DAY 7 – SATURDAY, JANUARY 24

[31] Anna Kalinskaya (#33) vs. [2] Iga Swiatek (POL #2)

Swiatek leads 2-1

Kalinskaya:

- This is her 21st career Grand Slam main draw appearance and fifth time reaching the R32
- With a win would advance to the R16 for third time in career – previously QF at 2024 Australian Open and R16 at 2024 Wimbledon
- Owns 5-7 record against Top 5 ranked opponents; defeated two Top 5 opponents on hardcourts at 2024 Dubai (def. No.3 Gauff in QF and No.1 Swiatek in SF)

Swiatek:

- Bidding to reach R16 at a Slam for the 21st time in career; since 2019 (when she made her R16 debut) has reached more R16 than any other player on Tour – followed by Gauff and Sabalenka (with 16 each entering this year's Australian Open)
- Making her eighth main draw appearance at the Australian Open, where she is a two-time semifinalist, making the last four in 2022 (l. Collins) and 2025 (l. eventual champion Keys)
- Is a six-time Grand Slam champion, with four titles at Roland Garros (2020, 2022-24), one US Open crown (2022) and most recently winning Wimbledon 2025
- Bidding to be the third youngest player in the Open Era to complete a career Grand Slam

Peyton Stearns (USA #68) vs. [4] Amanda Anisimova (USA #4)

Stearns leads 1-0

Stearns:

- Making 3rd appearance at Australian Open, she is through to the 3r here for the first time after 1r exits on her two previous appearances
- With a win would equal career-best result at a Grand Slam (also R16 at 2023 US Open (l. No.9 Vondrousova))
- Owns 1-0 head-to-head record against Anisimova, defeating her in three sets at Madrid 2025
- Defeated fellow American and the 2020 Australian Open champion Sofia Kenin in the 1r here this week
- Owns 2-12 career record vs. Top 10 players, with wins over No.6 Madison Keys at Rome 2025 and No.8 Zheng Qinwen at Dubai 2025

Anisimova:

- Has reached the R16 at a Slam nine times, including three times at the Australian Open, in 2019 (l. eventual R-Up Kvitova), 2022 (l. eventual champion Barty) and 2024 (l. eventual champion Sabalenka)
- Overall, this is her 24th Grand Slam main draw appearance, and she has contested two Slam finals, finishing R-Up in 2025 at Wimbledon (l. Swiatek) and US Open (l. Sabalenka)
- Contesting this year's Australian Open as No.4 seed; this is the highest she has been seeded at a Grand Slam
- Owns 9-2 career record in Grand Slam 3r matches (3-0 here at Australian Open)
- This time last year was ranked No.35. Reached a career-high ranking of No.3 earlier this month
- Has won her last 17 Grand Slam matches after taking the first set - last losing to Qinwen Zheng (US Open 2024)

[5] Elena Rybakina (KAZ #5) vs. Tereza Valentova (CZE #54)

Rybakina leads 1-0

Rybakina:

- Contested the title match here in 2023, finishing as R-Up (l. Sabalenka)
- Overall this is her 26th Grand Slam main draw appearance
- Won lone Tour-level meeting against Valentova in 2r at US Open 2025
- Holds a record of 9-2 at Australian Open when facing players ranked outside the Top 50
- Since 2022, only Aryna Sabalenka, Iga Swiatek (76 each) and Coco Gauff (58) have claimed more wins than Elena Rybakina (47) in Women's Singles at Grand Slams
- Has won 15 of her last 16 matches - only losing to Karolina Muchova in Brisbane's quarter-final this season
- Won her last 19 matches when she has won the first set, last losing to Victoria Mboko at Montreal 2025

Valentova:

- Making third career Grand Slam appearance (Australian Open main draw debut)
- Win over No.31 ranked Maya Joint in opening round was third highest ranked opponent she has defeated having previously won over No.21 Mertens (2025 Osaka) and No.24 Ostapenko (2026 Adelaide)
- One of five teenagers through to the R32 – the most at the Australian Open since 2009 (also five)
- Seeking first Tour-level win against a Top 10 player (0-3 in previous such matches)
- Is currently ranked No.54; this time last year was ranked No.242

[6] Jessica Pegula (USA #6) vs. Oksana Selekhmeteva (#101)

First meeting

Pegula:

- Is a three-time Australian Open quarterfinalist, reaching the QFs here in 2021 (l. eventual finalist Brady), 2022 (l. eventual champion Barty) and 2023 (l. Azarenka)
- Has reached at least the QF stage at all four Slams, with QF runs also at Roland Garros 2022 (l. eventual champion Swiatek), Wimbledon 2023 (l. eventual champion Vondrousova), and finishing R-Up at US Open 2024 (l. Sabalenka)
- Record in 3r matches at Grand Slams is 10-6; 3-1 at Australian Open with her only 3r loss here coming last year (l. Danilovic)
- Six of her 9 WTA titles have come on hard court
- Is currently ranked No.6 (career high at No.3 in 2022)
- Bidding to reach R16 for 11th time in career (would be her 4th time through to R16 at the Australian Open) having previously reached the QF three times (2021, 2022, 2023)

