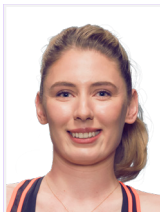

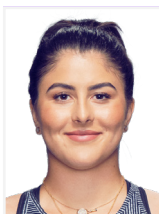

CAREER HIGHLIGHTS

- Reached third WTA singles final in 2021, enjoying run to final at home tournament of Moscow (I. Kontaveit). Other key result was SF run at Gippsland Trophy (I. Kanepi) as she finished in the Top 35 for 3rd consecutive year
- Posted two best wins-by-ranking of career defeating No.2 Halep (2021 Gippsland Trophy) and No.2 Sabalenka (2021 Moscow)
- Contested Olympics for the first time, reaching 2r at Tokyo 2020
- Part of Russian Tennis Federation team that won the 2021 Billie Jean King Cup
- Opened 2020 season by lifting her maiden WTA singles title, at Shenzhen (d. Rybakina in F). Other highlights of 2020 season included SFs at St. Petersburg and Linz
- Won both singles rubbers on Billie Jean King Cup debut in 3-2 win over Romania in February 2020
- Made Top 50 debut on June 17, 2019 after QF run at 's-Hertogenbosch
- Registered 30 Tour-level match wins during 2019, in which she reached SF at Budapest, Seoul and Linz and made QF at St. Petersburg, 's-Hertogenbosch, Eastbourne and Moscow. Also advanced to 3r at a major for the first time, at Roland Garros
- Won sole WTA doubles title at 2019 Budapest (w/Zvonareva)
- Came through qualifying to make maiden WTA final appearance at 2018 Linz (I. Giorgi)
- Advanced to first WTA QF at 2018 Seoul, scoring maiden Top 10 win of her career en route, over No.10 OstapenkoMade Top 100 debut at No.93 on March 20, 2017 after winning title at \$60K ITF/Shenzhen-CHN
- At 2016 Wimbledon, ranked No.223, won her way through qualifying on her maiden Slam appearance, going on to reach 2r (upset No.23 seed Ivanovic in 1r)
- Won WTA 125K Series title at Limoges in 2016, 2018-19
- Reached 2r on WTA main draw debut at 2016 Katowice (as qualifier, I. eventual R-Up Giorgi)
- Contested qualifying for the first time at a WTA-level tournament at 2014 Bad Gastein
- Played first professional events of career on ITF Circuit in Europe in 2011

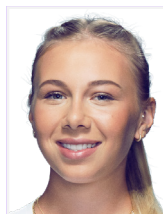

In 2019 went 0-2 in round robin matches, retiring mid-match in her second match and later withdrew from the tournament.

CAREER HIGHLIGHTS

- Started 2021 season in Melbourne by reaching 2r (l. Hsieh) at Australian Open and a SF run at Phillip Island Trophy in Melbourne (l. Bouzkova)
- Enjoyed a final fun in Miami where she lost to Barty in champion match (retirement)
- Made R16 twice on home soil in Montreal (l. Jabeur) and US Open (l. Sakkari)
- Missed entire 2020 season due to injury and opting out after return to play
- Ended 2019 ranked at No.5 up from her 2018 year-end ranking of No.178
- Won WTA's 2019 Newcomer of the Year Award
- Lifted maiden Grand Slam title at 2019 US Open (d. S.Williams in F), becoming the first Canadian woman to win a major singles title in the Open Era and breaking into the Top 5 for the first time after the tournament on Sept. 9 – had not advanced past 2r at a Slam before then
- Was the first home representative to lift the women's singles title at 2019 Rogers Cup since 1969 when Urban d. Berner in all-Canadian final (d. S.Williams in F; ret. w/ upper back injury)
- Shoulder injury forced her to miss entire 2019 grass swing
- Won maiden career title at 2019 Indian Wells (d. No.6 Svitolina in SF and No.8 Kerber in F) - was fourth unseeded woman and first wildcard to lift the title at Indian Wells
- Made first WTA final at 2019 Auckland finishing R-Up (as qualifier, d. Wozniacki and V.Williams, l. Goerges)
- Produced first WTA QF run at 2017 Washington DC (l. Petkovic). As wildcard, defeated Giorgi and world No.13 Mladenovic in 2r to become first player born in 21st century to register a Top 20 win
- Made WTA main draw debut at 2017 Wimbledon coming through qualifying (l. Kucova in 1r) – later that year, earned first WTA win in 1r of Quebec City (d. Brady, l. Hradecka)
- Broke into Top 100 on January 28, 2019 and Top 20 on August 12, 2019
- Career best wins occurred over No.3 Wozniacki at 2019 Auckland and No.3 Ka.Pliskova at 2019 Toronto – win over No.3 Wozniacki was first Top 10 win of career
- Has qualified for WTA Finals on one occasion in 2019, went 0-2 in group play retiring from her final match with a knee injury
- Canadian Billie Jean King Cup Team 2017-20
- Made professional debut by finishing R-Up at \$25k ITF/Gatineau-CAN (l. Glatch in F); owns five singles and three doubles titles on ITF Circuit

