[1] Aryna Sabalenka (#1) vs. Jelena Ostapenko (LAT #31)

Sabalenka leads 3-1

Sabalenka:

- Making seventh Wimbledon appearance, she reached the semifinals in her last three visits here: 2021 (l. Pliskova), 2023 (l. Jabeur) and 2025 (l. Anisimova)
- This is her 33rd Grand Slam main draw; she is a four-time major champion, lifting titles at Australian Open (2023-24) and US Open (2024-25)
- Holds a 19-4 career record in Grand Slam 3r matches (3-0 in Wimbledon 3r matches)
- This is her seventh consecutive Grand Slam appearance as top seed; since 2000, only Serena Williams (15), Iga Swiatek (11) and Martina Hingis (8) have had more consecutive major appearances as No.1 seed
- She has won a Tour-leading three WTA singles titles in 2026 (level with M. Andrejeva); at Brisbane, and the Sunshine Double of Indian Wells and Miami
- Best career results on grass are runner-up finishes at 2022 's-Hertogenbosch (l. Alexandrova) and 2018 Eastbourne (l. Wozniacki)
- Holds a 3-1 head-to-head lead over today's opponent Ostapenko, but Sabalenka lost their most recent meeting in the 2025 Stuttgart final on indoor clay

Ostapenko:

- Making 11th appearance at Wimbledon, where her best tournament result is reaching SF in 2018 (l. eventual champion Kerber)
- Has also reached two additional Wimbledon QFs in 2017 (l. eventual R-Up Venus Williams) and 2024 (l. eventual champion Krejčíková)
- Contesting her 42nd career Grand Slam main draw; she has won one Grand Slam title at 2017 Roland Garros (d. Halep in F) and has made QF or better at all four Slams
- Owns 26 Tour-level wins in career over Top 10 players, most recently No.7 Jasmine Paolini at 2026 Miami
- Has won 3 of her 4 career meetings against a reigning World No.1, defeating Garbiñe Muguruza at Wuhan 2017, Iga Swiatek at US Open 2023 and Aryna Sabalenka at Stuttgart 2025 (the only loss was to Ashleigh Barty at Miami 2021)
- Two of her nine career WTA singles titles have come on grass, at 2021 Eastbourne (d. Kontaveit in F) and 2023 Birmingham (d. Krejčíková in F)
- She is 5-1 on grass so far this year; earlier in this year's grass swing, she made Eastbourne SF (ret. vs. eventual R-Up Maria)

[4] Jessica Pegula (USA #4) vs. Jessica Bouzas Maneiro (ESP #51)

Pegula leads 1-0

Pegula:

- Making 7th main draw showing at Wimbledon; best result here is 2023 QF (l. eventual champion Vondrousova)
- Overall this is her 30th Grand Slam main draw appearance and she has reached at least the quarterfinal stage at all the Slams - US Open final in 2024, QF at Roland Garros in 2022 and SF at 2026 Australian Open
- Coming off the back of reaching her third career final on grass, finishing runner-up at Berlin (l. Noskova in F)
- Two of her 11 career Tour-level titles have come on grass; at 2025 Bad Homburg and 2024 Berlin
- With titles this year at Charleston (clay) and Dubai (hard court), looking to win titles on all surfaces for the 2nd consecutive year. Since 1990, only Henin (2006-2007) and Graf (1991-1993 and 1995-1996) have accomplished this
- She is the first player to appear within the Top 5 seeds at Wimbledon after having turned 32 since Serena Williams in 2016 when she claimed the title
- Owns 12-1 record this season vs. opponents ranked outside the Top 50, only loss came against No.83 Birrell in the 1r at Roland Garros

Bouzas Maneiro:

- Making 4th appearance at Wimbledon, her best result here came last year with a 4r finish (l. Samsonova)
- Her R16 finish here last year is her career-best result across all the Slams
- Record on grass this season stands at 5-3; includes QF finish at Nottingham (l. eventual R-Up Navarro), 2r run at Eastbourne (l. eventual champion Keys) and 1r exit at 's-Hertogenbosch (l. Tomljanovic)
- Owns 3 career wins over Top 10 players; defeated No.4 Coco Gauff at 2026 United Cup, No.9 Navarro at 2025 Roland Garros and No.6 Vondrousova at 2024 Wimbledon
- Best Tour-level results so far this season are QF finishes at Nottingham and Rabat

[Q] Claire Liu (USA #146) vs. [7] Coco Gauff (USA #7)

Gauff leads 2-0

Liu:

- Contesting her 18th career Grand Slam main draw, and this is the first time she has made a Grand Slam 3r
- Making 5th main draw showing at Wimbledon - this is her first appearance in a Wimbledon main draw since 2023, and she has notched her first Wimbledon main draw victories since 2022
- Owns 1 career win over Top 10 players, defeating No.2 Jabeur at 2022 Monastir (0-6 vs. Top 10 since then)
- This will be her first meeting vs. a Top 10 player since January 2024, (l. today's opponent Gauff at Auckland)
- At 2018 Wimbledon, she was the only player to win a set off of eventual champion Angelique Kerber
- Won the Junior Wimbledon singles title in 2017 (d. Ann Li in all-American final)

