DAY 4 – WEDNESDAY, JANUARY 21

[1] Aryna Sabalenka (#1) vs. [Q] Bai Zhuoxuan (CHN #702)

First meeting

Sabalenka:

- Has reached the Australian Open final on her last three outings here, triumphing in 2023 (d. Rybakina in F) and 2024 (d. Zheng in F) and finishing as R-Up in 2025 (l. Keys)
- Including her opening round win, has 101 Grand Slam main draw wins
- Is the current PIF WTA World No.1 and cannot lose the ranking across the Australian Open fortnight. These next two weeks will be her 74th and 75th weeks in the No.1 position, sitting 11th on the all-time list
- Last loss against a player ranked outside Top 700 came at an ITF event in 2015 (l. No.1060 Evgeniya Levashova)

Bai:

- Has equaled her career best result at a Grand Slam was 2r run at Wimbledon 2023 (l. Jabeur)
- The No.31 ranked Chinese player (at No.702)
- Played only one tournament at Tour level in 2025 reaching QF at Jiujiang
- Entered the tournament with 55 rankings points; by reaching the second round as a qualifier, will add 110 points (40 from qualifying + 70 from reaching second round)
- Facing a Top 10 ranked opponent for second time in career (previously, lost to No.6 Jabeur at 2025 Wimbledon)
- Highest ranked opponent Bai has defeated: No.33 Ann Li at 2025 Jiujiang
- Last Chinese player to defeat a World No.1 opponent was 2025 (Zheng Qinwen def. Sabalenka at 2025 Rome)
- Last Chinese woman to defeat a World No.1 opponent at a Slam was Li Na (2011 Australian Open, def. Wozniacki)

[3] Coco Gauff (USA #3) vs. Olga Danilovic (SRB #69)

First meeting

Gauff:

- Making her seventh Grand Slam main draw appearance at the Australian Open, with best result here coming with semifinal run in 2024 (l. Sabalenka)
- Overall this is her 26th Grand Slam main draw appearance, she is a two-time Slam champion, winning the US Open in 2023 and Roland Garros 2025, defeating Sabalenka in both finals
- With opening round win, recorded her 75th Grand Slam main draw win (current record stands at 75-23); became youngest player to reach 75 Grand Slam wins since 2008 (Maria Sharapova)
- At Grand Slam level, has won her last 22 matches against players ranked outside the Top 50, last falling to No.128 Kenin at Wimbledon 2023

Danilovic:

- Making 11th Grand Slam main draw appearance (3rd at Australian Open)
- Best career Grand Slam result was R16 at 2024 Roland Garros and 2025 Australian Open
- Facing Top 5 ranked opponent for 2nd time in career; previously lost to No.1 Sabalenka at 2025 Roland Garros

Magdalena Frech (POL #57) vs. [7] Jasmine Paolini (ITA #8)

Tied 1-1

Frech:

- Making 19th Grand Slam main draw appearance (5th at Australian Open); best result came at 2024 Australian Open reaching R16
- Has reached the R32 at a Slam four times, including twice at the Australian Open (2024, R16; 2025, R32); also at 2022 Wimbledon (R32) and 2025 US Open (R32)
- Owns 2 career Top 10 wins defeating No.7 Mirra Andreeva (2025 Berlin) and No.8 Emma Navarro (2024 Wuhan); previously was 2-20 vs Top 10 opponents
- Her sole career title came on hard court at Guadalajara 2024

Paolini:

- 2026 Australian Open is her landmark 25th Grand Slam main draw appearance, and is a two-time Slam R-Up, contesting the title match at 2024 Roland-Garros (I. Swiatek) and 2024 Wimbledon (I. Krejcikova)
- Is a Grand Slam champion in doubles, winning 2025 Roland-Garros w/Errani
- Defeated Frech in their only previous hard court meeting at 2023 Cleveland
- Only player currently ranked in Top 10 in both singles and doubles (No.3); has been ranked in Top 10 in singles since June 10, 2024

