MATCH NOTES – DAY 9 – MONDAY, JUNE 1

[1] Aryna Sabalenka (#1) vs. [16] Naomi Osaka (JPN #16)

Sabalenka leads 2-1

Sabalenka:

- Making 9th consecutive main draw appearance at Roland Garros, with her best result coming last year with run to the final (I. Gauff)
- She also made the SF here in 2023 (I. Muchova) and the QF in 2024 (I. Andrejeva)
- Overall, this is her 32nd Grand Slam main draw appearance; she is a four-time major champion, lifting the titles at Australian Open (2023-24) and US Open (2024-25)
- Current PIF WTA World No.1; she will remain at No.1 after Roland Garros following Rybakina's loss in the 2r
- She is seeking her 16th career Grand Slam QF today; and 4th consecutive QF at Roland Garros
- Bidding to become the first player to reach the quarterfinals in 14+ consecutive Grand Slam appearances since Serena Williams (16, from Wimbledon 2000 to Australian Open 2005)
- She is 11-1 so far this season vs. Top 20 players, losing only to No.5 Rybakina in the Australian Open final
- She has won a Tour-leading three WTA singles titles in 2026, at Brisbane, and the Sunshine Double of Indian Wells and Miami
- Her 3r win here saw her become the ninth player since the inception of the WTA Rankings to claim 100+ wins as World No.1 after Navratilova, Graf, Evert, S. Williams, Hingis, Seles, Swiatek and Henin

Osaka:

- Through to the 4r here for the first time in her career after 3r runs in 2019, 2018 and 2016
- Contesting her 33rd Grand Slam main draw; she is a four-time Grand Slam champion, winning titles at Australian Open in 2021 and 2019, and at US Open in 2020 and 2018
- Career record in Grand Slam 4r matches stands at 5-2; this is her first career Grand Slam 4r on a surface other than hard court
- Looking to reach a 6th career Grand Slam QF today, and her first since 2025 US Open semifinal run
- She is the first player from Japan to reach the 4r at Roland Garros since Shinobu Asagoe in 2004
- Best career result on clay is SF run at 2019 Stuttgart (I. Kontaveit via WO)
- Holds a 7-2 record on clay in 2026, involving R16 runs at Madrid (I. Sabalenka) and Rome (I. Swiatek)
- Osaka has hit the most aces at this year's Roland Garros so far (21)
- Seeking her first QF of the 2026 season after R16 runs at Indian Wells, Madrid and Rome

[19] Madison Keys (USA #19) vs. [25] Diana Shnaider (#23)

Keys leads 3-0

Keys:

- Has beaten today's opponent Shnaider twice on hard court at 2026 Brisbane and 2024 Miami, and once on grass at 2025 Queen's; this will be their first contest on clay
- Making 14th appearance at Roland Garros, where her best tournament result is SF in 2018 (l. eventual R-Up Stephens). Also reached QFs here in 2018 and 2025
- Won her maiden Grand Slam trophy at 2025 Australian Open (d. Sabalenka in F)
- Also finished R-Up at 2017 US Open (l. Stephens in F) - she is the player with the longest gap between their first two Grand Slam finals in the Open Era
- Since her Grand Slam main draw debut at 2011 US Open, only Serena Williams (28) has made more 4r at Grand Slams than Madison Keys (23, level with Angelique Kerber)
- Seeking her 13th career Grand Slam QF today, and 4th at Roland Garros
- Her win over No.9 Mboko in the previous round marked her first Top 10 win since defeating No.1 Aryna Sabalenka in the 2025 Australian Open final

Shnaider:

- Making 4th appearance at Roland Garros, she is through to the 4r here for the first time in her career after 2r runs in 2025 (l. Yastremska) and 2023 (l. Haddad Maia), and a 1r exit in 2024 (l. WC Paquet)
- Contesting 12th career Grand Slam main draw; she is bidding to reach the QF of a Grand Slam for the first time in her career today after one previous 4r showing at 2024 US Open (l. eventual finalist Pegula)
- Owns 10 career wins over Top 20 players, most recently No.15 Emma Navarro at Adelaide 2026. Has lost her last 8 consecutive matches against Top 20 players
- One of her 5 career WTA titles was won on clay at Budapest 2024 (d. Sasnovich in F)
- Best result so far this season is SF run at Adelaide (l. eventual champion M. Andreeva in F)
- Won her 3rd career doubles title (first doubles title on clay) earlier this month at Rome (w/ M. Andreeva)
- Four left-handed players (Shnaider, Wang, Chwalinska and Teichmann) have made a Grand Slam 4r for the first time since Wimbledon 2016 (Makarova, Kerber, Doi and Safarova), and for the first time at Roland Garros since 2012 (Kerber, Kvitova, Lepchenko and Rus)

[28] Anastasia Potapova (AUT #30) vs. [22] Anna Kalinskaya (#24)

Kalinskaya leads 2-0

Potapova:

- Making 6th appearance at Roland Garros, she is through to the R16 here for the second time in her career after 2024 (l. eventual champion Swiatek in R16)
- Is currently ranked No.30 (career best at No.21 in 2023); she began this year's clay court season at Linz ranked No.97
- Seeking her first career Grand Slam QF today; she is contesting in a Grand Slam 4r for the second time in her career after 2024 Roland Garros
- The last time a player representing Austria reached the 4r at Roland Garros was Sybille Bammer in 2007
- Owns 14 wins on clay so far this season; she is amongst the Top 3 on Tour for most clay court wins in 2026, alongside M. Andreeva and Kostyuk
- Coming into this year's Roland Garros, reached her third career clay court final at Linz, SF run at Madrid (as a lucky loser) and made R16 at Rome (as a qualifier)

