TOP FOUR IN THE FINAL FOUR

This year, the Top 4 seeds have all made it into the US Open semifinals. In the Open Era, the only other time this has happened at the US Open in women's singles was 1975 (No.1 seed Evert, No.2 seed Wade, No.3 seed Navratilova and No.4 seed Goolagong – Evert defeated Goolagong in the final).

Prior to this fortnight, the most recent time that all of the Top 4 women's singles seeds made the semifinals at a Grand Slam event was 2009 Wimbledon (No.1 seed Safina, No.2 seed S.Williams, No.3 seed V.Williams and No.4 seed Dementieva – S.Williams defeated V.Williams in the final).

Sabalenka leads 9-4

Sabalenka:

- The two-time defending champion is making her 9th main draw appearance at the US Open
- She reached the final in each of her last three visits here, winning back-to-back US Open titles in 2024 (d. Pegula in F) and 2025 (d. Anisimova in F), and finishing runner-up in 2023 (l. Gauff in F)
- Looking to become the first player to win three consecutive titles at the US Open since S. Williams (2012-2014)
- Contesting her 34th career Grand Slam main draw; along with her two US Open titles, she also won back-to-back Australian Open titles in 2023 (d. Rybakina in F) and 2024 (d. Zheng Qinwen in F)
- This is her sixth consecutive US Open semifinal appearance, and her 15th career Grand Slam SF overall
- She is the 6th woman in the Open Era to reach 6+ consecutive US Open semifinals after Evert (16, 1971-1986), Graf (seven, 1985-1991), Hingis (six, 1996-2001), V. Williams (six, 1997-2002) and S. Williams (six, 2011-2016)
- She is also the 4th woman in the Open Era to reach 9+ consecutive Grand Slam hard court semifinals after Hingis (12, US Open 1996-Aus. Open 2002), Evert (nine, US Open 1978-1986) and Graf (nine, US Open 1985-1990)
- Seeking 9th career Grand Slam final, and second of 2026 after R-Up finish at Australian Open (l. Rybakina in F)
- Holds an 8-6 career record in Grand Slam semifinal matches (3-2 in US Open semifinal matches, winning her last three, including over today's opponent Pegula last year)
- Leads Pegula 9-4 in their overall head-to-head, and leads Pegula 6-3 in their hard court head-to-head – this is a rematch of the 2024 US Open final and the 2025 US Open semifinals, both won by Sabalenka
- She is 6-2 so far this season against Top 10 opponents, most recently earning a win over No. 6 Linda Noskova in this week's quarterfinals (in third-set match-tiebreak)
- Is one of only two players on Tour to have won three titles this season (Brisbane, Indian Wells, Miami), alongside M. Andrejeva (Adelaide, Linz, Roland Garros)
- 21 of her 24 career Tour-level titles have come on hard court, including her three titles this year at Brisbane (d. Kostyuk in F), Indian Wells (d. Rybakina in F) and Miami (d. Gauff in F)

Pegula:

- Making her 10th main draw appearance at US Open (31st Grand Slam main draw appearance overall), and is into the semifinals here for the 3rd straight year
- Her best result at the US Open is R-Up finish in 2024 (l. Sabalenka); this is also her best result across all Slams
- This is her 4th career Grand Slam SF (all on hard court) – along with her 2024 US Open R-Up, she has SF finishes at 2025 US Open (l. eventual champion Sabalenka) and 2026 Australian Open (l. eventual champion Rybakina)
- She is the first player in the Open Era to reach her first four career Grand Slam semifinals after turning 30
- Also has become the second player aged 30+ in the Open Era to reach 3+ consecutive semifinals at the US Open, along with Serena Williams
- Pegula's 28 main draw match-wins at the US Open is her highest career tally at a single Tour-level event
- Has a 7-6 record vs. Top 10 players this year, with her most recent Top 10 win coming over No. 5 Swiatek in 2026 Cincinnati SF (l. No. 4 Gauff in 2026 Cincinnati F)
- Holds a 6-8 career record vs. players ranked World No. 1 at the time of their meeting (1-0 this year, defeating today's opponent Sabalenka in Berlin SF on grass)
- 7 of her 11 career WTA titles have come on hard court; her most recent hard court title is 2026 Dubai (d. Svitolina in F for her 4th career WTA 1000 title)
- In addition to her Dubai title this season, she also won a title on clay at Charleston (d. Starodubtseva in F)
- Has reached three additional finals this season at Cincinnati, Washington DC and Berlin – with 5 finals, she has the most Tour-level finals among all players in 2026
- Has claimed the most wins (50), hard court wins (34, level with Elena Rybakina) and wins on American soil (24) at Tour-level events this season