Selekhmeteva:

- Making 2nd appearance at Australian Open, where her previous result was reaching 1r in 2023 (l. Vekic)
- Playing in 5th Grand Slam main draw with best coming this week by reaching 2r for the first time in her career
- First time appearing in Grand Slam main draw without going through the qualifying draw
- Win over No. 26 Badosa in R64 was the highest ranked opponent she has defeated in her career; this is her second meeting against a Top 30 ranked opponent
- Best career result on hardcourt is QF at Prague 2022
- This time last year was ranked No.168. Broke into the Top 100 for the first time in November 2025

Karolina Pliskova (CZE #1057) vs. [9] Madison Keys (USA #9)

Pliskova leads 1-0

Pliskova:

- Since WTA Match Stats began being recorded in 2008, has served more aces than any player (4,327 – entering Australian Open); Keys sits at 6th most in that time (2,713)
- Former World No.1 is making her 12th main draw appearance at Australian Open, and first since 2024 (missed the majority of 2025 season following ankle surgery in September 2024)
- Contesting her first Tour-level event since 2024 US Open
- Her best Australian Open result is 2019 SF (l. eventual champion Osaka); also made QF in 2017, 2018 and 2023
- 2-time Grand Slam singles runner-up: 2016 US Open (l. Kerber in 3 sets) and 2021 Wimbledon (l. Barty in 3 sets)
- Reached World No.1 for the first time on July 17, 2017 and held that spot for a total of 8 weeks
- Owns 1-0 head-to-head against Keys, defeating her in the final at Brisbane 2020

Keys:

- Returns to the Australian Open to make her 12th appearance, this time as the defending champion (defeated Sabalenka in 2025 final for 1st career Grand Slam title)
- This is her 50th Grand Slam main draw appearance
- Since the start of 2025, Keys has gone 18-5 vs. players ranked outside the Top 50
- Owns 6-3 record in 3r matches at Australian Open; her last 3r loss here came in 2023 (l. Azarenka)
- Now owns 36 match wins at the Australian Open – this is her most wins at both a single Grand Slam event and WTA level event overall

[13] Linda Noskova (CZE #13) vs. Wang Xinyu (CHN #46)

Noskova leads 1-0

Noskova:

- Achieved best career Grand Slam result at 2024 Australian Open reaching QF; this is her 14th Grand Slam main draw appearance
- Owns 1-0 head-to-head record against Wang Xinyu, defeating her in the SF at Prague 2025
- Seeded No.13 at this year's Australian Open, this is the highest she has ever been seeded at a Grand Slam
- Owns 35 career wins over Top 50 players, most recently defeated No.7 Rybakina at Tokyo 2025
- Owns one career WTA title which came on hard court at Monterrey 2024 (d. Sun in F)
- Has a chance to make Top 10 debut after the Australian Open; will need to reach the QF to have a chance

Wang:

- Making 19th Grand Slam main draw appearance (6th at Australian Open; through to R32 for first time)
- With a win would equal career-best Grand Slam result, having previously reached R16 at 2023 US Open and 2024 Wimbledon
- Kicked off her 2026 season with a run to her second career Tour-level final at Auckland (l. Svitolina in F)
- Best result by a player from China at Australian Open was title run by Li Na in 2014
- Currently No.2 ranked Chinese woman behind only No.25 Qinwen Zheng

[16] Naomi Osaka (JPN #17) vs. [Q] Maddison Inglis (AUS #168)

First meeting

Osaka:

- Making 10th appearance at Australian Open
- Two-time Australian Open champion, winning tournament in 2019 (d. Kvitova in final) and 2021 (d. Brady in final)
- Has won a total of four Grand Slam titles, also prevailing at the US Open in 2018 (d. S.Williams in final) and 2020 (d. Azarenka in final)
- One of three mothers currently ranked inside the Top 20 alongside No.12 Svitolina and No.10 Bencic
- Osaka (72) is now the second Japanese woman in the Open Era to claim 70+ Grand Slam main draw match-wins, joining Ai Sugiyama (84)
- In Grand Slam main draws, Osaka holds an 11-3 career record vs. players ranked outside the Top 100

Inglis:

- Successfully came through qualifying to reach her 4th Australian Open main draw (first since 2022)
- Has equaled her best result at Australian Open (also 3r in 2022 as WC, d. Fernandez and Baptiste, I. Kanepi)
- Contesting her 7th career Grand Slam main draw; her Melbourne 3r runs in 2022 and this year are the only times she has won main draw matches at Grand Slam events
- Her two career Top 50 wins have been at the Australian Open, defeating No.24 Fernandez in 2022 and No.48 Siegemund in R64 this week
- Currently holds an 0-4 record vs. Top 20 players in her career

