DAY 8 – SUNDAY, JANUARY 25

[1] Aryna Sabalenka (#1) vs. [17] Victoria Mboko (CAN #16)

First meeting

Sabalenka:

- Has reached the Australian Open final in her last three outings here, winning the title in 2023 (d. Rybakina in final) and 2024 (d. Zheng in final), and finishing as runner-up in 2025 (l. Keys)
- Making her 31st Grand Slam main draw appearance; she has claimed four Grand Slam singles titles, having also won the US Open title twice (in 2024 and 2025)
- Has now made the R16 or better at the last 13 Grand Slam events she has contested; her last Slam loss before R16 was 2022 Roland Garros (l. Giorgi in 3r)
- Is through to the 4r here for a sixth consecutive season (since 2021) – she is the first player to reach this stage for 6+ consecutive years since Ekaterina Makarova (seven, 2011-2017) and Serena Williams (six, 2012-2017)
- Has won her last 19 hard-court matches vs. opponents ranked outside the Top 10; her last hard-court loss to a player outside the Top 10 was to No.11 Mirra Andreeva in the Indian Wells final last March
- Is the current PIF WTA World No.1 and cannot lose the ranking across the Australian Open fortnight. These next two weeks will be her 74th and 75th weeks in the No.1 position, sitting 11th on the all-time list
- Bidding to reach a 13th consecutive Grand Slam QF, and her 15th major QF overall
- Has won the most consecutive women's singles Grand Slam tiebreaks in the Open Era (19) – the last time she lost a tiebreak at a Grand Slam was in the 2023 Roland Garros SF vs. Muchova (she also won a tiebreak in that match)

Mboko:

- Making her Australian Open debut this year; she is the first player to make her Australian Open debut as a seeded player since Navarro in 2024 (#27)
- Competing in her first career Grand Slam R16 today
- Made her Grand Slam main draw debuts at Roland Garros, Wimbledon and US Open in 2025, posting her best Slam result of last year at Roland Garros by reaching 3r as a qualifier (l. Zheng Qinwen)
- Last week at Adelaide, she reached her third career WTA final (l. M. Andreeva); she has previously won two career WTA titles, both on hard court, at Hong Kong 2025 and Montreal 2025 (as an 18-year-old wild card)
- Owns a match record of 2-4 against Top 10 players, earning wins over No.9 Keys at Adelaide 2026 and No.2 Gauff at Montreal 2025
- Is the first Canadian woman to make Australian Open R16 since Eugenie Bouchard in 2015
- Bidding to become the third teenager since 2000 to reach the Australian Open quarterfinals on their main draw debut, after Linda Noskova in 2024 and Eugenie Bouchard in 2014

[3] Coco Gauff (USA #3) vs. [19] Karolina Muchova (CZE #19)

Gauff leads 4-0

Gauff:

- Gauff has eventually won the title in all the previous events she has faced Muchova in (Cincinnati 2023, US Open 2023, Beijing 2024, and with Team USA at the United Cup 2025)
- Making her seventh appearance at the Australian Open; her tournament-best result is a semifinal run in 2024 (l. eventual champion Sabalenka)
- Also made the quarterfinals here on her most recent Melbourne outing last year (l. Badosa)
- This is her 26th Grand Slam main draw appearance; she is a two-time Grand Slam singles champion, winning titles at 2023 US Open and 2025 Roland Garros (d. Sabalenka in both finals)
- Holds a 9-7 career record in Grand Slam 4r matches, 2-2 in Australian Open 4r matches
- Is through to a fourth consecutive 4r here at Australian Open; she is the youngest American to do this since Lindsay Davenport (five in a row, 1994-1998)
- Bidding to reach a 10th Grand Slam QF today, and third in a row here at Australian Open

Muchova:

- Making 6th main draw appearance at the Australian Open, her best result is a SF run in 2021 (l. Brady)
- Contesting in her 26th Grand Slam main draw; her best Grand Slam result is runner-up finish at 2023 Roland Garros (l. Swiatek in final)
- Is through to her 9th career Grand Slam 4r; she is 7-1 in Grand Slam 4r matches with only loss coming at US Open 2020 (l. eventual finalist Azarenka)
- Bidding to reach an 8th Grand Slam QF, and second here at Australian Open after SF run in 2021
- Achieved the 50th Grand Slam main draw win of her career by defeating Parks in this week's 2r
- Kicked off her 2026 season with a SF run at Brisbane (l. eventual champion Sabalenka), registered two Top 10 wins en route to the SF over No.10 Alexandrova and No.5 Rybakina

