fernandez at 2022 Australian Open

Birrell:

- Making 7th main draw appearance at Australian Open; her tournament-best result is reaching 3r in 2019 as a wild card ranked No.240 (d. Badosa and Vekic, I. Kerber)
- That 2019 run in Melbourne is also her career-best Grand Slam finish; she also made 2r here in 2023 but has yet to win a main-draw match at any of the other Slams
- Just last week, made her first career WTA 500 SF in Adelaide (I. Mboko), returning to Top 100 in the process
- Career-best Tour-level showings on hard court are her runner-up finishes at 2024 Osaka (I. Lamens in final) and 2025 Chennai (I. Tjen in final)

Karolina Pliskova (CZE #1057) vs. [Q] Sloane Stephens (USA #1102)

Stephens leads 6-1

Pliskova:

- Former World No.1 is making her 12th main draw appearance at Australian Open, and first since 2024 (missed the majority of 2025 season following ankle surgery in September 2024)
- Contesting her first Tour-level event since 2024 US Open, where she obtained her most recent Tour-level match-win (d. Sherif in 1r) before suffering injury vs. Paolini in 2r
- Her best Australian Open result is 2019 SF (I. eventual champion Osaka); also made QF in 2017, 2018 and 2023
- 2-time Grand Slam singles runner-up: 2016 US Open (I. Kerber in 3 sets) and 2021 Wimbledon (I. Barty in 3 sets)
- Holds a 9-2 record in Australian Open 1r matches (36-12 in Grand Slam 1r matches overall)

Stephens:

- Successfully came through qualifying to make her 14th main draw appearance at Australian Open (9th consecutive) – that was her first appearance in Grand Slam qualifying since 2011 Wimbledon
- Her best Australian Open result is making the 2013 semifinals – she reached her first career Grand Slam QF and SF during that run (I. eventual champion Azarenka)
- Best Grand Slam result is winning 2017 US Open title ranked No.83 (d. Keys in all-American final); also finished runner-up at 2018 Roland Garros (I. Halep in final)
- Seeking her first Tour-level match-win since 2024 Wimbledon (d. Jacquemot in 1r)
- This is only the second Australian Open main draw match since 1990 to feature both players ranked outside the Top 300 (No.317 Marino d. No.739 Birrell in 2021 Australian Open 1r)

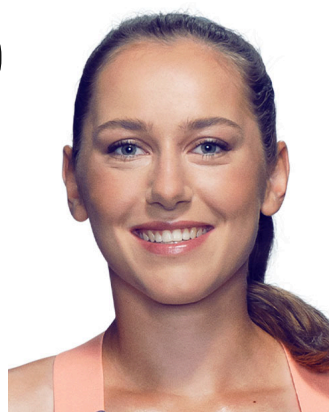

- Is currently ranked No.5; this time last year was ranked No.7. Reached career-high ranking of No.3 for the first time in 2023

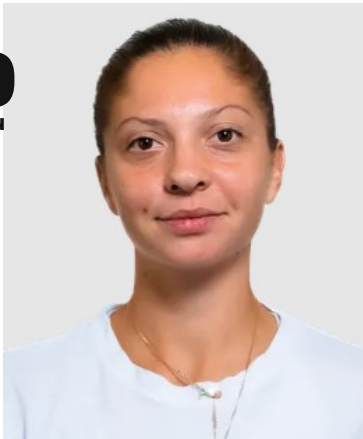

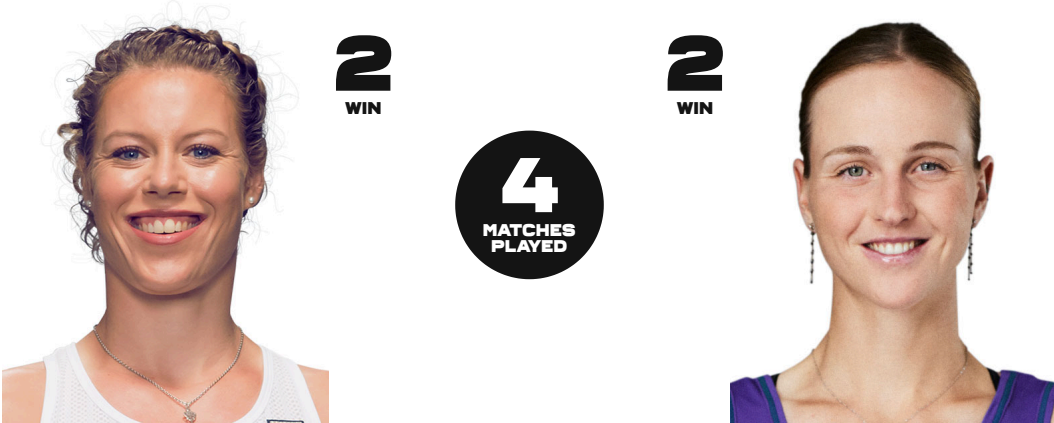