Maria Sakkari (GRE #53) vs. [8] Mirra Andreeva (#7)

First meeting

Sakkari:

- Making 11th appearance at Australian Open; best result was reaching R16 in 2022 (I. Pegula) and 2020 (I. Kvitova)
- Contesting the 40th Grand Slam main draw of her career; best Grand Slam results are SFs 2021 Roland Garros and 2021 US Open
- Owns 28 wins in career over Top 10 players, most recently overcoming No.6 Jasmine Paolini at Madrid 2025. Last Top 10 win at Slam level came at US Open in 2021, defeating No.4 Ka.Pliskova
- Seeking first Top 10 win on hardcourts since 2024 Indian Wells (d. No.3 Gauff); has lost 8-straight vs. Top 10 opponents on hardcourts
- Bidding to reach R32 for the sixth time at the Australian Open (most recently 2023)
- Made debut here in 2016, which was just second Grand Slam main draw appearance, making 2r (as qualifier, I. Suarez Navarro)
- Reached career high ranking of No.3 for the first time in 2022

Andreeva:

- Is a Grand Slam semifinalist, reaching the last four at 2024 Roland-Garros
- Defeated Vekic in 1r; is now approaching her 30th Grand Slam main draw win, current record standing at 29-11
- Secured fourth career title last week at WTA 500 Adelaide last week - has now won a title at each WTA level, WTA 250 Iasi (2024) and WTA 1000 Dubai and Indian Wells (2025)
- Fell to three consecutive players ranked outside the Top 50 in at the end of 2025, losing to No.81 Kartal (Beijing), No.57 Siegemund (Wuhan) and No.219 Zhu Lin (Ningbo)

[12] Elina Svitolina (UKR #12) vs. [Q] Linda Klimovicova (POL #134)

First meeting

Svitolina:

- Making 13th appearance at Australian Open, where she was a three-time quarterfinalist in 2025 (l. eventual champion Keys), 2019 (l. eventual champion Osaka) and 2018 (l. Mertens)
- Best result at Grand Slams was SF run at Wimbledon 2023 (l. eventual champion Vondrousova), US Open 2019 (l. Serena Williams), Wimbledon 2019 (l. eventual champion Halep)
- Looking to reach 3r at Australian Open for the 11th time in her career (only failed to reach once before in her 2013 debut when she played 1r)
- 12 out of her 19 career singles titles came on hard court, most recently at Auckland 2026 (d. Wang Xinyu in F)

Klimovicova:

- Currently No.4 ranked Polish woman in PIF WTA Rankings behind No.2 Iga Swiatek, No.50 Magda Linette and No.57 Magdalena Frech
- Her 1r win over Jones (via retirement) is her first career Tour level main draw match win
- This is her first Grand Slam main draw appearance (played qualifying at 2025 & 2024 US Open, 2025 Wimbledon and 2025 Roland Garros)
- Prior to 2025 Australian Open, had only met two Top 100 players before: 2025 WTA 125 Limoges (l. No.73 Ruzic) and 2025 Wimbledon qualifying (l. No.89 Jovic)
- Reached a peak ranking of No.133 to kick off the 2026 season, this time last year was ranked No.272

[17] Victoria Mboko (CAN #16) vs. Caty McNally (USA #85)

McNally leads 1-0

Mboko:

- Making Australian Open debut; made her Grand Slam main draw debuts at Roland Garros, Wimbledon and US Open in 2025 posting her best result at Roland Garros by reaching 3r as a qualifier (l. Zheng Qinwen)
- Has won her last eight consecutive matches against players ranked outside the Top 50
- Both career titles have come on hard court, at Hong Kong 2025 and Montreal 2025 (as an 18-year-old wild card)
- Coming off the back of reaching a third career final last week at Adelaide (l. Andreeva)
- Owns 3-2 career record against players from United States of America, 1-0 in 2026 with a win over Madison Keys at Adelaide 2026

