FROM MATCH POINT DOWN TO THE FINAL

Both of today's finalists have saved match point during this fortnight:

- Noskova saved match point during the third set of her third-round match vs. No.17 seed Sorana Cirstea of Romania
- Muchova saved match point in the third-set match-tiebreak of her semifinal against No.7 seed Coco Gauff of the United States

This is the first Grand Slam final between two women who saved match point en route since the 2018 Australian Open, when both champion Caroline Wozniacki and runner-up Simona Halep did so on their way to the final.

Today's champion will become the third woman to win the Wimbledon title after saving match point en route, joining Venus Williams (2005) and Serena Williams (2009).

SINGLES FINAL QUICK HITS

With the first all-Czech Republic Grand Slam final lined up for today, this becomes the first Grand Slam final between two women representing the same country since the 2017 US Open, where American Sloane Stephens defeated her compatriot Madison Keys for the title.

This is the first time two women representing the same country will meet in a Wimbledon final since Serena Williams defeated her sister Venus in an all-American 2009 Wimbledon championship match.

Noskova (21 years, 237 days old at this year's tournament end date) is the youngest woman to reach the Wimbledon final since 20-year-old Eugenie Bouchard finished runner-up in 2014 (losing to Petra Kvitova in the final).

If Noskova wins the title, she will become the youngest Wimbledon champion since her fellow Czech Petra Kvitova in 2011, who won that year's title aged 21 years, 116 days old (at tournament end date).

Muchova and Noskova are tied for the most Tour-level match-wins on grass in 2026. They enter today's final with identical 11-1 records on grass this season.

Both Muchova and Noskova won grass court titles ahead of Wimbledon this year – Noskova three weeks ago at Berlin, and Muchova two weeks ago at Bad Homburg. This is the first Wimbledon final between two women who won grass court Tour titles earlier in the season since 1990 (Martina Navratilova and Zina Garrison).

The champion will become the first player to win a Tour event on grass and then also win Wimbledon in the same calendar year since Maria Sharapova won Birmingham and Wimbledon in 2004.

Muchova and Noskova teamed up for doubles at the 2024 Paris Olympics, where they finished in 4th place after falling in the bronze-medal final to the Spanish duo of Cristina Bucsa and Sara Sorribes Tormo.

Today's champion will be the third Czech in the last four years to win this title, after 2023 titlist Marketa Vondrousova and 2024 titlist Barbora Krejčíková.

PIF WTA RANKINGS WATCH

Both Muchova and Noskova will post new career-high rankings after Wimbledon.

Muchova is currently ranked No.9 and holds a career-high ranking of No.8, first set in September 2023. If she wins this title, she is projected to climb to No.4. If she finishes as runner-up, she is projected to leave Wimbledon ranked No.6.

Noskova is currently ranked No.12 and reached her career-high ranking of No.10 last month after winning the Berlin title. If she wins this title, she is projected to climb to No.7. If she finishes as runner-up, she is projected to rise to No.8.

PIF RACE TO THE WTA FINALS UPDATE

If Muchova wins the Wimbledon title, she is projected to rise to No.2 in the PIF Race to the WTA Finals, and she would be only 29 points behind Race No.1 Mirra Andreeva, last month's Roland Garros champion.

Currently No.6 in the Race, Muchova is projected to rise to at least No.4 with a runner-up performance.

Noskova entered Wimbledon No.12 in the Race, and by making the final she is projected to move to at least No.9. She is projected to climb up to No.7 in the Race if she wins the Wimbledon title.

Muchova:

- Making 7th main draw appearance at Wimbledon, and has reached the final here for the first time
- Her previous best Wimbledon finishes were quarterfinals in 2019 (l. Svitolina) and 2021 (l. Kerber)
- Her six wins this fortnight are her first victories at Wimbledon since her 2021 QF run (went 0-4 at this event from 2022 to 2025)
- With her result this fortnight, she has now made the semifinals or better at all four Grand Slam events
- She has become the fourth woman competing for Czech Republic in the Open Era to make the SFs at all four Grand Slam events after Hana Mandlikova, Jana Novotna and Karolina Pliskova
- Contesting her 28th career Grand Slam main draw; she has reached one previous Grand Slam final at 2023 Roland Garros (finished R-Up to Swiatek in F)
- Currently on a 10-match winning streak, having won the title at her event prior to Wimbledon at Bad Homburg (d. Osaka in F, via ret.) – this is her career-best winning streak at Tour-level
- 2026 Bad Homburg was also the first grass court title of her career
- Holds an 11-1 record on grass this year; along with her Bad Homburg title and Wimbledon final, she also reached Berlin R16 (l. Keys)
- Owns 40 wins in career over Top 20 players, including 2 this fortnight over No.14 Osaka (QF) and No.7 Gauff (SF)
- Has won two WTA titles this year at Doha (d. Mboko in F) and Bad Homburg, and was also R-Up at 2026 Stuttgart (l. Rybakina in F)
- Muchova is one of two players to reach Tour-level finals on all three surfaces this year, along with Pegula
- Before this season, she had won only one career Tour-level title, at 2019 Seoul (d. Linette in F)
- Owns 12-2 career Tour-level record against her fellow Czech players (3-0 in 2026, including a win over former Wimbledon champion Krejčíková in this fortnight's 4r)
- 29-year-old Muchova could become the fifth woman aged 29+ to win a maiden Grand Slam title in this century, after Francesca Schiavone, Li Na, Flavia Pennetta and Madison Keys
- She is the oldest woman to reach a maiden Wimbledon final since 30-year-old Nathalie Tauziat in 1998 (finished R-Up to Jana Novotna)
- At this event, Muchova became the fifth woman in the Open Era to defeat three Grand Slam champions in the second week en route to a Grand Slam final (defeating Krejčíková, Osaka and Gauff) – she joins Chris Evert (Wimbledon 1978), Serena Williams (US Open 1999, Wimbledon 2015), Elena Rybakina (Australian Open 2023) and Ons Jabeur (Wimbledon 2023)
- Currently ranked No.9 and reached career-high ranking of No.8 for the first time in September 2023. She will post a new career-high ranking after Wimbledon, projected to rise to either No.4 with title or No.6 with R-Up

Noskova:

- Making her 4th Wimbledon main draw appearance, and she has advanced to a Grand Slam final for the first time in her career
- Her previous best Wimbledon result was a 4r showing last year (l. eventual R-Up Anisimova)
- Before her run this fortnight, her best Grand Slam performance was reaching QF at 2024 Australian Open (l. Yastremska)
- Noskova (21 years, 237 days old at this year's tournament end date) is the youngest woman to reach the Wimbledon final since 20-year-old Eugenie Bouchard finished R-Up in 2014 (losing to Petra Kvitova in the final)
- If Noskova wins the title, she will become the youngest Wimbledon champion since her fellow Czech Petra Kvitova in 2011, who won that year's title aged 21 years, 116 days old (at tournament end date)
- Two players aged 21 or younger (Mirra Andrejeva and Noskova) could win Roland Garros and Wimbledon in the same season, which would be the first time that happens since 2003 (Justine Henin and Serena Williams)
- Holds an 11-1 record on grass this year, surpassing her previous career-high of 8 grass court wins in a single season, set in 2025
- Has posted 19 grass court Tour-level wins since the start of last year – the most by any player in that time frame
- Won her first grass court title at 2026 Berlin (d. Pegula in F), marking her second career WTA title (her first career WTA title was 2024 Monterrey on hard court, d. Sun in F)
- Also won her first career WTA doubles title at 2026 Berlin, completing the singles/doubles title sweep at that event – she is 1 of 2 players to complete a singles/doubles title sweep this year along with Bucsa at Merida
- Owns 13 wins in career over Top 10 players, most recently No.4 Jessica Pegula in the Berlin final 3 weeks ago
- Has a 3-6 career Tour-level record against her fellow Czech players; her most recent meeting vs. another Czech was a loss to today's opponent Muchova in 2025 US Open 3r
- She has become the fourth woman since 2020 to reach her first Grand Slam singles final at Wimbledon, joining 2022 champion Elena Rybakina, 2022-2023 runner-up Ons Jabeur and 2025 runner-up Amanda Anisimova
- This is her first time being seeded amongst the Top 10 at a Grand Slam event
- Currently ranked No.12 – she made her Top 10 debut last month after winning the Berlin title, peaking at her career-high ranking of No.10
- She will post a new career-high ranking after Wimbledon – if she wins this title, she is projected to climb to No.7. If she finishes as runner-up, she is projected to rise to No.8