Tied 1-1

Gauff:

- Making her 8th main draw appearance at US Open; she won the title here in 2023, becoming the first American teenager to win the US Open since Serena Williams in 1999
- Contesting her 29th Grand Slam main draw, having won two major titles: 2023 US Open (d. Sabalenka in F) and 2025 Roland Garros (d. Sabalenka in F)
- Seeking her 4th career Grand Slam final; along with her two Grand Slam titles at 2023 US Open and 2025 Roland Garros, she was runner-up at 2022 Roland Garros (l. Swiatek in F)
- This is her 7th career Grand Slam SF, and her second at US Open after her title run in 2023
- Among active players, only Venus Williams (12) and Serena Williams (10) reached more Grand Slam semifinals than Gauff (7) before the age of 23
- Holds a 3-3 career record in Grand Slam SF matches (1-0 in US Open SF matches, d. Muchova in 2023 SF)
- Is into her 2nd Grand Slam SF of the year after 2026 Wimbledon (l. eventual R-Up Muchova in SF)
- Gauff has reached SF at consecutive Grand Slam events for the 2nd time in her career, after 3 straight between 2023 US Open and 2024 Roland Garros
- Has now won 25 main draw matches at US Open in her career – the US Open is the second Tour-level tournament at which Gauff has claimed 25 wins in her career, along with Roland Garros (29)
- She is 5-5 this season against Top 10 opponents, including her win over No.5 M.Andreeva in yesterday's QF (Gauff saved 2 match points in the second set of that QF victory)
- 10 of her 12 career WTA titles have been won on hard court, most recently at 2026 Cincinnati (d. Pegula in F); when Gauff last won the Cincinnati title in 2023, she went on to capture the US Open title
- The most recent American to win the US Open title was Gauff herself in 2023

Rybakina:

- By reaching this week's semifinals, Rybakina has guaranteed her rise to World No.1 in Monday's updated rankings for the first time in her career – she will be the 30th player to reach World No.1 in WTA Rankings history
- Making her 8th main draw appearance at US Open; this week, she reached the QF and SF here for the first time in her career (she has now reached QF or better at all four Grand Slam events)
- She owns two Grand Slam titles, winning 2022 Wimbledon (d. Jabeur in F) and 2026 Australian Open (d. Sabalenka in F); also finished runner-up at 2023 Australian Open (l. Sabalenka in F)
- This is her 5th career Grand Slam semifinal, and her second of the year after her 2026 Australian Open title run
- Seeking her 4th career Grand Slam final (3rd on hard court) – she is 3-1 in her career in Grand Slam SF matches, most recently defeating Pegula in the 2026 Australian Open SF en route to the title
- Holds an 8-5 record this year vs. Top 10 players, with her most recent Top 10 win coming over today's opponent Gauff in 2026 Toronto SF
- She is 9-0 vs. American players in 2026, including a win over wild card Thea Frodin in this fortnight's 1st round
- 7 of her 13 career Tour-level titles have come on hard court; her most recent hard court title is her 2026 Australian Open crown
- Along with her 2026 Australian Open title, she won her 2nd title of the year on clay at Stuttgart (d. Muchova in F)
- Only Pegula (50) has claimed more match-wins at Tour-level than Rybakina (47) so far this season
- At Tour-level, Rybakina has hit the most winners (1579) and aces (394) among all players in 2026
- She can become the fifth player in the past two decades to reach both the Australian Open and US Open finals in a calendar year, along with Henin (2006), Azarenka (2012-13), Kerber (2016) and Sabalenka (2023-25)
- Rybakina and Gauff have split their two previous meetings, which have both taken place on the hard courts of Toronto – Gauff won in three sets in the 2022 2nd round; Rybakina won in three sets in last month's semifinals