[12] Elina Svitolina (UKR #12) vs. [8] Mirra Andreeva (#7)

Andreeva leads 1-0

Svitolina:

- Making 13th appearance at Australian Open; she is a three-time quarterfinalist at the event, in 2018 (l. Mertens), 2019 (l. eventual champion Osaka) and 2025 (l. eventual champion Keys)
- Contesting her 48th career Grand Slam main draw, and seeking her 14th career Grand Slam QF (has made at least the QF at all 4 Grand Slam tournaments)
- Her best results at Grand Slams are three semifinal finishes, at 2019 Wimbledon (l. eventual champion Halep), 2019 US Open (l. eventual R-Up Serena Williams) and 2023 Wimbledon (l. eventual champion Vondrousova)
- Is on an 8-match winning streak at Tour events, having claimed the title at Auckland earlier this month (d. Wang Xinyu in final)
- Owns 42 career Top 10 wins at Tour events, most recently over No.7 Amanda Anisimova at 2025 Montreal
- Since the 2014 Australian Open, only Serena Williams and Madison Keys have registered more wins in women's singles at this event than Elina Svitolina (32)

Andreeva:

- Making her 3rd Australian Open appearance and has reached the Round of 16 every time; she posted R16 finishes in 2024 (l. Krejčíková) and 2025 (l. eventual runner-up Sabalenka)
- Has become the first woman to make the R16 in all of her first three main draw appearances at the Australian Open since Venus Williams (1998, 1999, 2001)
- She is the fourth woman in the Open Era to reach 3+ consecutive R16s at the Australian Open before turning 19, joining Anke Huber, Martina Hingis and Nicole Pietrangeli
- Contesting her 12th Grand Slam main draw of career and has already reached her 7th career Grand Slam R16
- Career-best Grand Slam result is semifinal run at 2024 Roland Garros (l. Paolini); also made two Grand Slam quarterfinals in 2025 (Roland Garros and Wimbledon)
- Currently on a 7-match winning streak, having claimed her fourth career WTA singles title last week at Adelaide (d. fellow teenager Mboko in final)
- Her 2r win over Sakkari was her 30th career Grand Slam main draw win – since 2000, Andreeva is the 4th woman to register 30+ Grand Slam main draw wins before turning 19, joining Sharapova, Vaidisova and Gauff

Yulia Putintseva (KAZ #94) vs. [29] Iva Jovic (USA #27)

First meeting

Putintseva:

- Making 14th consecutive main draw appearance at Australian Open; this is the first time she has reached the 4r after 3r losses in 2025, 2021, 2020 and 2016
- This is her 44th consecutive Grand Slam main draw, tied with Siniakova for the most consecutive Slam main draws among active players
- Is through to a fifth career Grand Slam 4r; she is 3-1 in 4r matches at majors, and is bidding to reach a fourth career Grand Slam QF today (first at Australian Open)
- Her best Slam results are 3 quarterfinal showings (2016 Roland Garros, 2018 Roland Garros and 2020 US Open)
- Best career Tour-level result on hard court is Runner-Up three times: Nur-Sultan in 2021, Guangzhou in 2018 and St. Petersburg in 2017

Jovic:

- Making her 2nd appearance at Australian Open; on her previous appearance in 2025 she reached the 2r (as a WC, l. Rybakina)
- Competing in her sixth career Grand Slam main draw, and is into a Grand Slam 4r for the first time (also seeded at a Grand Slam for the first time)
- Owns 10 match wins already this year, the most of any player on the Tour
- Holds 10-2 record so far in 2026, including Auckland SF (l. eventual champion Svitolina) and Hobart final (l. Cocciaretto)
- Defeated No.8 Jasmine Paolini in the 3r to register first career Top 10 win (previously 0-3 vs. Top 10 players)
- Won her first career WTA singles title last year at WTA 500 Guadalajara as a 17-year-old (d. Arango in final)

