CAREER HIGHLIGHTS

In 2024, highlights included reaching the final at Linz (l. Ostapenko in Final) and semifinals at Adelaide (l. eventual champion Ostapenko), Miami (l. eventual champion Collins), 's-Hertogenbosch (l. eventual champion Samsonova) and Monterrey (l. Sun); also made quarterfinals at Wuhan (l. Xin. Wang) and her best Grand Slam result of the season came during a 3r run at US Open (l. eventual champion Sabalenka)

In 2023, won fourth career singles title at 's-Hertogenbosch, successfully defending the title and defeating top seed, Kudermetova in the final. A run of successful results followed with SF at Berlin (l. eventual champion, Kvitova), 4r at Wimbledon (l. Sabalenka) - a career best result at any of the majors and runner-up at Cleveland (l. Sorribes Tormo).

Reached a 2023 peak ranking of No. 16 on February 20, 2023 following a 3r finish at Australian Open (l. Linette), before posting two QF results at Miami (l. eventual champion Kvitova) and Charleston (l. Bencic). Another QF then came in the Asian Swing at Tokyo (l. Pavlyuchenkova).

In 2022, won titles at 's-Hertogenbosch (d. Sabalenka in F) and Seoul (d. Ostapenko in F). Also advanced to SF at Charleston, Madrid and Ostrava, making Top-20 debut on October 10, 2022

Reached third WTA singles final in 2021, enjoying run to final at home tournament of Moscow (l. Kontaveit). Other key result was SF run at Gippsland Trophy (l. Kanepi)

Posted two best wins-by-ranking of career in 2021, defeating No.2 Halep (Gippsland Trophy) and No.2 Sabalenka (Moscow)

Reached 2r on Olympic debut at Tokyo 2020

Opened 2020 season by lifting her maiden WTA singles title, at Shenzhen (d. Rybakina in F)

Won both singles rubbers on Billie Jean King Cup debut in 3-2 win over Romania in February 2020

Made Top-50 debut on June 17, 2019 after QF run at 's-Hertogenbosch

Registered 30 Tour-level match wins during 2019, in which she reached SF at Budapest, Seoul and Linz and made QF at St. Petersburg, 's-Hertogenbosch, Eastbourne and Moscow. Also advanced to 3r at a major for the first time, at Roland Garros

Won sole WTA doubles title at 2019 Budapest (w/Zvonareva)

Came through qualifying to make maiden WTA final appearance at 2018 Linz (l. Giorgi)

Advanced to first WTA QF at 2018 Seoul, scoring maiden Top 10 win of her career en route, over No.10 Ostapenko

Made Top-100 debut at No.93 on March 20, 2017 after winning title at \$60K ITF/Shenzhen-CHN

At 2016 Wimbledon, ranked No.223, won her way through qualifying on her maiden Slam appearance, going on to reach 2r (upset No.23 seed Ivanovic in 1r)

Won WTA 125 title at Limoges in 2016, 2018-19

Reached 2r on WTA main draw debut at 2016 Katowice (as qualifier, l. eventual R-Up Giorgi)

Contested qualifying for the first time at a WTA-level tournament at 2014 Bad Gastein

Played first professional events of career on ITF Circuit in Europe in 2011

CAREER HIGHLIGHTS

Following a nine-month absence through back injury, she returned in May 2024 at Roland Garros reaching third round (I. Paolini). She then achieved runner-up at 's-Hertogenbosch (I. Samsonova) and went on to make QF at Tokyo (I. Boulter) and 3r at Wimbledon (I. Paolini)

The 2023 season highlight was a SF run at Hua Hin (I. Tsurenko)

In 2022 reached the final at Bad Homburg (I. Garcia) and QF at Rome (I. Swiatek); finished in the Top 50 for the fourth consecutive season

Finished R-Up at 2021 Miami (I. Barty via ret. w/right foot injury)

Advanced to R16 at US Open and QF at Strasbourg last year

Opened 2021 with 2r exit at Australian Open (I. Hsieh) and SF showing at Philip Island Trophy (I. Bouzkova). Tournaments were her first since 2019 WTA Finals in Shenzhen

Skipped entirety of 2020 season due to injury and opting out after return to play

Ended 2019 ranked at No.5 jumping a total of 173 spots from her 2018 year-end ranking of No.178

Won WTA's 2019 Newcomer of the Year Award

Lifted maiden Grand Slam title at 2019 US Open (d. S.Williams in F), becoming the first Canadian woman to win a major singles title in the Open Era and breaking into the Top 5 for the first time after the tournament on Sept. 9 - had not advanced past 2r at a Slam before then

Was the first home representative to lift the women's singles title at 2019 Rogers Cup since 1969 when Urban d. Berner in all-Canadian final (d. S.Williams in F; ret. w/ upper back injury)