Kalinskaya:

- Owns 2-0 career record against Potapova; defeating her twice on hard court at 2022 Cincinnati in qualifying and at 2019 Moscow
- Making 5th main draw appearance at Roland Garros, she is through to the 4r here for the first time after 2r run in 2024 (d. Burel in 1r, l. Andreescu in 2r), and 1r exits in 2025, 2022 and 2020
- Prior to this year's Roland Garros, she had only won 1 main draw match here (in 2024, d. Burel in 1r)
- Contesting her 22nd career Grand Slam main draw; her best career Grand Slam result is QF run at 2024 Australian Open (l. eventual R-Up Zheng Qinwen)
- She is through to her third career Grand Slam 4r after 2024 Australian Open QF run and 2024 Wimbledon 4r finish (l. Rybakina)
- Career-best Tour-level results on clay are QF runs at Charleston (2023, 2025 and 2026) and Strasbourg (2025)
- Best tournament finishes this year are QF finishes at Doha (l. eventual champion Muchova) and Charleston (l. Jovic)

[Q] Maja Chwalinska (POL #114) vs. Diane Parry (FRA #92)

First meeting

Chwalinska:

- Successfully qualified for this year's main draw, making her Roland Garros main draw debut
- Has reached a Grand Slam 4r for the first time, in just the 3rd Grand Slam main draw of her career
- Her previous Grand Slam main draw showings are 2025 Australian Open (as qualifier, l. 1r to Niemeier) and 2022 Wimbledon (as qualifier, d. Siniakova in 1r, l. 2r to Riske-Amritraj)
- Best career result on clay is this year's run at 2026 Roland Garros; prior to this year's event she had only won 2 Tour-level main draw matches on clay in her career
- Her only other Tour-level main draw showing of 2026 is QF run at Cluj-Napoca as a qualifier (l. eventual R-Up Raducanu), which was her first career WTA Tour QF
- Chwalinska is the third Polish player in the Open Era to reach the R16 at Roland Garros after Agnieszka Radwanska and Iga Swiatek

Parry:

- Making 8th main draw appearance at Roland Garros, and has reached 4r here for the first time
- Also through to her first career Grand Slam R16 after previously being 0-5 in Grand Slam R32 matches
- Seeking her first career Grand Slam QF today
- Has claimed 8 career main draw wins at Roland Garros - the Tour-level event where she has the most wins
- Defeated 6th seed Anisimova in the previous round which marked her second career Top 10 win after defeating defending champion and then-World No.2 Barbora Krejckova here at Roland Garros in 2022
- Only player from France to reach this week's 3r; the most recent French woman to win this title is Mary Pierce in 2000 (d. Conchita Martinez in F)
- Earlier this month, won the WTA 125 Paris title on clay (d. Keys in F via ret.)

- Sabalenka first attained the World No.1 ranking on September 11, 2023 and has held it for an overall total of 93 weeks (including weeks of May 25 & June 1, 2026 during Roland Garros)
- Faces No.16 Naomi Osaka in 4r today; she is 11-1 so far this season vs. Top 20 players, losing only to No.5 Rybakina in the Australian Open final
- Has beaten today's opponent Osaka twice already this year - at Indian Wells and Madrid
- 3 of her 24 career WTA singles titles have come on clay, all at Madrid in 2021, 2023 and 2025
- She has won 3 WTA singles titles in 2026, at Brisbane, and the Sunshine Double of Indian Wells and Miami
- Sabalenka and Swiatek are the only two players to reach the R16 in each of the last seven Grand Slams

- Reached World No.1 ranking for the first time on January 28, 2019; she held the top ranking for a total of 25 weeks

CAREER MILESTONES

- Won a Tour leading four titles in 2025, including her 4th career Grand Slam title at US Open (d. Anisimova in final) as well as Madrid, Miami and Brisbane; also finished runner-up at WTA Finals, Australian Open, Roland Garros, Indian Wells and Stuttgart for a Tour leading nine finals overall
- Ended 2025 by finishing at World No.1 for the second straight year, posting the most Tour match wins of any player with 63 and setting a new WTA single-season record in prize money with \$15,008,519
- Reached seven finals across 2024, defending her Australian Open crown, winning the US Open and also won titles at Cincinnati and Wuhan. Recaptured the No.1 ranking in October and finished the season as the WTA Year-End No.1 for the first time in her career
- Outstanding 2023 saw her win debut Grand Slam title at Australian Open (d. Rybakina in F), reach second Major final at US Open (l. Gauff in F) and become the WTA World No.1 player for the first time in career (after US Open). In addition won titles at Adelaide and Madrid
- Highlight of 2022 season was R-Up finish at WTA Finals in Fort Worth (l. Garcia in F); upset No.1 Swiatek, No.2 Jabeur and No.3 Pegula en route to final - only the fourth woman in history to beat the No.1, No.2 and No.3 at the same tournament
- Lifted two titles during 2021 campaign, at Abu Dhabi and Madrid, while was R-Up at Stuttgart. Also reached a further three SFs, including at Wimbledon and US Open
- In doubles, lifted second major at 2021 Australian Open (w/Mertens, d. Krejčíková/Siniakova in F)

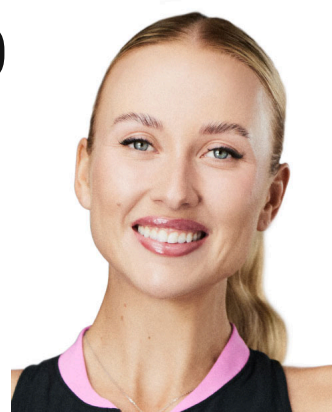
