[26] Leylah Fernandez (CAN #25) vs. [5] Jessica Pegula (USA #5)

Pegula leads 2-1

Fernandez:

- Making 5th main draw appearance at Miami, where she has equaled her tournament-best result by making 3rd round for the 3rd straight year
- One of her 3rd round losses at Miami was to today's opponent Pegula in 2024
- Her career-best WTA 1000 results are 3 quarterfinals at 2023 Guadalajara (l. Kenin), 2024 Doha (l. Rybakina) and 2024 Cincinnati (l. Pegula)
- Her most recent Top 10 win came over No.4 Pegula en route to the 2025 Washington DC title (0-3 vs. Top 10 players since then)
- Attempting to become the second Canadian to defeat a Top 5 opponent at Miami since the tournament's inception in 1985, joining Bianca Andreescu in 2019 (def. Kerber in 3rd round)
- All of her 5 career WTA singles titles have come on hard court, including 2 last year at Osaka (d. Valentova in final) and Washington DC (d. Kalinskaya in final)

Pegula:

- Making 7th appearance at Miami, where her tournament-best result is finishing runner-up last year (l. Sabalenka in final)
- She also reached the Miami semifinals in 2022 (l. eventual champion Swiatek) and 2023 (l. eventual runner-up Rybakina), and made quarterfinals in 2024 (l. Alexandrova)
- Since this event's move to Miami Gardens in 2019, Pegula has claimed the most match wins of any player (19)
- Pegula is a 4-time WTA 1000 champion at 2022 Guadalajara (d. Sakkari in final), 2023 Montreal (d. Samsonova in final), 2024 Toronto (d. Anisimova in final) and 2026 Dubai (d. Svitolina in final)
- Has a 9-1 record this year vs. players ranked outside the Top 20 (the one loss was to No.26 Kostyuk in Brisbane SF)
- Pegula is the third player to be seeded within the Top 5 at Miami in three editions of the event after turning 30, along with Chris Evert and Serena Williams

[1] Aryna Sabalenka (#1) vs. Caty McNally (USA #72)

First meeting

Sabalenka:

- The defending champion returns to make her 9th appearance at Miami; defeated Pegula in last year's final to mark her best result at the event
- Won her 10th WTA 1000 title last week at Indian Wells (d. Rybakina in F; saved a match point in the final set tiebreak)
- Since 1985, she is now one of four players to win titles at Indian Wells and Miami as World No.1 after Seles, Graf and Hingis
- Seeking 25th consecutive match win vs. opponents ranked outside the Top 10, with her last loss coming to No.12 Anisimova at Wimbledon (SF) last season
- Among active players, only Azarenka (209) has claimed more wins at WTA 1000 events than Sabalenka (142)
- 17 of her 18 wins so far this season have come in straight sets with her only three-set win coming over Rybakina in the Indian Wells final

McNally:

- Making 3rd appearance at Miami, on her two previous appearances in 2025 and 2019, she fell in the opening round
- Bidding to reach the R16 at a WTA 1000 event for the first time; her best results at this level are now three R32 runs: Miami 2026, Montreal 2025 (l. Keys) and Cincinnati 2022 (l. Jabeur)
- She is 0-7 vs. Top 10 players in her career; and is facing a World No.1 for the second time in her career today after losing to Swiatek at Ostrava 2022
- Bidding to become the lowest-ranked player to claim victory against the World No.1 at a WTA 1000 event since No.116 Jabeur defeated Halep at Beijing 2018 (via retirement)
- The last time an American defeated the World No.1 at the Miami Open was Venus Williams defeating Angelique Kerber in the 2017 quarterfinals
- Best result so far this season is QF run at Ostrava (l. eventual finalist Korpatsch)

[9] Elina Svitolina (UKR #8) vs. Hailey Baptiste (USA #45)

Svitolina leads 1-0

Svitolina:

- Making 11th appearance at Miami; her best result is SF run in 2021 (l. eventual champion Barty)
- She is a 4-time WTA 1000 champion, winning titles at 2017 Dubai, 2017 Toronto and 2017-2018 Rome
- Last month at Dubai, she made her first WTA 1000 final since 2018 (l. Pegula in F)
- Owns 15-1 record in 2026 vs. players ranked outside the Top 20, with only loss coming to No.28 Kalinskaya at Doha
- This year's Tour-leader in match wins with 20; she has reached four semifinals already this season at Auckland (won the title), Australian Open, Dubai and Indian Wells

Baptiste:

- Making 6th appearance at Miami; she has now equaled her tournament-best result here after also reaching 3r last year (I. Osaka)
- Contesting her 21st career WTA 1000 main draw; her career-best WTA 1000 finishes are R16 at 2023 Guadalajara (I. Garcia) and 2024 Wuhan (I. Alexandrova)
- Owns 1 career win over Top 10 players, defeating No.10 Krejčíková at Wuhan 2024; she has lost her last five consecutive meetings against Top 10 opponents
- She is 0-2 on her career against players from Ukraine, with losses against today's opponent Svitolina at Rome and Kalinina at Roland Garros 2022
- Career-best Tour-level result on hard court is her SF run at Abu Dhabi last month (I. Alexandrova); this marked her first career Tour-level semifinal

[3] Elena Rybakina (KAZ #2) vs. Marta Kostyuk (UKR #28)

Rybakina leads 4-1

Rybakina:

- Making 6th appearance at Miami, where she is a 2-time runner-up in 2023 (I. Kvitová in final) and 2024 (I. Collins in final)
- Contesting her 45th career WTA 1000 main draw; she is a 2-time WTA 1000 champion at 2023 Indian Wells (d. Sabalenka in final) and 2023 Rome (d. Kalinina in final via retirement)
- Coming off a run to her 6th career WTA 1000 final earlier this month at Indian Wells (I. Sabalenka in 3rd-set tiebreak) - that was her first WTA 1000 final since 2024 Miami
- Reached a new career-high ranking of World No.2 on Monday, following her 2026 Indian Wells performance
- Has won 18 of her last 19 matches vs. opponents ranked outside the Top 20 (the one loss was to No.67 Ruzic via retirement at 2026 Dubai)
- Rybakina has served the most aces (157) and hit the most winners (592) of any player so far at WTA level in 2026

Kostyuk:

- Making 5th appearance at Miami; her tournament-best result came last year with a R16 run (I. eventual finalist Pegula)
- Contesting 41st career WTA 1000 main draw; her best result at this level is a SF run at Indian Wells 2024 (I. eventual champion Swiatek)
- Bidding for her 4th Top 10 win of 2026 after registering three en route to the final at Brisbane (d. No.3 Anisimova, No.6 Pegula and No.9 Andreeva)
- One of 3 players from Ukraine to reach 3r alongside Svitolina and Starodubtseva; this is the first time in the tournament's history that three players from Ukraine have reached R32
- Owns one career WTA title which came on hard court at Austin 2023 (d. Gracheva in F)

[23] Zheng Qinwen (CHN #26) vs. [15] Madison Keys (USA #18)

Keys leads 1-0

Zheng:

- Making 5th main draw appearance at Miami, where her tournament-best result is reaching quarterfinals last year (l. eventual champion Sabalenka)
- Contesting her 30th career WTA 1000 main draw; her career-best WTA 1000 result is runner-up at 2024 Wuhan (l. Sabalenka in final)
- Owns 23 Tour-level wins in career over Top 20 players, most recently No.18 Liudmila Samsonova at 2025 Roland Garros (0-3 vs. Top 20 players since then)
- Competing in her 3rd event of the year after Doha (l. Rybakina in Round of 16) and Indian Wells (after 1r bye, l. Ruzic in 2nd round)
- Holds 3-2 win-loss record so far in 2026; all 3 of her match-wins this year have been over Americans, defeating Kenin and Parks at Doha, and Stephens in this week's 2nd round

Keys:

- Making 15th appearance at Miami, where her tournament-best result is reaching quarterfinals in 2016 (l. No.2 seed Kerber)
- Among players featuring at 2026 Miami, only Venus Williams (23) and Sorana Cirstea (16) have made more main draw appearances than Keys (15) at the event
- Contesting her 88th career WTA 1000 main draw; she has won one WTA 1000 title at 2019 Cincinnati (d. Kuznetsova in final) and made 2 additional WTA 1000 finals in 2016
- Holds 8-1 record this year vs. players ranked outside the Top 20 (the one loss was to No.54 Kartal at Indian Wells earlier this month)
- Keys has won her last 8 Tour-level meetings against Chinese players (her last loss to a Chinese player was at 2021 San Jose vs. Zhang Shuai)

- Also made her 1 Grand Slam final on hard court at 2021 US Open (finished R-Up to qualifier Raducanu in all-teenage final)
- One of 2 players from Canada in the main draw; also No.10 seed Mboko, who has already advanced to R16
- Best result by Canada at Miami was Runner-Up finish by Bianca Andreescu in 2021 (l. Barty in F via ret.)
- Is currently ranked No.25; this time last year was ranked No.26. Reached career-high ranking of No.13 in August 2022