CAREER MILESTONES

- Won a Tour leading four titles in 2025, including her 4th career Grand Slam title at US Open (d. Anisimova in final) as well as Madrid, Miami and Brisbane; also finished runner-up at WTA Finals, Australian Open, Roland Garros, Indian Wells and Stuttgart for a Tour leading nine finals overall
- Ended 2025 by finishing at World No.1 for the second straight year, posting the most Tour match wins of any player with 63 and setting a new WTA single-season record in prize money with \$15,008,519
- Reached seven finals across 2024, defending her Australian Open crown, winning the US Open and also won titles at Cincinnati and Wuhan. Recaptured the No.1 ranking in October and finished the season as the WTA Year-End No.1 for the first time in her career
- Outstanding 2023 saw her win debut Grand Slam title at Australian Open (d. Rybakina in F), reach second Major final at US Open (l. Gauff in F) and become the WTA World No.1 player for the first time in career (after US Open). In addition won titles at Adelaide and Madrid
- Highlight of 2022 season was R-Up finish at WTA Finals in Fort Worth (l. Garcia in F); upset No.1 Swiatek, No.2 Jabeur and No.3 Pegula en route to final - only the fourth woman in history to beat the No.1, No.2 and No.3 at the same tournament
- Lifted two titles during 2021 campaign, at Abu Dhabi and Madrid, while was R-Up at Stuttgart. Also reached a further three SFs, including at Wimbledon and US Open
- In doubles, lifted second major at 2021 Australian Open (w/Mertens, d. Krejčíková/Siniakova in F)
- Won final nine matches of 2020 to end the year with back-to-back titles - at Ostrava (d. Azarenka in F) and Linz (d. Mertens in F) - and ranked at No.10. Having also taken home the silverware at Doha (d. Kvitová in F), was one of two players (also Halep) to lift three singles titles during disrupted 2020 season
- Ended as World No.11 for the second straight year in 2019 after capturing three WTA singles titles at Shenzhen (d. Riske in F), Wuhan (d. Riske in F) and Zhuhai (d. Bertens in F)
- Made Top-10 debut on January 28, 2019 following 3rd run at 2019 Australian Open
- Ended 2019 at No.2 in WTA doubles rankings after capturing first Grand Slam doubles trophy at US Open (w/Mertens, d. Azarenka/Barty in F). Earlier in the season, the pair claimed the
- A breakthrough season in 2025 saw her lift her first WTA title during a fairytale run on home soil at Montreal as an 18-year-old wild card, registering her first Top 10 win over No.2 Gauff along the way. Three months later she was crowned champion of WTA 250 Hong Kong.
- Started 2025 ranked outside the Top 300 and closed the season with a year-end career high ranking of No.18
- Played only at ITF level in 2024 earning a further title at W35 Darmstadt (Germany) and broke into the Top 300 for the first time
- In 2023 secured her second ITF career title at W60 Saskatoon
- In 2022 played qualifying at WTA 1000 Toronto and main draw at WTA 250 Granby in her first WTA Tour level appearances
- Claimed her first ITF title in 2022 at W25 Saskatoon (Canada)
- Played first ITF tournament at W15 Prokuplje (Serbia) in 2021 at the age of 14

- 'Sunshine Double' by winning back-to-back titles at Indian Wells (d. Krejčíková/Siniakova in F) and Miami (d. Stosur/ Zhang in F)
- Enjoyed breakthrough season in 2018, lifting two titles, at New Haven (d. Suarez Navarro in F) and Wuhan (d. Kontaveit in F), winning 46 matches and finishing at No.11 in the rankings. Entered Top 50 on April 16 after run to Lugano final, and Top 20 on August 27 following New Haven title
- Broke into Top 100 at No.76 on October 16, 2017 after reaching first Tour-level final at Tianjin (l. Sharapova). Also in 2017 made SF at Tashkent (l. Babos) and lifted WTA 125k Series title at Mumbai (d. Jakupovic)
- Made Grand Slam main draw debut at 2017 Wimbledon, falling in 2r (as qualifier, d. Khromacheva, l. Witthoeft)
- Fell 1r on main draw debut at 2017 Dubai (as qualifier, l. Ka.Bondarenko). WTA qualifying debut came at 2016 Rabat
- Lifted first three ITF Circuit titles in 2015, including a 13-match win streak towards the year's end, winning back-to-back trophies in Antalya, Turkey
- Made debut on ITF Circuit in Minsk in 2012

