SEMIFINAL QUICK HITS

- This is the fifth time in the Open Era that all four players have reached the semifinals without dropping a set - after Australian Open 1970, US Open 1976, US Open 1980 and French Open 1995
- Svitolina has secured her return to the Top 10 next week for the first time since the week of Oct 25, 2021
- With a SF win, Svitolina would become the player with the third most Grand Slam main draw appearances before reaching a final in the Open Era (48) after Anastasia Pavlyuchenkova at 2021 Roland Garros (52) and Flavia Pennetta at 2015 US Open (49)
- Two players aged 30+ (Pegula and Svitolina) have claimed multiple WTA Top 10 wins at a Grand Slam event for the first time since 1990
- Since 1988, two players aged 30+ have reached the semifinals at the Australian Open for the fourth time – 1988, 2017, 2023, 2026

Sabalenka leads 5-1

Sabalenka:

- Has reached the Australian Open final in her last three outings here, winning the title in 2023 (d. Rybakina in final) and 2024 (d. Zheng in final), and finishing as runner-up in 2025 (l. Keys)
- Making her 31st Grand Slam main draw appearance; she has claimed four Grand Slam singles titles, having also won the US Open title twice (in 2024 and 2025)
- Is through to an 8th consecutive career Grand Slam SF on hard court; and a 14th major SF overall (record in Grand Slam semifinals stands at 7-6)
- She is now the third player since 1988 to reach 8+ consecutive major semifinals on hard court, after Lindsay Davenport and Martina Hingis
- Bidding to reach an 8th career Grand Slam final today, and a fourth consecutive Australian Open final
- Has won her last 21 hard court matches vs. opponents ranked outside the Top 10; her last hard court loss to a player outside the Top 10 was to No.11 Mirra Andreeva in the Indian Wells final last March
- Is the current PIF WTA World No.1, this is her 75th week in the No.1 position, sitting 11th on the all-time list
- She is the third top seed in the past decade to reach the Australian Open SF without dropping a set, after Serena Williams (2016) and Ashleigh Barty (2022)
- Sabalenka has hit the most winners of any player during this year's tournament so far (143)

Svitolina:

- Making 13th appearance at Australian Open; she is through to the semifinals for the first time here after three previous QF losses in 2018 (l. Mertens), 2019 (l. eventual champion Osaka) and 2025 (l. eventual champion Keys)
- Contesting her 48th career Grand Slam main draw, she is through to a 4th career major SF and is seeking her first career Grand Slam final after semifinal losses at Wimbledon in 2023 and 2019, and at US Open 2019
- She is the player with the most main draw appearances needed (13) to reach a maiden Australian Open SF in the Open Era
- The Australian Open is now the WTA event where she owns the most main draw wins of her career (34, surpassing 33 wins at Roland Garros)
- Is on a 10-match winning streak at Tour events, having claimed the title at Auckland earlier this month (d. Wang Xinyu in final)
- She is 31-2 after winning the first set at the Australian Open, losing only to eventual champions Madison Keys in 2025 and Serena Williams in 2015
- Has defeated No.8 Andreeva and No.3 Gauff en route to this year's SF; this is the first time she has won consecutive matches against Top 10 opponents since the WTA Finals in 2019
- Bidding to become the first woman from Ukraine in the Open Era to reach a Grand Slam singles final
- By reaching the SF here this week, she will return to the Top 10 next week for the first time since the week of Oct 25, 2021

Tied 3-3

Pegula:

- Contesting her 28th Grand Slam main draw, she is through to her first Australian Open SF after making consecutive quarterfinals from 2021 to 2023 (l. eventual finalist Brady in 2021, l. eventual champion Barty in 2022 and l. Azarenka in 2023)
- This is the third time in her career contesting a Grand Slam semifinal after reaching the US Open final in 2024 and SF in 2025 (l. Sabalenka both times)
- Each time she has reached a Grand Slam SF, she has done so without dropping a set
- With wins over No.9 Keys and No.4 Anisimova in the previous rounds here, Pegula has claimed multiple top 10 wins at a Grand Slam event for the first time in her career
- She has won 17 of her last 19 matches against Top 10 opponents after winning the first set, with only two losses coming at 2025 WTA Finals (l. eventual champion and Rybakina), and 2025 US Open (l. eventual champion Sabalenka)
- Knocked out the defending champion and fellow American Madison Keys in the fourth round here this week
- Owns 12 career wins over Top 5 players, most recently defeating No.4 Anisimova in the QF here this week
- Has a match record of 8-1 so far in 2026; after reaching back-to-back semifinals at Brisbane and Australian Open

Rybakina:

- Making 7th main draw appearance at Australian Open, where her best result is a runner-up finish in 2023 (l. Sabalenka in final)
- Owns one Grand Slam title, at 2022 Wimbledon (d. Jabeur in final)
- Is through to a Grand Slam SF for the fourth time in her career (second at Australian Open), and her first since Wimbledon 2024
- Has defeated Pegula three times in her career, winning their most recent meeting during her title run at the 2025 WTA Finals; this will be their first career meeting at a Grand Slam
- Bidding to reach 3rd Grand Slam final after title run at Wimbledon 2022 and R-Up run at Australian Open 2023
- Has won her last 8 consecutive matches over Top 10 players, most recently No.2 Swiatek in the QF here this week
- Owns the most wins on Tour since the end of Wimbledon last year (36); and has won 18 of her last 19 matches - only losing to Muchova in QF at Brisbane earlier this month
- Has won her last 22 matches after winning the first set, last losing to Victoria Mboko at Montreal 2025
- Has served the most aces so far at this year's Australian Open (35)

- Making her 9th main draw appearance at the Australian Open. Has reached the final on her last 3 outings here, winning the title in 2023 (d. Rybakina in F) and 2024 (d. Zheng in F), and finishing as R-Up in 2025 (l. Keys)
- Overall this is her 31st Grand Slam main draw appearance; owns 4 Grand Slam singles titles, having also won the US Open twice (in 2024 and 2025). Has contested the Roland Garros final (l. Gauff in 2025) and is a three-time Wimbledon semifinalist
- Is through to a 6th consecutive career Grand Slam SF; and a 14th overall (record in Grand Slam semifinals stands at 7-6)
- Is also through to an 8th consecutive Grand Slam SF on hard court, she is the third player since 1988 to reach 8+ consecutive major SFs on hard court after Lindsay Davenport and Martina Hingis
- Bidding to reach an 8th career Grand Slam final, and a fourth consecutive Australian Open final
- Currently on a 10-match winning streak to start the 2026 season (Brisbane title and Australian Open SF)
- Has won her past 21 hard court matches vs. opponents ranked outside the Top 10; her last hard court loss to a player outside the Top 10 was to No.11 Mirra Andreeva in the Indian Wells final last March
- Owns 5-1 record vs. Svitolina, winning their last four contests consecutively. The last time she lost to Svitolina was at Strasbourg 2020
- 19 of her 22 career WTA singles titles have come on hard court, including earlier this season when she defended her Brisbane title
- Is the current PIF WTA World No.1, this is her 75th week in the No.1 position, sitting 11th on the all-time list
- Won the Australian Open doubles title with Elise Mertens in 2021

- Making 13th appearance at Australian Open; she is through to the semifinals for the first time here after three previous QF losses (in 2018, 2019 and 2025)
- She is the player with the most main draw appearances needed (13) to reach a maiden Australian Open SF in the Open Era
- Contesting her 48th career Grand Slam main draw, she is through to a 4th career major SF and is seeking her first career Grand Slam final after semifinal losses at Wimbledon in 2023/2019 and at US Open in 2019
- The Australian Open is now the WTA event where she owns the most main draw career wins (34, surpassing Roland Garros)
- Faces No.1 Aryna Sabalenka in SF today; owns seven career wins against a World No. 1 (7-8). Her most recent win was over No.1 Swiatek at Wimbledon 2023
- Has defeated No.8 Andreeva and No.3 Gauff en route to this year's SF, this is the first time she has won consecutive matches against a Top 10 opponent since the WTA Finals in 2019
- 12 of her 19 career WTA singles titles have come on hard court, most recently Auckland in the opening week of the 2026 season (d. Wang Xinyu in final)
- On a 10-match winning streak at Tour events; she has started this season 10-0 with her Auckland and Australian Open performances
- Best results by Ukraine at Australian Open are SF runs by Dayana Yastremska in 2024 and now by Svitolina in 2026
- Is currently ranked No.12; this time last year was ranked No.27. Reached career-high ranking of No.3 for the first time in 2017

