### [1] Aryna Sabalenka (#1) vs. [4] Coco Gauff (USA #4)

**Tied 6-6**

- This marks a rematch of the 2023 US Open final, as well as last year's finals on clay at Madrid and Roland Garros. Coco Gauff claimed both Grand Slam final meetings in three sets, while Aryna Sabalenka prevailed in straight sets at the WTA 1000 Madrid final
- Their most recent meeting came during the group stages at the 2025 WTA Finals, where Sabalenka won in straight sets
- The rivalry has frequently produced tight contests: eight of their 12 career meetings have featured at least one set decided by a 6-6 tiebreak, and six matches have gone the distance to a third set

#### ***Sabalenka:***

- The defending champion is making her 8th appearance at Miami (defeated Pegula in last year's final)
- She is through to a 15th career WTA 1000 final, equaling Azarenka for the fourth-most since the format's introduction in 2009 - only S. Williams, Halep (18 each) and Sharapova (16) have more
- Since the inauguration of Indian Wells in 1989, Sabalenka (2025-2026) is the second player to reach both finals at the Sunshine Double in consecutive years after Sharapova (2012-2013)
- Sabalenka is seeking her 11<sup>th</sup> career WTA 1000 title today; equaling Swiatek for the second-most since the format's introduction in 2009 - trailing only S. Williams (13)
- Bidding to become the fifth woman to win the Sunshine Double in the same year after Graf (1994, 1996), Clijsters (2005), Azarenka (2016) and Swiatek (2022); and just the second World No. 1 to do so after Graf
- She is the fourth player since 2000 to reach the final at her first four events of a season, joining Hingis (2001), S. Williams (2003) and Azarenka (2012)
- Holds a 4-1 record vs. Top 10 players this year - the one loss was to Rybakina in the Australian Open final
- Currently on an 11-match winning streak; she has claimed the most wins (22) of any player at WTA level so far in 2026 - 21 of her 22 wins this season have come in straight sets
- Since the format's introduction in 2009, Sabalenka can become the first player to win back-to-back titles at a single WTA 1000 event without conceding a set
- The week of March 23<sup>rd</sup> marks Sabalenka's 75th consecutive week at World No.1 (83 total weeks) - she will remain at No.1 following this event

#### ***Gauff:***

- Making her 7th appearance at Miami; she has reached her first career final at this event after R16 finishes in 2022, 2024 and 2025
- Prior to this year's tournament, the Miami Open stood as the only WTA 1000 event where Gauff had yet to reach the quarterfinal stage
- She has advanced to her sixth career WTA 1000 final, becoming the third-youngest player to reach this milestone since the format's introduction in 2009 - older only than Wozniacki and Swiatek
- Contesting her 50th career WTA 1000 main draw; she is a 3-time WTA 1000 champion at 2023 Cincinnati (d. Muchova in final), 2024 Beijing (d. Muchova in final) and 2025 Wuhan (d. Pegula in final)
- Made her WTA main draw debut and won her first Tour-level match of career here in Miami in 2019 (d. fellow wild card McNally in 1r; I. Kasatkina in 2r)
- She is the youngest American to reach the final at Miami Open since Serena Williams in 2003 (Williams went on to win the title that year)
- Holds a 1-1 record vs. Top 10 players this year; defeating No.2 Swiatek at United Cup, and falling to No.9 Svitolina at Dubai
- Bidding to become the first player in the Open Era to win each of her first 10 Tour-level finals on hard court; 4 of her 9 wins have come against Top 10 opponents (most recently d. No.6 Pegula in last year's Wuhan final)
- Her run to the final here means Gauff will move to No.3 in the WTA Rankings next week, overtaking Swiatek
- Since 2009, Gauff could become just the second player to defeat the World No.1 in both a Grand Slam and a WTA 1000 final, after S. Williams defeated No.1 Azarenka at Madrid and US Open in 2012

- Contesting her 61st career WTA 1000 main draw; she has reached her 15th career WTA 1000 final, and she is seeking her 11th career WTA 1000 title
- Won her 10th career WTA 1000 title earlier this month at Indian Wells (d. Rybakina in final; saved a match point in the final-set tiebreak)
- After 1r bye, defeated Li, McNally, 23rd seed Q.Zheng, Baptiste and 3rd seed Rybakina to reach the final without dropping a set
- Faces No.4 Coco Gauff in today's final; she is 4-1 vs. Top 10 players this year, with the one loss coming to Rybakina in Australian Open final
- Owns 5-0 record so far this season against players from United States of America, including 3 wins here at Miami over Li, McNally and Baptiste
- Career record in WTA Tour-level finals stands at 23-20
- 20 of her 23 career WTA singles titles have come on hard court, including two in 2026 (Brisbane and Indian Wells)

- Is currently on an 11-match winning streak; longest winning streak of her career was 15 matches in 2024

- Looking to become the seventh woman from USA to win the title here after Danielle Collins, Sloane Stephens, Serena Williams, Venus Williams, Monica Seles and Chris Evert
- She is the youngest American to reach the final at Miami Open since Serena Williams in 2003 (Williams went on to win the title that year)