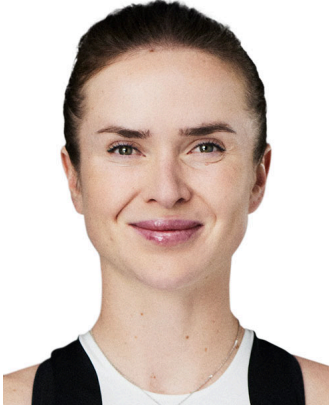

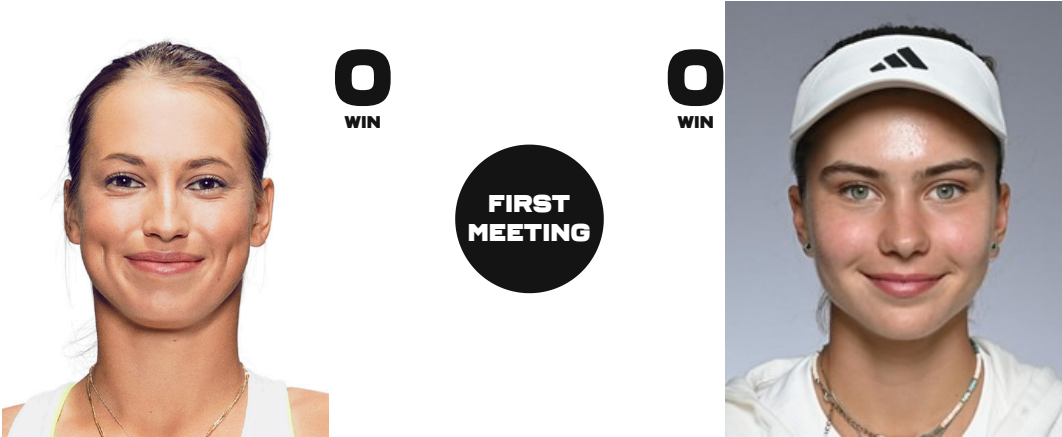

- Standout results of 2020 were QF runs at US Open (first Kazakh woman to reach last eight in New York; l. Brady) and Rome (l. Halep). Recorded 300th career win (at all levels) with 1r triumph over Flipkens at 2020 Roland Garros
- In 2019, won first career title at Nurnberg (d. Zidansek in F); also picked up a win over World No.1 Osaka on grass at Birmingham
- Best result of 2018 was QF run at Roland Garros (l. Keys), her 2nd trip to the quarters in Paris in the last three years. Also reached 2nd career WTA Tour singles final at Guangzhou (l. Wang Qiang in F)
- Reached first career WTA final at 2017 St. Petersburg (l. Mladenovic in F) after notching two Top 10 wins over No.8 Kuznetsova and No.5 Cibulkova (her first career Top 5 win); first woman from Kazakhstan to reach a WTA final since Shvedova at 2015 Bogota (l. Pereira)
- In 2016, reached her first Grand Slam QF at Roland Garros (l. S.Williams in 3 sets); became first Kazakh to reach a Grand Slam QF since Shvedova at 2012 Roland Garros (Shvedova made another QF at the very next Slam, 2016 Wimbledon). Also that year, defeated No.14 V.Williams en route to Charleston QF
- Progressed to maiden WTA SF at 2015 Bastad (l. eventual champion Larsson). First Top 10 win came over No.10 Petkovic at 2015 Nurnberg (via ret.)
- Had breakthrough week at WTA 500 Guadalajara in 2025, making her first Tour-level QF (saved MP vs. Jimenez Kasintseva) and going on to win her first Tour title at age 17 (d. Arango in final); rose from No.73 to No.36 following her triumph in Mexico
- Also in 2025, won WTA 125 title at Ilkley (d. Marino in final) and played all four Grand Slam main draws; made Top 100 and Top 50 debuts and peaked at No.33 on October 20
- In 2024, made US Open 2r in her first Grand Slam and Tour-level appearance (as wild card); reached final at ITF W100 Tyler and ended the year with a career-high ranking of No.194
- Claimed her first ITF title in 2023 at 25K Reading
- Played her first ITF tournament in 2022 reaching the final at 15K Los Angeles; also reached 3r at 2022 Junior US Open

- In 2014, reached first two WTA QFs, first on clay at Bastad (as qualifier, l. Cepelova) and then on hard court at Osaka (l. eventual champion Stosur). Between these two results, scored first Top 20 win over No.14 Pennetta during 2r run at Montreal (as qualifier)
- Made it through to 2r on Grand Slam main draw debut at 2013 Australian Open (d. McHale, l. Suarez Navarro)
- Advanced to 2r on WTA main draw debut at 2012 Copenhagen (as WC, d. Barbat, l. Jankovic)
- On ITF Circuit, winner of six singles titles and six doubles titles
- Professional debut at 2009 Luxembourg ended with loss to Flipkens in final round of qualifying