Gauff:

- Making 7th appearance at Wimbledon, where her best tournament results are R16 finishes in 2019 (l. eventual champion Halep), 2021 (l. Kerber) and 2024 (l. Navarro)
- She is a 2-time Grand Slam champion, winning titles at 2023 US Open and 2025 Roland Garros
- Her 2 wins so far this week are her first grass-court wins since she defeated Kartal in 2024 Wimbledon 3r
- Career-best results on grass are SFs at 2022 Berlin (l. eventual champion Jabeur), 2023 Eastbourne (l. eventual champion Keys) and 2024 Berlin (l. eventual champion Pegula)
- Holds a 4-0 record vs. American players in 2026 (one win each over Townsend, Jovic, Parks and Baptiste)
- Gauff had won her last 23 matches vs. players ranked outside the Top 100 before that streak was ended 2 weeks ago in Berlin by No.142 (and former World No.2) Paula Badosa
- Best tournament finishes so far this year are R-Up showings at WTA 1000 events in Miami (l. Sabalenka in F) and Rome (l. Svitolina in F)

[10] Karolina Muchova (CZE #9) vs. [Q] Mananchaya Sawangkaew (THA #164) First meeting

Muchova:

- Making 7th appearance at Wimbledon; her best results here are QF runs in 2021 (l. Kerber) and 2019 (l. Svitolina)
- Her 1r win over Zakharova this week was her first victory at Wimbledon since her 2021 QF run
- Contesting her 28th Grand Slam main draw; her runner-up finish at Roland Garros 2023 marked her career-best Grand Slam result (l. Swiatek in F)
- Wimbledon is the only Grand Slam event where she is yet to reach the SF
- Victories over Zakharova and S. Zhang so far this week have given her a career-high seven Tour-level wins on grass in 2026 (had four such wins in 2021 and 2019)
- Holds a career record of 13-4 at Grand Slams vs. opponents ranked outside the Top 100 (0-1 in 2026, l. Teichmann in 3r at Roland Garros)
- Won the first grass court title of her career last week at Bad Homburg (d. Osaka in final via ret.)
- Has won 31 matches so far in 2026 - in addition to Bad Homburg, also won another title this year at WTA 1000 Doha (d. Mboko in F)
- Third career match (2-0) against a qualifier at a Grand Slam (d. Tsurenko in 1r at Australian Open 2023, d. Lepchenko in 2r at Roland Garros 2021)

Sawangkaew:

- Making her main draw debut at Wimbledon; second career main draw appearance at a Grand Slam (l. Raducanu in 1r at 2026 Australian Open)
- Contesting her first career Tour-level main draw on grass (appeared in qualifying at 2024 Wimbledon)
- Has defeated two Top 100 opponents so far this week (d. No.21 Chwalinska in 1r and No.81 Parks in 2r); prior to this event, she had a total of two such victories
- Only player from Thailand remaining in the main draw (Taratudee fell in 2r against Alexandrova)
- Best result by Thailand at Wimbledon was QF run by Tamarine Tanasugarn in 2008 (l. eventual champion Venus Williams)
- Looking to win three consecutive matches for the first time in her Tour-level career

[11] Belinda Bencic (SUI #11) vs. [19] Anna Kalinskaya (#20)

Bencic leads 4-1

Bencic:

- Making 10th main draw appearance at Wimbledon, where her best tournament result was reaching last year's SF (l. eventual champion Swiatek)
- Career-best Grand Slam results are SFs at 2019 US Open (l. eventual champion Andreescu) and 2025 Wimbledon
- One of her 10 career titles has come on grass, at 2015 Eastbourne (d. A. Radwanska in F), and she has made four additional WTA grass court finals
- Best tournament finishes this year are QFs at Miami (l. eventual R-Up Gauff) and Charleston (l. Keys); she also went 5-0 in singles at 2026 United Cup for Team Switzerland, who finished as runners-up
- Has claimed 21 main draw career wins at Wimbledon - she only has more at the US Open (22) in a single WTA level event so far in her career
- Since 2014, when she made her Tour level debut on the surface, Bencic (53) is one of the five players to have claimed 50+ Tour-level wins on grass alongside Kerber, Ka. Pliskova, Ostapenko and Keys

Kalinskaya:

- Making 5th main draw appearance at Wimbledon, career-best result here is a 4r finish in 2024 (l. Rybakina)
- Has reached QFs at Grand Slams on two occasions - at 2024 Australian Open (l. Zheng) and 2026 Roland Garros (l. eventual finalist Chwalinska)
- Owns 26 career wins over Top 20 players, most recently against today's opponent No.12 Belinda Bencic at Rome 2026; prior to this match in Rome she was 0-4 against Bencic
- Best career result on grass is R-Up finish at 2024 Berlin (l. Pegula in F)
- Has won 20 matches so far in 2026 including QFs at Roland Garros, Charleston and Doha

Daria Kasatkina (AUS #65) vs. [14] Naomi Osaka (JPN #14)

Osaka leads 3-0

Kasatkina:

- Making 9th main draw appearance at Wimbledon, her previous best result was reaching QF in 2018 (l. eventual champion Kerber)
- Her best result across the Slams is SF run at Roland Garros 2022 (l. eventual champion Swiatek)
- Her 1r win over Xu marked her first grass court win of the season after opening round defeats at s'Hertogenbosch and Eastbourne. Also fell in Q1 at Nottingham
- Owns one singles title on grass at Eastbourne 2024 (d. Fernandez in F); has also reached two additional grass court finals at 2021 Birmingham (l. Jabeur) and 2023 Eastbourne (l. Keys)
- Looking to earn first match win over Osaka today, with the most recent defeat coming at 2025 US Open

Osaka:

- Contesting her 6th main draw at Wimbledon, where her best result was reaching 3r in 2025 (l. Pavlyuchenkova), 2018 (l. eventual champion Kerber) and 2017 (l. Venus Williams)
- Contesting her 34th Grand Slam main draw; she is a four-time Grand Slam champion winning titles at Australian Open in 2021 and 2019, and at US Open in 2020 and 2018
- Career record in Grand Slam 3r matches stands at 8-13 (0-3 at Wimbledon); last won a Grand Slam 3r match during R16 run at 2026 Roland Garros
- Reached her first Tour-level grass-court final at Bad Homburg last week in first grass event of the season
- Reached World No.1 for the first time on January 28, 2019, and held the top ranking for 25 weeks in her career

[18] Ekaterina Alexandrova (#19) vs. [16] Iva Jovic (USA #16)

Alexandrova leads 1-0

Alexandrova:

- Making 8th Wimbledon appearance, with her best result being R16 finishes in 2023 (l. Sabalenka) and 2025 (l. Bencic) – her two most recent appearances at this event
- Her R16 showings at Wimbledon equal her career-best Grand Slam results (four times reaching R16 of a major, also 2025 Roland Garros and 2025 US Open)
- Coming into this year's Championships, made QF at Bad Homburg, R16 at Berlin and fell in 1r at 's-Hertogenbosch
- Two of her 5 career WTA singles titles have been on grass, back-to-back at 's-Hertogenbosch in 2022 (d. Sabalenka in F) and 2023 (d. V. Kudrmetova in F)
- Best tournament finish so far this year is R-Up at Abu Dhabi (l. qualifier Bejlek in F)

Jovic:

- Win over Cristian in the 1r marked her first-ever main draw win at Wimbledon (l. in last year's 1r to Lamens, as a qualifier)
- Best result on grass at Tour-level came last month at London, where she reached the semifinal (l. Raducanu)
- Also claimed a WTA 125 title on grass at Ilkley 2025 (d. Marino in final)
- Contesting her 8th career Grand Slam main draw; she reached her first Grand Slam QF earlier this year at Australian Open (l. Sabalenka)
- Owns two career wins over Top 20 players; defeating No.5 Anisimova at 2026 London and No.8 Paolini at 2026 Australian Open

Nikola Bartunkova (CZE #48) vs. Barbora Krejcikova (CZE #38)

First meeting

Bartunkova:

- Making tournament debut at Wimbledon
- Competing in her third career Grand Slam main draw; her Grand Slam debut came at this year's Australian Open where she made a run to the 3r as a qualifier (d. No.10 Bencic in 2r, l. Mertens in 3r)
- Owns 7 wins in career over Top 50 players, including a win over No.36 Siniakova in the previous round
- Two weeks ago, she made her first grass-court Tour-level QF at 2026 Berlin (l. World No.1 Sabalenka)
- Also reached a WTA 125 final on grass earlier this year at Birmingham (finished R-Up to Eala)
- Started this year ranked No.126 – she made her Top 100 debut on March 30 and her Top 50 debut on June 22

Krejcikova:

- Making her 6th main draw appearance at Wimbledon, where she won her second career Grand Slam singles title in 2024 (d. Paolini in F)
- Contesting her 25th career Grand Slam main draw; her two Grand Slam singles titles are 2021 Roland Garros (d. Pavlyuchenkova in F) and 2024 Wimbledon
- Her two victories so far this week are her first Grand Slam match-wins of the year, after falling 1r at Australian Open (l. Shnaider) and Roland Garros (l. Baptiste)
- Her 2r victory over reigning Roland Garros champion Andreeva was her first 3-set win of the year at Tour-level, as well as her first Top 10 win since 2024
- Her best Tour-level result of 2026 was reaching the final at 's-Hertogenbosch on grass (gave walkover in final vs. Montgomery due to respiratory illness)
- One of four former Wimbledon women's singles champions to start this year's main draw, along with Elena Rybakina, Iga Swiatek and Serena Williams

- 1 of 2 players from Latvia to start this week's main draw (lucky loser Semenistaja lost in 1r)
- Best result by Latvia at Wimbledon is Ostapenko's SF finish in 2018
- Her best tournament finishes so far this year are SFs at Doha (l. eventual R-Up Mboko) and Eastbourne
- Is currently ranked No.31; this time last year was ranked No.21. Reached career-high ranking of No.5 in March 2018