CAREER MILESTONES

- In 2025, won her first WTA Finals title, where she posted a perfect round robin record before topping World No.1 Sabalenka in the final; by going undefeated (5-0) at 2025 WTA Finals Riyadh, she earned \$5.235m, the biggest prize money payout in women's sporting history
- Overall, won three titles in 2025, adding Strasbourg and Ningbo crowns to her Riyadh triumph; finished at No.5 in the rankings and as the year's Tour leader in total aces (516)
- Won three titles from five finals in 2024, tasting success at Brisbane, Abu Dhabi and Stuttgart and finishing R-Up at Doha and Miami. Qualified for her second WTA Finals and defeated WTA World No.1 Sabalenka in the group stage
- Reached second Grand Slam final at 2023 Australian Open (l. Sabalenka in 3s); made Top-10 debut following tournament (January 30, 2023). Also in 2023 won first two WTA 1000 titles at Indian Wells and Rome and finished R-Up at Miami. Qualified for first WTA Finals, going 1-2 in group stage.
- Lifted maiden Grand Slam title at 2022 Wimbledon (d. Jabeur in F); also finished R-Up at Adelaide (l. Barty) and Portoroz (l. Siniakova)
- Best results of 2021 were SFs at Eastbourne, Olympics and Chicago [500], and QFs at Abu Dhabi, Roland Garros, San Jose and Ostrava
- Opened 2020 by reaching the championship match at four of her first five tournaments, including a title run at Hobart (d. Zhang in F), and made Top 20 debut at No.19 on February 17, after reaching St. Petersburg final. First Top-5 win came over No.3 Ka. Pliskova during R-Up finish at 2020 Dubai
- Won maiden WTA singles title at 2019 Bucharest (d. Tig in F), breaking into Top 100 for the first time in the following week's rankings at No.65 (July 22). Went on to make Top 50 debut on September 16 after reaching second career Tour final at Nanchang (l. Peterson)
- Highlights of 2018 included reaching maiden WTA QF at St. Petersburg (l. Goerges) and clinching title at \$15K ITF/Kazan. First Top 10 win came over No.7 Garcia at 2018 St. Petersburg
- Made WTA qualifying and main draw debut at 2017 Moscow (as qualifier, l. Begu in 1r)
- Professional debut came at \$10k ITF/Antalya-TUR in 2014
- In 2025, won her second Grand Slam title of career at Roland Garros (d. Sabalenka in final) and her third career WTA 1000 title at Wuhan; also made WTA 1000 finals at Madrid and Rome, becoming the first American to reach three WTA 1000 finals in a calendar year since Serena Williams in 2014
- Went three for three in finals in 2024, winning Auckland, Beijing and a historic first WTA Finals Riyadh title. Success in Saudi Arabia saw her win a record \$4.8m in prize money, the most ever awarded in women's professional sports, and defeat the World No.1 and No.2 at the same event. Posted a new career-high of No.2 in June
- Won debut Grand Slam singles crown in 2023 lifting title on home soil at US Open (d. Sabalenka in F). Picked up another three titles in 2023, marking first WTA 1000 title at Cincinnati and debut WTA 500 title at Washington DC, in addition to WTA 250 Auckland. In doubles was co-ranked No.1 with Pegula after US Open.
- In 2022, reached maiden Grand Slam final at Roland-Garros (l. Swiatek); was the youngest major finalist since Sharapova won 2004 Wimbledon
- Made Top 10 debut on September 12, 2022, following QF run at US Open (l. Garcia)
- Highlight of 2021 campaign was completing singles-doubles title sweep at Parma; defeated Wang Qiang in singles final and teamed up w/McNally to win doubles
- In 2021 also reached SF at Adelaide and Rome, while at the Slams made QF at Roland-Garros and R16 at Wimbledon. Finished R-Up in doubles at 2021 US Open (w/McNally, l. Stosur/Zhang)
- First cracked the Top 50 on February 24, 2020 at No.49, following a R16 appearance at Australian Open to tie her career best Grand Slam result - during run, defeated V.Williams in 1r and her first Top-5 opponent in No.4 Osaka in 3r (l. eventual champion Kenin in 3s)
- Enjoyed breakout season in 2019, highlighted by maiden WTA singles title at Linz (as lucky loser, d. Ostapenko in F) - earned her first Top-10 win en route to title over No.8 Bertens in QF. At 15y 214d, her title run in Linz made her youngest to win a Tour-level title since Vaidisova (15y 177d) won Tashkent in 2004
- Also claimed maiden WTA doubles titles at Washington, DC (w/McNally, d. Sanchez/Stollar in F) and Luxembourg (w/McNally, d. Christian/Guarachi in F). By winning the doubles title at Washington, DC at 15y 144d, became the

youngest player to win a doubles title since May 1995 (Hingis won Hamburg at 14y 219d)

- Reached R16 at 2019 Wimbledon on Grand Slam main draw debut defeating V.Williams in 1r (l. eventual champion Halep) - followed with 3r showing at US Open (as WC, l. Osaka)
- Made WTA main draw debut as a wildcard at 2019 Miami where she earned her first WTA main draw win over good friend McNally (l. Kasatkina in 2r)
- Made professional debut in May 2018 as a qualifier into the \$25K ITF/Osprey, FL-USA
- Former Junior World No.1 (July 2018); won 2018 Roland-Garros girls' title (d. McNally in F) and 2018 US Open doubles title (w/McNally), while finished R-Up at 2017 US Open girls' event (l. Anisimova) becoming the youngest girls' singles finalist in tournament history at 13-years-old