[21] Elise Mertens (BEL #21) vs. [Q] Nikola Bartunkova (CZE #126)

First meeting

Mertens:

- Making 9th consecutive appearance at Australian Open, where her best result was making SF run in 2018 (l. eventual champion Caroline Wozniacki); also made R16 run three consecutive years: in 2022, 2021, 2020
- Contesting her 36th Grand Slam main draw; her best Grand Slam performance is SF at Australian Open 2018
- Is the first player to reach nine consecutive 2r at the Australian Open (2018-2026) since Svitolina (2014-2022)
- Looking to advance to her first Round of 16 at Australian since 2022
- Seven of her 12 career singles titles have come on hardcourt: Singapore in 2025, Monastir in 2023 & 2022, Melbourne 500 2021, Doha in 2019, Hobart in 2018 & 2017
- Has never lost to a Qualifier or Lucky Loser at a Grand Slam (9-0 in such matches)
- So far this season, went 3-1 in singles at United Cup (Belgium made SF, l. Switzerland)

Bartunkova:


- Successfully came through qualifying to make her Grand Slam main draw debut
- Seeking her third win of the tournament against a Top 50 player (had one such win prior)
- Career-best Tour-level result on hard court is reaching SF at WTA 500 Guadalajara last year as a wild card (l. eventual champion Jovic); she made her Top 200 debut following that breakthrough run
- Is competing in her sixth Tour-level main draw event at this year's Australian Open (5-5 career match record)
- One of five teenagers through to the R32 – the most at the Australian Open since 2009 (also five)
- One of three Qualifiers to advance to 3r, joining Maddison Inglis and Zeynep Sonmez
- Last time a qualifier reached R16 at the Australian Open was 2024 – Yastremska (SF) and Timofeeva (R16)
- One of five players from Czech Republic to reach 3r, joining Karolina Muchova, Linda Noskova, Karolina Pliskova and Tereza Valentova; Third time 5-plus Czech players have made the Third Round in a Women's Singles Grand Slam event in the Open Era (six at the US Open 2018 and five in Wimbledon 2021)

- Faces No.33 Anna Kalinskaya in 3r today; the last time Swiatek lost to an opponent outside Top 20 at Grand Slams was to No.35 Putintseva at Wimbledon 2024
- 14 of her 25 WTA Tour-level titles have come on hard court, most recently Seoul and Cincinnati in 2025
- One of 2 players from Poland to reach 3r (also Linette)
- Best results by Poland at Australian Open were SF runs by Swiatek in 2022 and 2025, Magda Linette in 2023, and Agnieszka Radwanska in 2014 and 2016
- Is currently ranked No.2; this time last year was ranked No.2
- Reached World No.1 for the first time on April 4, 2022, and held the top ranking for 125 weeks during her career (7th-most all time)

CAREER MILESTONES

- Best results of 2025 included reaching a third career final at Washington DC (l. Fernandez), SF at Singapore, and 5 additional QFs including WTA 1000 Cincinnati. In doubles, won biggest title of her career at WTA 1000 Madrid (w/Cirstea)
- Reached two finals in 2024 at Dubai and Berlin; Dubai was first time reaching a WTA 1000 final; made best career round at each Grand Slam in 2024 including first major quarterfinal at Australian Open and R16 at Wimbledon
- Made Top 20 debut on June 24, 2024 finishing the year at World No.14; hit career-high ranking of No.11 on October 28, 2024
- Made three Tour-level QF runs across 2023 at Austin (l. Collins), Charleston (l. Jabeur), and Osaka (l. Krueger); also won WTA 125 title at Midland
- Highlight of 2022 was SF run at Guadalajara 250 (l. eventual champion Stephens) and also made QFs at Washington DC (l. Kanepi) and Guadalajara 1000 (l. Bouzkova); won 3rd WTA doubles title in 2022 at St. Petersburg (w/McNally)
- In 2021, made Tour QFs at Monterrey and Courmayeur; lifted 2nd WTA doubles title at Portoroz (w/Mihalikova)

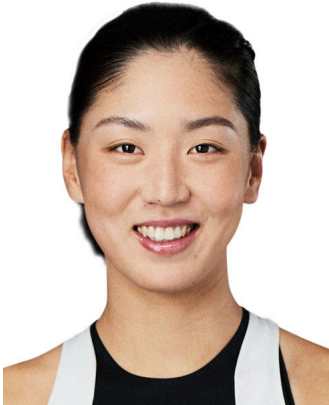

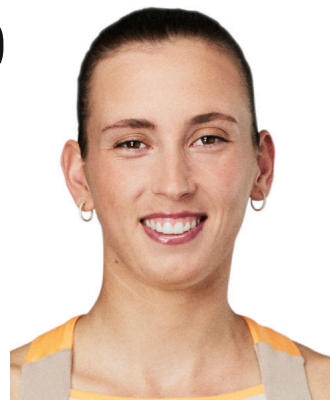