Shoulder injury forced her to miss entire 2019 grass swing

Won maiden career title at 2019 Indian Wells (d. No.6 Svitolina in SF and No.8 Kerber in F) - was fourth unseeded woman and first wildcard to lift the title at Indian Wells

Made first WTA final at 2019 at Auckland finishing R-Up as a qualifier (d. Wozniacki and V.Williams, I. Goerges)

Produced first WTA QF run at 2017 Washington DC (I. Petkovic). As wildcard, defeated Giorgi and world No.13 Mladenovic in 2r to become first player born in 21st century to register a Top 20 win

Made WTA main draw debut at 2017 Wimbledon coming through qualifying (I. Kucova in 1r) - later that year, earned first WTA win in 1r of Quebec City (d. Brady, I. Hradecka)

Broke into Top 100 on January 28, 2019 and Top 20 on August 12, 2019

Career best wins occurred over No.3 Wozniacki at 2019 Auckland and No.3 Ka.Pliskova at 2019 Toronto - win over No.3 Wozniacki was first Top 10 win of career

Has qualified for WTA Finals on one occasion in 2019, went 0-2 in group play retiring from her final match with a knee injury

Made professional debut by finishing R-Up at \$25k ITF/Gatineau-CAN (I. Glatch in F); owns five singles and three doubles titles on ITF Circuit

Reached first two WTA finals of career in 2024 winning the title at Iasi and finishing runner-up at Ningbo

Made first Grand Slam semifinal at 2024 Roland Garros beating World No.2 Aryna Sabalenka in the quarterfinals

Made Top 20 debut on October 8, 2024 finishing the year at World No.16. Also won 2024 Paris Olympic silver medal in women's doubles with Diana Shnaider

Opened 2023 season in April by winning 13 matches straight to claim back-to-back ITF titles in Switzerland; as WC, advanced to R16 at Madrid with wins over Fernandez, Haddad Maia and Linette (I. Sabalenka); subsequently made debut at Roland Garros (as qualifier, I. Gauff in 3r), Wimbledon (as qualifier, I. Keys in R16) and US Open (I. eventual champion Gauff in 2r)

CAREER HIGHLIGHTS

In 2024 made first WTA 1000 final of career at Toronto, finishing R-Up to Pegula (defeated No.3 Sabalenka en route). Also enjoyed run to R16 at Australian Open, her third time reaching that stage in Melbourne

Played a small number of tournaments in 2023 before taking a break away from the sport after Madrid in April

Lifted second career title at Melbourne Summer Set 2 (d. Sasnovich in F) in January 2022

In 2022, also made SF at Charleston (l. Jabeur) and five further QFs, including at Wimbledon (l. Halep)

Ended 2021 season with 3r run at Indian Wells to secure her fourth consecutive Top-100 finish. Best results were QF runs at Parma and Bad Homburg

Opened 2020 with SF showing at Auckland, going on to reach 3r at US Open, Roland Garros and Doha; during Doha run, earned third career Top 10 win over No.7 Svitolina (l. Kuznetsova in 3r due to walkover)

Finished 2019 ranked No.24 - the youngest of three teenagers in the Top 50 (also Andreescu and Yastremska)

Posted career best Grand Slam result with SF run at 2019 Roland Garros - first player (man or woman) born in 2000s to advance to this stage of a major. Scored maiden win over a Top 5 player during 2019 Roland Garros, upsetting No.3 and defending champion Halep in QF

Result boosted her into Top 50 for first time at No.26 on June 10, 2019

Won maiden title at 2019 Bogotá (d. Sharma in F); at 17y 222d was the youngest American to win a title since S.Williams at 1999 Indian Wells (17y 169d)

Made Top 100 debut at No.95 on September 17, 2018, after reaching first WTA final at Hiroshima (as qualifier, l. Hsieh)

Also in 2018, upset No.9 Kvitova to become the joint-youngest player to reach R16 at Indian Wells, along with Majoli, who made SF in 1994 (both aged 16 years, 199 days)

Played only two ITF tournaments before making WTA main draw debut at 2017 Miami (l. Townsend in 3s), with Grand Slam bow coming at 2017 Roland Garros (l. Nara in 1r)

Owns six Top 20 wins: No.9 Kvitova (2018 Indian Wells), No.11 Sabalenka (2019 Australian Open), No.11 Sabalenka (2019 Roland Garros), No.3 Halep (2019 Roland Garros), No.7 Svitolina (2020 Doha) and No.19 Riske (2020 Western & Southern Open)

In juniors, won US Open girls' singles in 2017 (d. Gauff in F) and was R-Up at 2016 Roland Garros; reached No.2 in junior world rankings

Owns one singles title on ITF Circuit

Made professional debut at 2016 US Open qualifying (l. Hozumi in 2r)
