QUARTERFINAL QUICK HITS

For the first time in the Open Era, two women representing the Ukraine will meet head-to-head in the quarterfinals of a Grand Slam. This is the second time two Ukrainians have reached a Grand Slam QF - also 2024 Australian Open (Marta Kostyuk, Dayana Yastremska).

Svitolina and Andreeva both have a chance to move into the WTA Top 5 after Roland Garros. They will need to reach the final in order to do so.

Kostyuk could make her Top 10 debut if she advances to the final, while Cirstea could make her Top 10 debut by winning the title.

Sorana Cirstea becomes the third woman to reach the Quarterfinals at Roland Garros in the Open Era after turning 36 years old:

Sorana Cirstea (2026 – 36y, 61d)
Billie Jean King (1980 – 36y, 199d)
Helga Masthoff (1978 – 36y, 212d)

With a win, Cirstea would be the oldest woman to make her Grand Slam semifinal debut

Oldest Women to Make Grand Slam Debut

Tatjana Maria – 34 y/o, 2022 Wimbledon
Barbora Strycova – 33 y/o, 2019 Wimbledon
Roberta Vinci – 32 y/o, 2015 US Open
Betty Stove – 32 y/o, 1977 Wimbledon
Flavia Pennetta – 31 y/o, 2013 US Open

Cirstea is looking to reach her first career Grand Slam semifinal at her 67th main draw appearance in a Major; she would become the player with the most Singles main draws played to make her first semifinal, a record that currently belongs to Barbora Strycova (53).

Sabalenka has made the semifinals on each of the last six Majors (since the US Open 2024) and could become the first player to make this stage for 7+ consecutive Women's Singles Grand Slam since Serena Williams (10 in a row between the US Open 2014 and the Australian Open 2017).

Two left-handed (Maja Chwalinska and Diana Shnaider) have made the quarter-finals in a Women's Singles Major for the first time since the French Open 2022 (Martina Trevisan and Leylah Fernandez).

There will be an Ukrainian Women's Singles semifinalist at Roland Garros for the first time in the Open Era (the third including males after Andrei Medvedev in 1993 and 1999) - Elina Svitolina (Wimbledon 2019 and 2023, US Open 2019 and Australian Open 2026) and Dayana Yastremska (Australian Open 2024) are the only Ukrainian women to reach the semifinals in the Open Era.

Including the BJK Cup, Marta Kostyuk is the first player to claim 16+ consecutive wins on clay court since Iga Swiatek in 2024 (23 between Madrid and the Olympics).

Maja Chwalinska is first qualifier to reach quarterfinals in Women's Singles at Roland Garros since 2020 (Nadia Podorska, Martina Trevisan) and the first in a Major since Lulu Sun in Wimbledon 2024 - she could equal the best result achieved by a qualifier in Women's Singles at RG in Open Era (SF, Podoroska in 2020).

Of the remaining eight players, only Sabalenka has reached a Grand Slam final.

With a win in the quarterfinals, it would be Aryna Sabalenka's 400th career win in Tour-level matches and she would join Venus Williams, Victoria Azarenka, Vera Zvonareva, Elina Svitolina, Anastasia Pavlyuchenkova and Karolina Pliskova as the only others to surpass the 400+ career win mark.

Svitolina:

- Making 13th main draw appearance at Roland Garros, she is through to the quarterfinals here for a sixth time in her career (2026, 2025, 2023, 2020, 2017, 2015)
- Looking to reach the semifinals here at Roland Garros for the first time in her career
- Making her 49th Grand Slam main draw appearance – this is Svitolina’s 15th Grand Slam QF, and she is seeking her 5th career Grand Slam SF
- Career record in Grand Slam QF matches stands at 4-10 (0-5 at Roland Garros)
- Has reached the SFs at all the other majors - 2026 Australian Open, 2019 and 2023 Wimbledon, 2019 US Open
- Has claimed 37 main draw wins at Roland Garros, which is the event where she has the most main draw wins in her career
- Eight of her 20 career WTA singles titles have come on clay, including WTA 1000 Rome earlier this month (d. Gauff in F) - Svitolina is undefeated in WTA clay-court finals (8-0)
- Has claimed her 10th consecutive Tour-level win on clay, marking her career-best winning streak on the surface
- Since 2015 Roland Garros (Svitolina’s first career Grand Slam QF), only Serena Williams and Aryna Sabalenka (15 each) have made as many Grand Slam QFs as Svitolina (15)
- This is the first time in history that two players from Ukraine have reached the Roland Garros quarterfinals

Kostyuk:

- Making 7th main draw appearance at Roland Garros and is into the quarterfinals here for the first time
- Contesting her 25th career Grand Slam main draw; her career-best results across all majors are QF runs at Australian Open 2024 (l. Gauff) and now at this year’s Roland Garros
- Looking to reach first Grand Slam semifinal of her career today
- Coming off winning back-to-back clay titles at Rouen (d. Podrez in the first all-Ukrainian WTA singles final) and Madrid (d. M. Andrejeva in F)
- Her winning streak in the clay swing is up to 15-0 at Tour events (16-0 when including Billie Jean King Cup Qualifiers last month) – she is the only player undefeated so far this season on clay-court at WTA level
- This is the longest clay-court win streak to start a season on Tour (BJK Cup included) since Swiatek won her first 18 clay-court matches of the 2022 season
- Only Mirra Andrejeva has claimed more clay-court wins on Tour than Marta Kostyuk (including BJK Cup) in 2026
- Holds a 6-3 record vs. Top 10 players this year (one coming over No.3 Swiatek in the 4r here, three en route to Brisbane R-Up, and two more Top 10 wins en route to Madrid title)
- Is currently at a career-high ranking of No.15, which was first achieved earlier this month on May 4th
- Kostyuk won the most recent meeting against Svitolina (2024 Toronto) after having lost the first at 2018 Australian Open

Andreeva leads 1-0

Andreeva:

- Making her 4th career Roland Garros appearance; her best tournament result was SF in 2024 (l. eventual R-Up Paolini), and she also reached QF last year (l. wild card Boisson)
- She has become the youngest player to reach the quarterfinals at Roland Garros for three consecutive seasons since Martina Hingis in 1997-1999
- This is her 13th career Grand Slam main draw, and her SF run here in 2024 is her best Grand Slam result
- Has won 33 matches so far this year – she has the most Tour-level match-wins in 2026 followed by Svitolina (32 wins)
- Holds a 19-3 match record on clay this season, also leading the Tour for most clay-court match-wins in 2026
- She is the first teenager to claim 18+ WTA Tour-level clay-court wins in a calendar year since Caroline Wozniacki in 2009 (Wozniacki had 23 by the end of that season)
- Her clay-court results this year include a title run at Linz (d. Potapova in F), SF at Stuttgart (l. eventual champion Rybakina), R-Up at Madrid (l. Kostyuk in F) and QF at Rome (l. eventual R-Up Gauff)
- Defeated today's opponent Cirstea in three-sets during title run at Linz earlier this clay-court season

Cirstea:

- Making 17th main draw appearance at Roland Garros, she has reached the quarterfinals here once before in 2009 (l. Stosur in QF)
- Contesting her 67th career Grand Slam main draw and is through to her 3rd career Grand Slam quarterfinal - her two previous Grand Slam QFs came at 2023 US Open (l. Muchova) and 2009 Roland Garros
- Looking to reach her first career Grand Slam SF today
- She is 1-5 vs. Top 10 players in 2026, with sole win coming over No.1 Aryna Sabalenka at Rome 2026
- Currently competing at a career-high ranking of No.18; earlier this month, she became the oldest player to make a Top 20 debut in the WTA Rankings
- Has won 29 Tour-level matches so far in 2026, with a clay-court record of 14-3
- Her top results in 2026 include 4th WTA singles title of her career at Cluj-Napoca (d. Raducanu in F); also made clay-court SFs at Rouen (gave walkover to eventual R-Up Podrez), and Rome (l. eventual R-Up Gauff)
- Aiming to become the first Romanian semifinalist at Roland Garros since Halep's title run in 2018 (d. Stephens in F)

- Highlights of 2024 came in the Middle East, making QF at Abu Dhabi and saving six match points in her Dubai QF match against Vondrousova to reach SF (l. eventual champion Paolini). Ended her 2024 season after Wimbledon to undergo foot surgery
- 2023 saw her best results achieved in the USA: advanced to Indian Wells QF for first time (l. Swiatek), then made SF at Miami (l. eventual champion Kvitova) and QF at US Open (l. Muchova)
- In 2022, reached SF on all three surfaces: hard court at Lyon (l. Yastremska), clay at Istanbul (l. Kudermetova), and grass at Birmingham (l. Zhang). Also enjoyed success at the Australian Open, where she fell in R16 (l. Swiatek)

- Won first WTA singles title at 2008 Tashkent (d. Lisicki in F)

- Fell 1r on Grand Slam main draw debut at 2008 Australian Open (l. No.4 seed Ivanovic)
- Made first WTA singles final at 2007 Budapest (l. Dulko)
- Made WTA main draw debut at 2006 Stockholm (l. Kanepi in 1r)
- Played first events of career on ITF Circuit in 2004