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CAREER MILESTONES

- Won a Tour leading four titles in 2025, including her 4th career Grand Slam title at US Open (d. Anisimova in final) as well as Madrid, Miami and Brisbane; also finished runner-up at WTA Finals, Australian Open, Roland Garros, Indian Wells and Stuttgart for a Tour leading nine finals overall
- Ended 2025 by finishing at World No.1 for the second straight year, posting the most Tour match wins of any player with 63 and setting a new WTA single-season record in prize money with \$15,008,519
- Reached seven finals across 2024, defending her Australian Open crown, winning the US Open and also won titles at Cincinnati and Wuhan. Recaptured the No.1 ranking in October and finished the season as the WTA Year-End No.1 for the first time in her career
- Outstanding 2023 saw her win debut Grand Slam title at Australian Open (d. Rybakina in F), reach second Major final at US Open (l. Gauff in F) and become the WTA World No.1 player for the first time in career (after US Open). In addition won titles at Adelaide and Madrid
- Highlight of 2022 season was R-Up finish at WTA Finals in Fort Worth (l. Garcia in F); upset No.1 Swiatek, No.2 Jabeur and No.3 Pegula en route to final - only the fourth woman in history to beat the No.1, No.2 and No.3 at the same tournament
- Lifted two titles during 2021 campaign, at Abu Dhabi and Madrid, while was R-Up at Stuttgart. Also reached a further three SFs, including at Wimbledon and US Open
- In doubles, lifted second major at 2021 Australian Open (w/Mertens, d. Krejčíková/Siniakova in F)
- Won final nine matches of 2020 to end the year with back-to-back titles - at Ostrava (d. Azarenka in F) and Linz (d. Mertens in F) - and ranked at No.10. Having also taken home the silverware at Doha (d. Kvitová in F), was one of two players (also Halep) to lift three singles titles during disrupted 2020 season
- Ended as World No.11 for the second straight year in 2019 after capturing three WTA singles titles at Shenzhen (d. Riske in F), Wuhan (d. Riske in F) and Zhuhai (d. Bertens in F)
- Made Top-10 debut on January 28, 2019 following 3r run at 2019 Australian Open
- Ended 2019 at No.2 in WTA doubles rankings after capturing first Grand Slam doubles trophy at US Open (w/Mertens, d. Azarenka/Barty in F). Earlier in the season, the pair claimed the
- Went 16-3 on clay at Tour-level events in 2025, including her 18th career title at Rouen, Madrid SF, Rome QF and Roland Garros QF; also made Australian Open QF (l. eventual champion Keys)
- Achieved runner-up in her opening tournament of 2024 at Auckland (l. Gauff in F) before finishing R16 at Australian Open (l. Noskova, retired due to low back injury). Reached QF at Wimbledon (l. Rybakina), 4r at Roland Garros (l. Rybakina) and 3r at US Open (l. Gauff). Ended season after US Open
- Returned to the Tour in April 2023, following birth of daughter Skai. Won Strasbourg (d. Blinkova) for a second time (also in 2020) before achieving Grand Slam results of QF at Roland Garros (l. Sabalenka) and SF at Wimbledon (l. eventual champion Vondrousova)
- 2022 season reached 3r at Australian Open (l. Azarenka) and QF at Monterrey (l. Osorio), before going on maternity leave in spring