- Faces No.25 Leylah Fernandez in 3r today; Pegula is 9-1 this year vs. players ranked outside the Top 20 (the 1 loss was to No.26 Kostyuk in Brisbane SF)
- Owns 9-1 career Tour-level record against players from Canada (the 1 loss was to today's opponent Fernandez at 2025 Washington DC - Fernandez went on to win the title)
- 7 of her 10 career WTA singles titles have come on hard court, most recently WTA 1000 Dubai last month
- The Williams sisters are the only two Americans to register more wins at WTA 1000 events after turning 30 than Pegula (46)
- Most recent American woman to win the Miami title is Danielle Collins in 2024
- Is currently ranked No.5; this time last year was ranked No.4. Reached career-high ranking of No.3 for the first time in October 2022
- Has won 17 of her first 20 matches in 2026 - this is the most wins she has registered from her first 20 matches in a season at Tour-level

CAREER MILESTONES

- In 2025, won multiple Tour titles in a calendar year for the first time, finishing as champion at WTA 250 Osaka and WTA 500 Washington DC (her first title above WTA 250 level); also partnered Venus Williams to make US Open doubles QF as a wild card team
- 2024 season highlights were reaching first final on grass finishing R-Up at Eastbourne (l. Kasatkina) and as part of title defense made SF at Hong Kong. Also reached final of Cincinnati in doubles w/Putintseva
- In 2023, earned third career title at Hong Kong (d. Siniakova); prevented from a consecutive title run by Siniakova who defeated her in Nanchang SF. Also defeated Paolini at Billie Jean King Cup Finals to lift title with Canada
- Broke into the Top 20 in doubles in 2023, after reaching final at Roland Garros, Miami (both w/Townsend) and Auckland (w/Mattek-Sands) as well as QF at US Open (w/Townsend)
- In 2022 won her second title at Monterrey (d. Osorio in F; saved 5MP), and reached the QF at Roland Garros (l. Trevisan); missed grass-court season due to grade three stress fracture in her right foot suffered during match vs. Trevisan in Paris
- Enjoyed a memorable 2021 campaign, lifting first career title in Monterrey and advancing to maiden Grand Slam final, at US Open (l. Raducanu)
- En route to the final at Flushing Meadows in 2021, upset defending champion and No. 3 Osaka in 3r, 2016 winner Kerber in R16, No.5 Svitolina in QF and No. 2 Sabalenka in SF, becoming the youngest woman to beat multiple Top-5 opponents at the same major since S. Williams at 1999 US Open