## CAREER MILESTONES

- Won a Tour leading four titles in 2025, including her 4th career Grand Slam title at US Open (d. Anisimova in final) as well as Madrid, Miami and Brisbane; also finished runner-up at WTA Finals, Australian Open, Roland Garros, Indian Wells and Stuttgart for a Tour leading nine finals overall
- Ended 2025 by finishing at World No.1 for the second straight year, posting the most Tour match wins of any player with 63 and setting a new WTA single-season record in prize money with \$15,008,519
- Reached seven finals across 2024, defending her Australian Open crown, winning the US Open and also won titles at Cincinnati and Wuhan. Recaptured the No.1 ranking in October and finished the season as the WTA Year-End No.1 for the first time in her career
- Outstanding 2023 saw her win debut Grand Slam title at Australian Open (d. Rybakina in F), reach second Major final at US Open (l. Gauff in F) and become the WTA World No.1 player for the first time in career (after US Open). In addition won titles at Adelaide and Madrid
- Highlight of 2022 season was R-Up finish at WTA Finals in Fort Worth (l. Garcia in F); upset No.1 Swiatek, No.2 Jabeur and No.3 Pegula en route to final - only the fourth woman in history to beat the No.1, No.2 and No.3 at the same tournament
- Lifted two titles during 2021 campaign, at Abu Dhabi and Madrid, while was R-Up at Stuttgart. Also reached a further three SFs, including at Wimbledon and US Open
- In doubles, lifted second major at 2021 Australian Open (w/Mertens, d. Krejčíková/Siniakova in F)
- Won final nine matches of 2020 to end the year with back-to-back titles - at Ostrava (d. Azarenka in F) and Linz (d. Mertens in F) - and ranked at No.10. Having also taken home the silverware at Doha (d. Kvitová in F), was one of two players (also Halep) to lift three singles titles during disrupted 2020 season
- Ended as World No.11 for the second straight year in 2019 after capturing three WTA singles titles at Shenzhen (d. Riske in F), Wuhan (d. Riske in F) and Zhuhai (d. Bertens in F)
- Made Top-10 debut on January 28, 2019 following 3r run at 2019 Australian Open
- Ended 2019 at No.2 in WTA doubles rankings after capturing first Grand Slam doubles trophy at US Open (w/Mertens, d. Azarenka/Barty in F).
- In 2025, won her second Grand Slam title of career at Roland Garros (d. Sabalenka in final) and her third career WTA 1000 title at Wuhan; also made WTA 1000 finals at Madrid and Rome, becoming the first American to reach three WTA 1000 finals in a calendar year since Serena Williams in 2014
- Went three for three in finals in 2024, winning Auckland, Beijing and a historic first WTA Finals Riyadh title. Success in Saudi Arabia saw her win a record \$4.8m in prize money, the most ever awarded in women's professional sports, and defeat the World No.1 and No.2 at the same event. Posted a new career-high of No.2 in June
- Won debut Grand Slam singles crown in 2023 lifting title on home soil at US Open (d. Sabalenka in F). Picked up another three titles in 2023, marking first WTA 1000 title at Cincinnati and debut WTA 500 title at Washington DC, in addition to WTA 250 Auckland. In doubles was co-ranked No.1 with Pegula after US Open.
- In 2022, reached maiden Grand Slam final at Roland-Garros (l. Swiatek); was the youngest major finalist since Sharapova won 2004 Wimbledon
- Made Top 10 debut on September 12, 2022, following QF run at US Open (l. Garcia)
- Highlight of 2021 campaign was completing singles-doubles title sweep at Parma; defeated Wang Qiang in singles final and teamed up w/McNally to win doubles
- In 2021 also reached SF at Adelaide and Rome, while at the Slams made QF at Roland-Garros and R16 at Wimbledon. Finished R-Up in doubles at 2021 US Open (w/McNally, l. Stosur/Zhang)
- First cracked the Top 50 on February 24, 2020 at No.49, following a R16 appearance at Australian Open to tie her career best Grand Slam result - during run, defeated V.Williams in 1r and her first Top-5 opponent in No.4 Osaka in 3r (l. eventual champion Kenin in 3s)
- Enjoyed breakout season in 2019, highlighted by maiden WTA singles title at Linz (as lucky loser, d. Ostapenko in F) - earned her first Top-10 win en route to title over No.8 Bertens in QF. At 15y 214d, her title run in Linz made her youngest to win a Tour-level title since Vaidisova (15y 177d) won Tashkent in 2004
- Also claimed maiden WTA doubles titles at Washington, DC (w/McNally, d. Sanchez/Stollar in F) and Luxembourg (w/McNally, d. Christian/Guarachi in F). By winning the doubles

- Earlier in the season, the pair claimed the 'Sunshine Double' by winning back-to-back titles at Indian Wells (d. Krejčíková/Siniakova in F) and Miami (d. Stosur/ Zhang in F)
- Enjoyed breakthrough season in 2018, lifting two titles, at New Haven (d. Suarez Navarro in F) and Wuhan (d. Kontaveit in F), winning 46 matches and finishing at No.11 in the rankings. Entered Top 50 on April 16 after run to Lugano final, and Top 20 on August 27 following New Haven title
  - Broke into Top 100 at No.76 on October 16, 2017 after reaching first Tour-level final at Tianjin (l. Sharapova). Also in 2017 made SF at Tashkent (l. Babos) and lifted WTA 125k Series title at Mumbai (d. Jakupovic)
  - Made Grand Slam main draw debut at 2017 Wimbledon, falling in 2r (as qualifier, d. Khromacheva, l. Witthoef)
  - Fell 1r on main draw debut at 2017 Dubai (as qualifier, l. Ka.Bondarenko). WTA qualifying debut came at 2016 Rabat
  - Lifted first three ITF Circuit titles in 2015, including a 13-match win streak towards the year's end, winning back-to-back trophies in Antalya, Turkey
  - Made debut on ITF Circuit in Minsk in 2012

- Made professional debut in May 2018 as a qualifier into the \$25K ITF/Osprey, FL-USA
- Former Junior World No.1 (July 2018); won 2018 Roland-Garros girls' title (d. McNally in F) and 2018 US Open doubles title (w/McNally), while finished R-Up at 2017 US Open girls' event (l. Anisimova) becoming the youngest girls' singles finalist in tournament history at 13-years-old