CAREER HIGHLIGHTS

- 2021 marked 4th consecutive Top 100 finish after reaching the QF at Parma and Bad Hombourg. Posted a 14-15 record in 2021, her second most wins in a season
- Opened 2020 with SF showing at Auckland, going on to reach 3r at US Open, Roland Garros and Doha
- During Doha run, earned third career Top 10 win over No.7 Svitolina (I. Kuznetsova in 3r due to walkover)
- Finished 2019 ranked No.24 – the youngest of three teenagers in the Top 50 (also Andreescu and Yastremska)
- Posted career best Grand Slam result with SF run at 2019 Roland Garros – first player (man or woman) born in 2000s to advance to this stage of a major
- Scored maiden win over a Top 5 player during 2019 Roland Garros, upsetting No.3 and defending champion Halep in QF
- Result boosted her into Top 50 for first time at No.26 on June 10, 2019
- Won maiden title at 2019 Bogotá (d. Sharma in F); at 17y 222d was the youngest American to win a title since S.Williams at 1999 Indian Wells (17y 169d)
- Made Top 100 debut at No.95 on September 17, 2018, after reaching first WTA final at Hiroshima (as qualifier, I. Hsieh)
- Also in 2018, upset No.9 Kvitova to become the joint-youngest player to reach R16 at Indian Wells, along with Majoli, who made SF in 1994 (both aged 16 years, 199 days)
- Played only two ITF tournaments before making WTA main draw debut at 2017 Miami (I. Townsend in 3s), with Grand Slam bow coming at 2017 Roland Garros (I. Nara in 1r)
- Owns six Top 20 wins: No.9 Kvitova (2018 Indian Wells), No.11 Sabalenka (2019 Australian Open), No.11 Sabalenka (2019 Roland Garros), No.3 Halep (2019 Roland Garros), No.7 Svitolina (2020 Doha) and No.19 Riske (2020 Western & Southern Open)
- In juniors, won US Open girls' singles in 2017 (d. Gauff in F) and was R-Up at 2016 Roland Garros
- Reached No.2 in junior world rankings
- Owns one singles title on ITF circuit
- Made professional debut at 2016 US Open qualifying (I. Hozumi in 2r)

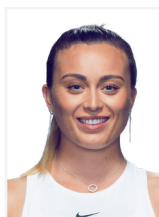

CAREER HIGHLIGHTS

- Two-time Grand Slam champion, winning back-to-back titles at Australian Open (2012, 2013). Also a 3-time runner-up at the US Open with 2 losses to Serena Williams (2012, 2013) and one to Naomi Osaka (2020) – all decided in 3-sets.
- Held the WTA World No.1 ranking for a total of 51 weeks
- Has reached 41 singles finals, winning 21 titles
- Also owns nine doubles titles
- 2021 season, finished the year ranked No.27 after posting a 28-9 record highlighted by reaching the final at Indian Wells along with the SF at Berlin and Doha
- Finished 2020 ranked No.13 – her best season-end ranking since 2013 (No.2); won the title at Western & Southern Open – her first title since 2016
- Winner of the 2020 WTA Comeback Player of the Year Award, as voted on by members of the international media
- Ended 2016 ranked No.13, despite missing second half of season after going on maternity leave (announced pregnancy mid-July). Made return to tennis in June 2017 following birth of first child in December 2016.
- On February 2, 2019 returned to Top 50 for first time following the birth of her child, Leo
- Won a single-season best four titles in 2013 – Doha, Indian Wells, Beijing and Linz
- Began 2012 with 26-match win streak – best start since Hingis went 37-0 in 1997. Went on to win Tour-leading 69 matches in 2012, season highlighted by six titles, finishing as WTA's year-end No.1
- Belarusian Fed Cup Team, 2005, 2007, 2009-11, 2015-16, 2019; Belarusian Olympic Team, 2008, 2012
- Won two medals for Belarus at 2012 Olympics - bronze in singles and mixed doubles gold (w/Mirnyi)
- Made her Top 100 debut on July 10, 2006 (No.99) and Top 50 debut on May 14, 2007 (No.49); Made WTA main draw debut at 2005 Kolkata