- Best results in an injury-affected 2025 season include semifinals at Rome and London and a run to the Roland Garros QF; underwent elbow surgery in July and played only one event after Wimbledon (ret. in Beijing 3r)
- Enjoyed best season of career in 2024, reaching her first Grand Slam final at the Australian Open, winning titles at Tokyo and Palermo, contesting the title match at her home tournament in Wuhan and closing out the season at her first WTA Finals, losing to Gauff in the final
- An outstanding 2024 also saw her make her Top 10 and Top 5 debuts in the PIF WTA Rankings and the gold medal placed around her neck at the 2024 Paris Olympics
- Won first two WTA titles in 2023 at Palermo (d. Paolini in F) and Zhengzhou (d. Krejčíková in F); also reached final at WTA Elite Trophy Zhuhai (l. Haddad Maia), SF at Abu Dhabi and first career Grand Slam QF at US Open (l. Sabalenka)
- Earned 2023 WTA Most Improved Player of Year, ending the season at No.15 and inside the Top 20 for the first time; she made her Top 20 debut on May 22, 2023
- In 2022, won WTA Newcomer of the Year, reached first WTA final at Tokyo (l. Samsonova) and also made SF at Melbourne Summer Set 1 (as qualifier), QF at Toronto and R16 at Roland Garros. Broke into Top 100 on January 31, and cracked Top 50 after her Roland Garros run
- Scored first Top 20 win over No.19 Simona Halep at 2022 Roland Garros, then earned two Top 10 wins over No.5 Ons Jabeur at Toronto and No.4 Paula Badosa at Tokyo. Also won title at WTA 125 event in Valencia in June 2022
- Reached 2r on WTA main draw debut in 2021 at Palermo (as qualifier, l. Cristian)
- Made WTA qualifying debut in 2019, appearing in qualifying at Miami, Tianjin and Wuhan
- Made ITF debut in 2018; has gone on to amass eight ITF singles titles with 8-0 record in finals
- Won two singles titles in 2025, including maiden Grand Slam title at Australian Open becoming the oldest first-time Australian Open champion at 29 years old, and the player with the longest gap between their first two major finals in the Open Era (US Open 2017). Returned to a career-high ranking of No.7, then broke into the Top 5 for the first time in February
- In 2025 also qualified for the WTA Finals for the second time in her career after 2016
- In 2024, won eighth career title at Strasbourg (d. Collins in F dropping only three games). Reached SF at Madrid (l. eventual champion Swiatek) and Eastbourne (l. Fernandez), and another QF at Rome (l. eventual champion Swiatek). At Grand Slams, reached 4r at Wimbledon (l. Paolini, retired in 3r set due to left thigh injury), made 3r at Roland Garros (l. Navarro) and US Open (l. Mertens)
- In 2023, won seventh career title at Eastbourne (d. Kasatkina in F), reached SF at US Open and reached four QFs including Wimbledon; also qualified for WTA Elite Trophy in Zhuhai (0-2 in group play)
- At 2022 Adelaide, won first title in over two years (d. Riske in F), followed by SF run at Australian Open - best Slam showing since 2018
- Other highlights in 2022 were SF at Cincinnati and two further QF runs, including at Indian Wells
- In Grand Slam play, 2021 season was highlighted by R16 run at Wimbledon (l. Golubic). Finished campaign inside Top 100 for ninth successive year, but outside Top 20 for first time since 2014
- Ended 2020 ranked No.16, with best result being R-Up finish at Brisbane (l. Ka. Pliskova)
- Lifted biggest title of career during 2019 season at WTA 1000 Cincinnati (d. Kuznetsova in F); afterwards returned to Top 10 for first time since week of June 25, 2018
- Also won title at Charleston (d. Wozniacki) and reached QF at 2019 Roland Garros (l. Barty), one of three Americans to make last eight (also Anisimova and Stephens) - the first time since 2004 (Capriati, S.Williams and V.Williams) Reached three SFs in 2018 at Charleston, Roland Garros and US Open
- Reached first Grand Slam final in 2017 at US Open, losing to Sloane Stephens in 10th all-American final in the Open Era. At 22, became the youngest Flushing Meadows finalist since 19-year-old Caroline Wozniacki lost to Kim

- Clijsters in 2009 Also in 2017, won third WTA title at Stanford (d. Vandeweghe)
- Enjoyed first Top 10 year-end finish in 2016 (at No.8), was youngest player in Top 20; won second title at Birmingham (d. Strycova) and reached final at Rome (l. S.Williams) and Montreal (l. Halep)
- Broke into Top 10 on June 20 as first American to make Top 10 debut since S.Williams in 1999
- Made WTA Finals debut at Singapore in 2016, going 1-2 in round-robin play
- Represented USA at 2016 Rio Olympics, reaching SF (l. Bronze medal match to Petra Kvitova)
- Qualified for WTA Elite Trophy Zhuhai in 2015, 2018-19; went 1-1 in round-robin stage on all three appearances, with best result SF run in 2018 (withdrew before match vs. Muguruza w/left knee injury)
- Advanced to maiden major SF at 2015 Australian Open (l. eventual champion S.Williams); broke into Top 20 following conclusion of tournament, on February 2
- Also in 2015, won second career title at Charleston and reached QF at Wimbledon
- Won first career title at 2014 Eastbourne (d. No.9 Kerber in F); was second-youngest player to win a WTA title in 2014, (after Vekic at Kuala Lumpur); also, youngest American to win a title since Vania King in October 2006 (17y 254d at Bangkok)
- Made Billie Jean King Cup debut for USA in 2014
- Broke into Top 100 at beginning of 2013 season and finished the year No.39; highlights were SF at Osaka, QFs at Sydney, Charleston and Birmingham and 3r at Australian Open and Wimbledon
- Earned first Top 20 win over No.17 Lucie Safarova while ranked No.135 at 2013 Sydney; then earned first Top 10 win over No.5 Na Li as LL at Madrid
- In 2012, reached 2r at Miami and played main draw at Australian Open, Memphis and Cincinnati; also won two titles on ITF circuit
- Earned first Grand Slam win at 2011 US Open (d. Craybas, l. Safarova in 2r), also played main draw at Miami and contested qualifying at Indian Wells
- Won first title on ITF circuit at 2010 \$10k/ITF Cleveland, OH, USA; also contested qualifying at US Open in 2010
- Made professional debut in 2009 and Tour-level debut at 2009 Ponte Vedra Beach (as WC, d. Kudryavtseva, l. No.10 Nadia Petrova); was seventh youngest player to win a WTA main draw match at 14y 48d and youngest since Hingis in 1994