McNally:

- Making 4th appearance at Australian Open; best result was reaching 2r in 2023 (l. Bajndl) and 2020 (l. S. Zhang)
- Playing in her 11th Grand Slam main draw, with best result being a 3r run at US Open 2020 (l. Mertens)
- Bidding for her first career win against a Top 20 player in today's match (previously 0-10)
- Best career results on hard court are SF runs at Merida 2023 and Washington DC 2019
- Owns 1-0 record against Mboko, defeating her in the 1r of the W50 Austin ITF event in 2024, when Mboko was 17-years-old

[19] Karolina Muchova (CZE #19) vs. Alycia Parks (USA #99)

Parks leads 1-0

Muchova:

- Making 6th appearance at Australian Open, her previous best result is SF run in 2021, defeating No.1 seed and home favorite Ashleigh Barty in the QFs (l. Jennifer Brady in SF)
- Is competing in her 26th Grand Slam main draw, her best result at a major is R-Up run at Roland Garros 2023 (l. Swiatek in F)
- Her sole career title came on hard court at Seoul 2019 (d. Linette in F)
- Coming off the back of reaching a 16th Tour-level semifinal at Brisbane 2026 (l. Sabalenka)

Parks:

- Making 2nd main draw appearance at Australian Open; her previous result is a 3r run in 2024 (l. Gauff), this is her best career result across all four majors
- Owns 7 career wins over Top 20 players, most recently defeated No.11 Navarro at Monterrey 2025
- Owns 2-7 career record against players from Czech Republic, with wins over Muchova at Roland Garros 2025 and Karolina Pliskova at Ostrava 2022
- Her sole career WTA title came on hard court at Lyon 2023 (d. No.1 seed Garcia in F)

[WC] Talia Gibson (AUS #119) vs. [23] Diana Shnaider (#22)

First meeting

Gibson:

- Making 3rd appearance at Australian Open, where her previous best result was reaching 2r in 2025; she registered her first Tour-level main draw win at last year's Australian Open (d. Sonmez)
- Bidding for her first career win over a Top 50 opponent in today's match (0-8 record)
- Best career results on hard court are 2r at Australian Open 2025, Cleveland 2025 and now Australian Open 2026
- Best result by a wild card at Australian Open is R-Up run by Justine Henin in 2010

Shnaider:

- Making 4th appearance at Australian Open; her best tournament result is making 3r last year (l. Vekic)
- Career-best Grand Slam showing is 4r run at US Open 2024 (l. eventual finalist Pegula)
- Three of her five career WTA titles have come on hard court: Monterrey 2025; Hong Kong 2024 and Hua Hin 2024
- So far this season, made Brisbane 2r (l. Madison Keys) and Adelaide SF (l. eventual champion Mirra Andreeva)

Anastasia Potapova (AUT #55) vs. [28] Emma Raducanu (GBR #29)

First meeting

Potapova:

- Making 8th appearance at Australian Open, where previous best result was 3r in 2021 (l. Serena Williams)
- Best result across all majors was R16 run at Roland Garros 2024 (l. eventual champion Swiatek)
- This is her first season representing Austria; with change of nationality, is the highest ranked player competing for Austria since Yvonne Meusburger on July 14th, 2014 (World No. 42).
- The last player competing for Austria to reach the 3r was Yvonne Meusburger in 2014

Raducanu:

- Making 5th appearance at Australian Open; her previous best result is reaching the 3r in 2025 (l. Swiatek)
- Owns 22-9 career record vs. players ranked outside the Top 100
- Best career result on hard court is winning the US Open on her debut appearance in 2021 (as a qualifier)
- Reached her 14th career quarterfinal in opening weeks of 2026 season at Hobart (l. Preston)

[29] Iva Jovic (USA #27) vs. [WC] Priscilla Hon (AUS #121)

First meeting

Jovic:

- Making 2nd appearance at Australian Open; in 2025 she reached the 2r (as a WC, l. Rybakina)
- Bidding to reach the 3r of a major for the first time today on her sixth Grand Slam appearance
- Owns 8-1 career record vs. players ranked outside the Top 100, has won the last 7 of these matches consecutively
- Is currently ranked at a career-high of No.27; this time last year was ranked No.191
- Reached her second WTA Tour-level final at Hobart last week, after title run at Guadalajara at 17-years-old

Hon:

- Making 5th appearance at Australian Open, where her previous best result was reaching the 2r in 2020 (l. Kerber)
- Making her 10th Grand Slam appearance; her best result is 3r run at US Open 2025 (l. Li)
- Owns 4 career wins over Top 50 players, most recently No.24 Jelena Ostapenko at Beijing 2025
- Prior to Australian Open, fell in Q1 at Brisbane (l. Putintseva); registered first win of her 2026 season in the 1r here
- Last time a wildcard reached the R32 at the Australian Open was 2022 (Maddison Inglis, R32)

[Q] Storm Hunter (AUS #367) vs. Hailey Baptiste (USA #70)

Baptiste leads 1-0

Hunter:

- Making 7th appearance at Australian Open, where her previous best result was reaching the 3r in 2024 (as a qualifier, I. Krejcikova), which is also her best result across all four majors
- Is competing in her 12th Grand Slam main draw, and her first in two years since Australian Open 2024
- Owns 10 career wins over Top 100 opponents; most recently defeated No.40 Bouzas Maneiro in the 1r here
- Best career results on hard court are QF runs at Prague 2021 and Adelaide 2021
- Best results at Australian Open by qualifiers are SF runs by Dayana Yastremska in 2024 and Christine Dorey in 1978
- Last year, no qualifiers advanced to R32 in Melbourne; however, in 2024, four qualifiers reached the R32 at the Australian Open, including Hunter (R32)

Baptiste:

- Making 3rd appearance at Australian Open, she is through to the 2r here for a second time after 2022
- Competing in her 11th Grand Slam main draw at this year's Australian Open; her best result is a 4r run at Roland Garros 2025 (I. Keys)
- Best career result on hard court is QF run at Auckland 2025
- Prior to this year's Australian Open, fell in the 1r at Brisbane and Hobart; registered her first win of the 2026 season in the 1r here
- Nine players from the United States of America have won the title here in Melbourne, most recent was Madison Keys in 2025

Ajla Tomljanovic (AUS #78) vs. Elena-Gabriela Ruse (ROU #79)

Tied 1-1

Tomljanovic:

- Making 11th main draw appearance at Australian Open
- Has reached Australian Open 2r on six occasions (including the last two years) but is yet to advance beyond that
- Best Grand Slam results are three quarterfinal finishes: 2021 Wimbledon (I. eventual champion Barty), 2022 Wimbledon (I. eventual champion Rybakina), and 2022 US Open (I. eventual finalist Jabeur)
- Most recent Australian to win this title is Ashleigh Barty in 2022

Ruse:

- Making 3rd main draw appearance at Australian Open, where she reached 2r in 2022 and 2025
- As a qualifier at last year's Australian Open, pushed eventual champion Madison Keys to 7-5 in the third set before falling in 2r
- Best career Grand Slam showing is 3r at 2024 US Open (I. Badosa in 3rd-set tiebreak)
- Posted her second Grand Slam win over a seeded player by defeating No. 26 seed Yastremska in 1r; also defeated No.8 seed Krejcikova in 2r of 2024 US Open
- Best result by Romania at Australian Open was runner-up finish by Simona Halep in 2018 (I. Wozniacki in final)

- Is a 19-time hard court champion, including earlier this season when she defended her Brisbane title
- Is the current PIF WTA World No.1, and cannot lose the ranking across the Australian Open fortnight. These next two weeks will be her 74th and 75th weeks in the No.1 position, sitting 11th on the all-time list
- Won the Australian Open doubles title w/Mertens in 2021