CAREER HIGHLIGHTS

- Captured the first two WTA singles titles of her career in 2021 at Belgrade (d. Konjuh in F) and Indian Wells (d. Azarenka in F)
- Enjoyed her best Grand Slam run at 2021 Roland-Garros by reaching the QF (l. Zidansek and qualified for first WTA Finals, where she advanced to the SF stage)
- Broke into the WTA Top 20 on October 18, 2021 after winning the Indian Wells title and reached the Top 10 on November 8, 2021
- Nominated for 2021 WTA Most Improved Player of the Year (won by Krejčíková), as voted on by members of the media
- At 2020 Roland Garros, upset former finalist Stephens and 2017 champion Ostapenko en route to reaching R16 for the first time at a major; posted career-high singles ranking of No.69 (October 12, 2020) following Paris run
- Also in 2020, reached SF at Istanbul (l. Bouchard)

WTA FINALS HISTORY

SINGLES (4-1): 2019 **DOUBLES (1-2): 2017-18**

Lifted the Billie Jean King Trophy at the 2019 WTA Finals... Also qualified for WTA Finals in back-to-back years in doubles - 2017 (w/Dellacqua) and 2018 (w/Vandeweghe). Qualified for the WTA Finals in 2021, but withdrew prior to the event.

CAREER HIGHLIGHTS

- Finished as year-end No.1 for third consecutive year (2019-21)
- In 2021, posted a 42-8 record, while winning a Tour-leading five titles, highlighted by winning her second Grand Slam title at Wimbledon.
- In 2020, went 11-3 to start season, results highlighted by first title on home soil, and eighth overall at Adelaide (d. Yastremska in F).
- Stellar season in 2019 brought four singles titles – including maiden major at Roland Garros (d. Vondrousova in F) and WTA Finals in Shenzhen (d. Svitolina in F); registered Tour-leading 57 match wins, with 11-6 record vs. Top 10
- Broke into Top 10 after defeating Ka.Pliskova in F at 2019 Miami (week of April 1) and became first Australian woman in 43 years to secure No.1 singles ranking after title run at Birmingham, where (d. Goerges in F)
- Other highlights in 2019 included R-Up finishes at Sydney (scored first win over a reigning No.1, Halep, en route; l. Kvitova) and Beijing (l. Osaka). In doubles, won Rome and was R-Up at US Open (both w/Azarenka)
- In 2019, spearheaded Australia to its first Billie Jean King Cup final since 1993, against France in Perth; went 1-1 in singles (d. Garcia, l. Mladenovic) and dropped decisive doubles (w/Stosur) as the French prevailed 3-2
- In 2018, won two singles titles and four doubles titles, finishing the season ranked No.15 in singles and No.7 in doubles; was one of only two players to finish the year in the Top 20 in both disciplines (along with Mertens)
- Captured first Grand Slam doubles trophy at 2018 US Open (w/Vandeweghe)
- Clinched career first WTA singles title at 2017 Kuala Lumpur (as qualifier, d. Hibino in F). Made Top 20 debut and became Australia's No.1 on October 23, 2017
- After 2014 US Open, took a break from tennis that lasted almost two years. Returned to professional tennis in 2016, having enjoyed a successful stint with Brisbane Heat cricket team in the 2015-16 Women's Big Bash League
- During doubles partnership alongside compatriot Dellacqua, reached three Grand Slam doubles finals in 2013 (Australian Open, Wimbledon, US Open) and was also R-Up at Roland Garros in 2017
- Presented with Tennis Australia's Newcombe Medal prize in 2018 and 2019
- Won 2011 Wimbledon girls' singles title; finished season No.2 ranked junior behind Khromacheva
- WTA main draw debut as WC at 2012 Hobart
